POTATOES \$1 A BBL IN CARLETON COUNTY

Woodstock, N. B., Dec. 26—Under a recent order of the board of railway commissioners the demurrage charges are increased from \$1 per car per day to \$2 and \$3. The order takes effect today.

Potato shippers are hard hit by this ruling, and the firm of Porter Manzer & Co., who was among the largest shippers in the county, have taken fifty box cars from the C.P.R. made them into potato cars by fitting and other required improvements. They pay an additional charge of \$4 each for cars of this kind and avoid car demurrage. The cars are billed back to the firm as soon as unloaded and no delays occur in shipments. Other big shippers will make the same arrangement.

Shippers today are offering \$1 a barrel for potatoes. Very few are coming in, the farmers holding for better prices. In Houlton this morning farmers were paid \$1.30 to \$1.35 a barrel, while pressed hay, No. 1, was selling at \$15 a ton, as against \$9 in Woodstock.

REFORMS THAT WILL BENEFIT MANKIND

Boston, Mass., Dec. 27—Men and women from all parts of the United States, who take an active interest in the promotion of various social sciences and reform gathered in Boston today for the annual meetings of societies organized for the discussion of such subjects. The organizations are the American Association for Labor Legislation, the American Sociological Society, the American Economic Association, the American Statistical Association, the American Political Science Association and the American Historical Association, which last named organization Col. Theodore Roosevelt is the president.

The meeting that promises to be of most interest to the general public is the sixth annual session of the American Association for Labor Legislation. The session was opened this morning with an address by John R. Commons explaining the work of the Wisconsin commission in enforcing the factory inspection laws. This afternoon Oscar S. Straus of New York, former Secretary of the Commerce and Labor, spoke on the need of a new Federal employers' accident compensation law.

A CRAZY PROJECT

SAYS WILLIAM BOYLE

To the Editor of The Daily Mail:

Sir:—"Hands across the sea." Premier Borden and Mr. Asquith. Mr. Asquith's government depends for its existence on the support of John Redmond and the Irish Nationalists. Mr. Borden's rule depends largely on the support of his allies, the Quebec Nationalists. There is thus a bond of sympathy between the leaders. It was thought by some that the emergency grant of thirty-five million dollars was to be handed over to the British government to be expended under the direction of the lords of the admiralty. Not so, however. A bill introduced on Dec. 6th says this sum shall be applied under the direction of the governor-in-council in the construction of armored cruisers, etc. Now, there isn't a man in the Borden cabinet who knows a thing about the internal or external fittings of a man-of-war vessel. Borden's scheme is the craziest of all crazy projects. One thing is evident: Borden seems afraid to trust Lord Winston Churchill with the spending of this grant.

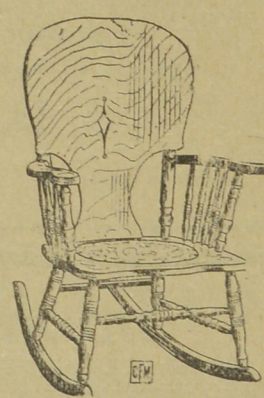
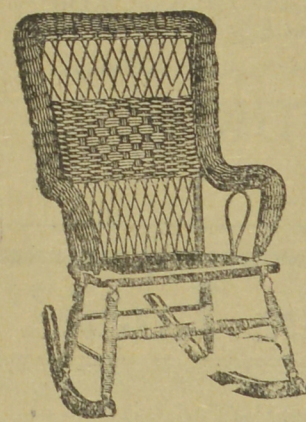
