SWEPT THINGS AT
NORTH RANDALL

Joe Patcher 11 and Knight Onwardo
Captured First and Second money
in Edwards Stake.

Cleveland, July 29—Canadians ruled the day in the open race at the Grand Circuit meeting at North Randall this afternoon. Joe Patcher 11, owned by R. J. McKenzie, Winnipeg, Man., and Knight Onwardo, owned by J. E. Gray of Toronto, Ont., taking first and second money respectively in \$3000 Edwards Stake for 2.12 pacers.

At no time in the race was Joe Patcher 11's victory in doubt, but the placing of the diminutive Knight Onwardo came as a surprise. The talent had picked Murphy's roan horse, Chimes Hal, to land second position of the purse, but he could not outfoot Onwardo.

In addition to the Edwards Stake, three preliminary heats of the Taverne "Steak" completed the day's card. The track was very heavy, due to a hard rain Sunday night, and as a result racing did not start until 2.45 o'clock. Everything considered fast time was made. A good sized crowd was in attendance.

When Starting Judge Frank Walker gave the word to the 2.12 pacers, he sent on their journey the largest field of horses that has raced on the Grand Circuit this season. An even dozen competed and they were given a send-off after four or five scores.

Joe Patcher 11, who scored in second position, at the first turn forced Chimes Hal to relinquish the pole. With this accomplished the race, so far as first place was concerned, was decided. When Joe Patcher 11 stuck his pink nose in front, he was not headed afterward.

PLAY ON KNIGHT ONWARDO.

In the betting Joe Patcher 11 sold for \$50, the field bringing \$20 and \$22. Later Joe Patcher 11 was barred and Chimes Hal sold for \$50, Knight Onwardo \$13, Frank Green \$5, Denver Jay \$5 and the field \$7.

With Knight Onwardo selling so cheap, a big play was made on him and the little horse delivered in a most fitting manner and finished 2-2-2 with apparent ease.

PERFECT PACER.

Not in many years has so perfect a pacer been seen as the bay son of Joe Patcher and Bessie Bonehill. The big horse, which attracted attention by his performances in the ice races up in Canada two years ago, has not lost a race this season nor even a heat. He knows nothing but pace, as one groomster remarked today as he saw the star blaze the face of the Patcher hofae loomed up like a headlight at the head of the stretch.

Seeing Joe Patcher 11 go out in front and remain there throughout the three heats made old-timers recall the good days when Joe Patcher, John R. Gentry and Robert K sent thrill after thrill through excited crowds of spectators whenever they raced. The ease with which Joe Patcher races instills confidence and makes most critics warm up to the knowing horse from across the border.

TAVERN "STEAK."

The three divisions of the Tavern "Steak" brought forth some surprises, principally the failure of Frank G. Jones of Memphis, to finish better than second. After having won the Tavern "Steak" with Henry H in 1910 and with Argot Hal last year, much was expected of the successful Memphis reinsman today.

Jones had three mounts, but he barely qualified for the final. He finished 7-8-8 with Funny Crank, and 7-4-3 with Pee Wee, but Dorsh Medium proved more consistent and with her he won second money. Pee Wee was lame and made a poor showing.

J. L. Dodge, John Coakley and John Ruff were the successful drivers in the third Tavern "Steak." Dodge won the first division with The Wanderer.

Coakley, with Esther W, won the second division, in which Dorsh Medium was second, while Ruff, who replaced Moko Dillard at the beginning of the third heat, won the third division. Mike Agan landed second money.

CONCEEDS PENNANT
TO RED SOX

Says Athletics Must win at Last Twelve
out of Sixteen Games on West-
ern Trips.

Philadelphia, July 29—Manager Connie Mack of the World's champion Athletics has this to say on the American League pennant race:

"I will not give up hope till the last ray has disappeared. However, I realize the importance of the present trip and so do my boys. Every one of them has undoubtedly done his very best to bring a third straight pennant to Philadelphia and I can say without fear that it won't be their fault if they fail.

"The general run of the American League clubs today is twice if not three times as strong as what they were last year, and while this alone has not kept my team from being further up in the league race at the present time, it is one of the many real causes.

"Yes at least a dozen games have slipped through our fingers that should have been added in our win column without any trouble whatsoever but it always happened that some one player came to time with an ugly misplay and sent the game in the other direction.

"Providing the Western teams, as well as the Eastern, take a brace—or say they play against the Red Sox, as hard as they play against us—then I will feel assured that my hopes will most likely be realized. But, coming down to real fine points I figure that unless we win at least 12 of the present 16 games we have scheduled on the road our chances of beating out Boston are exceedingly slim.

Pittsburg, July 29—Jimmy Perry, the Pittsburg welterweight, knocked out Jack Cardiff, the fighting evangelist of Canton, O., tonight at the South Side Market House. Perry outclassed his opponent. A swing to the jaw and a stomach punch brought the fight to a finish.

HAL CHASE'S DIVORCE
SUIT MAY BE WITHDRAWN

New York, July 29—Attorneys for Hal Chase, first baseman of the New York American League Club, and for his wife Nellie H. Chase, who is being sued for a divorce by the ball player, appeared before Justice Lehman in the Supreme Court today and announced that they desired to withdraw the two months motion brought before the justice for \$300 a month alimony and that certain allegations made by Chase be stricken out.
