## MOVING PICTURES

While moving pictures constitute the very best form of entertainment they can be made most important instruments of education by bringing vividly before us scenes from history and from literature and presenting customs, manners, and characters of distant lands and other ages to our ken. They bring the dead to life, make distant scenes present and give a reality to what otherwise must seem vague and indistinct. The story of Lytton's "Last Days of Pompeii" was a splendid picture of that dramatic and powerful work of genius and made Caecus, Ions and Arbaces of the Flaming Belt, living and moving personages, and brought the old and tragic Roman life of the first century vividly before us.

Known to all readers of our language is the vivid and beautiful poetic tale of The Lady of the Lake by that prince of story tellers, Sir Walter Scott. The story of this poem, told in pictures of the Orpheus Hall two weeks ago, enables us to carry away vividly in mind the scenes, events and characters, and the poem has been read for the first time by many and re-read after the lapse of years by those once familiar with the vigorous lines in times gone by because of the interest aroused by the pictures. The "Lady of the Lake" is now a school text book and the boys and girls of the English grades who saw the vitagraph illustrations must have appreciated and loved it the more. The clear and dramatic presentation of Dickens powerful tale of "Martin Chuzzlewit," on the moving picture screen will serve to make the greatness of the writer's genius more appreciated by those already appreciating it, and to cultivate an interest in those heretofore lacking it. Such a series of pictures are of great and commendable educational value. Let us have the highest literature presented to the masses in a way that will attract and interest. A series of illustrations of the great masterpieces of literature is a genuine campaign of education.

## REFUSES TO REPEAL RECIPROCITY ACT

Washington, July 30.—The House today refused to vote of 127 to 107 to agree to the Senate's amendment to the excise tax bill providing for the repeal of the Canadian reciprocity act.

## BEVERIDGE FOR GOVERNOR

Indianapolis, Ind., July 31.—The nomination of a complete state ticket on a platform declaring for woman suffrage, the initiative, referendum and recall, a minimum wage for women, the commission form of city government and the election of United States senators by direct vote, is the program mapped out for the Indiana State convention of the Progressive party to be held here tomorrow. The party hopes to persuade Albert J. Beveridge, former United States senator and an ardent Roosevelt man, to accept the nomination for governor. If Beveridge declines the gubernatorial nomination may go to former Congressman Frederick Landis of Logansport, or Horace C. Stilwell of Anderson.

## MAINE PROGRESSIVES MEET

Portland, Me., July 31.—The insurgent Republicans who carried Maine for Roosevelt last spring rallied here for a state convention today to select delegates to attend the National Progressive Convention at Chicago next week. According to the present plan the regular Republican state ticket will be endorsed and a new set of presidential electors will be nominated.

Gooseberry fool is always popular. Stew the gooseberries in a jar with only a sprinkling of water to make the sugar. Rub through the sieve, and when quite cold mix well with either cream or cold boiled custard. Serve in a glass dish or custard. When reading or sewing by the lamp light place a sheet of white paper under the lamp; it will be found that a far stronger light is shed all over the room.

When frying fish of any kind sprinkle a little salt on the bottom of the pan when it is hot; the fish can then be easily turned without breaking. Glycerine and lemon juice in equal proportions is very useful for whitening the hands. Apply at night and put on loose gloves immediately.
