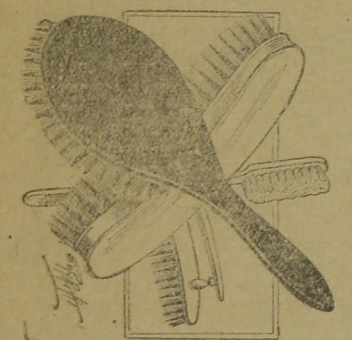

ANCIENTS SAIL FOR ENGLAND

Boston, July 2—One hundred mem-

bers of the Ancient and Honorable

Artillery Company of Massachusetts

probably the best known as well as

the oldest military organization in

America, sailed for Liverpool today

on the steamship Arabic. During their

Americans will be the guests of the

Honorable Artillery Company of Lon-

dons of which the Earl of Denbigh is

colonel. The Massachusetts men will

assist in a celebration of the 376th

anniversary of the London company.

The visitors will be received by King

George at Buckingham Palace and

will visit Windsor and numerous other

places of interest. It will be the

second visit of the Ancients to Lon-

dons. In 1896 they visited England and

were royally entertained. The visit

was returned by the Honorable Ar-

tillery Company of London in 1903,

when they came to Boston as the guests

of the Ancients.

PENSION PLAN FOR 12,000

Boston, Mass., July 1—Twelve
 thousand employees of the New Eng-
 land Telephone and Telegraph Com-
 pany are directly concerned in the
 old-age and disability pension plan
 which was put into effect by the
 company today. After 20 years' ser-
 vice an employee may be pensioned
 for disability at the age of 60, or
 when five years older may be retired
 on pension at his own volition. At
 the age of 70 retirement will be
 compulsory. The employees are not
 called upon to make any contribu-
 tion to the maintenance of the pen-
 sion system.

CONFER ON WAGE DEMAND

New York, July 1—The committee
 of managers of Eastern railroads met
 in conference here today with
 representatives of the Brotherhood of
 Locomotive Firemen and Engi-
 neers to discuss the recent demands
 of that organization for increases in
 pay. The demand has been made on
 all the roads east of the Mississippi
 and north of the Chesapeake and
 Ohio and including the Grand Trunk
 Railway of Canada. It is estimated
 that the granting of the increase de-
 manded by the firemen and engi-
 neers would add \$25,000,000 to the
 yearly payroll of the Eastern
 railroads.

Washington, D. C., July 2—Presi-
 dent Taft and his family are arrang-

 at Beverly tomorrow. The president
 plans to remain at Beverly until the
 first of next week, when he will re-
 turn to Washington for the remain-
 der of the present session of congress.
 As soon as the law-makers have
 finished their labors, which they are
 expected to do at an early date if
 the present hot weather continues, the
 president will lose no time rejoining
 his family in the Massachusetts coast
 town.

London, July 1—The annual Hen-
 ley regatta opened today and will
 continue through the remainder of
 the week. No college eight from the
 opposite side of the water figures
 this year in the aquatic derby, but
 the Argonaut Rowing Club of Toron-
 to is entered for the Grand Challenge
 Cup, while in the Diamond Challenge
 Sculls the same club will be rep-
 resented by Everard B. Butler. France,
 Russia, Italy, Tasmania and Belgium
 also will be represented in the Di-
 amond Challenge Sculls competition.
 The attendance of the King and
 Queen next Saturday is expected to
 make the regatta the most brilliant
 of years from a social viewpoint.

SOMETHING ABOUT THE
BRITISH ATTORNEY GENERAL

Those who are reading the accounts
 of the British inquiry into the Ti-
 tantic disaster will doubtless be in-
 terested to know something about
 Sir Rufus Isaacs, who as Attorney-
 General is conducting the examina-
 tion of the Government. Probably
 not since Benjamin Disraeli's rise to
 the Prime Ministry, the highest of-
 ficial position within reach of any
 Englishman not of the royal blood,
 has any Jew made himself more
 strongly felt in English law and po-
 litics than Sir Rufus who has just
 been elevated to a membership in
 the cabinet. His success has been
 due principally to his usual ability
 as a trial lawyer, rather than to
 cleverness as a politician. The story
 of his career, which we find the New
 York Times, reads like a romance of
 American political life. Says The

Times: "When a boy Rufus Isaac ran
 away from home and joined a ship's
 company for Rio de Janeiro. At
 twenty-five although a member of
 the London Stock Exchange, he was
 already marked a financial failure
 and yet, ten years after he had been
 admitted to the bar of the Middle
 Temple, for which he began studying
 when twenty-six years old, he had
 been created a King's Counsel, and
 had the largest practice of any bar-
 rister in England."

Sir Rufus Daniel Isaacs is the son
 of Joseph M. Isaacs, a London Mer-
 chant. He received his education at
 the University College School and in
 Brussels and Fanoover. His parents
 destined him for Cambridge, but the
 idea of study was irksome to the
 spirited young man so that while ar-
 rangements for his education were
 being perfected, he embarked on a
 sailing-vessel for South America as a
 common sailor.

He soon tired of his life, and re-
 turned to London. Although he
 might still have gone to the univer-
 sity, young Isaacs preferred business,
 and became a broker. He learned
 however, that business, in London
 was uncongenial to him as the sea.
 At twenty-six he was face to face
 with financial ruin.

It was at this juncture that
 young Isaacs met his future wife,
 Miss Alice Edith Cohen, who was
 to play an important part in his
 later career as his constant help-
 meet and adviser. Miss Cohen was
 the daughter of an American mer-
 chant, who had moved to London.

COMPENSATION ACT IN FORCE

Boston, Mass., July 1—The work-
 men's compensation act passed by
 the recent session of the Massa-
 chusetts legislative today. The act
 provides a fixed scale of compensa-
 tion for industrial accidents to em-
 ployes of those employers who ac-
 cept the law they are liable to un-
 limited damages at common law,
 and, in addition are not allowed, as
 formerly to plead in defence that
 the accident was the effect by the
 employe, or that it was the result
 of an act of a fellow servant, or
 that the employe assumed the risk
 of employment. Employers who ac-
 cept the law are obliged to insure
 with a liability company.

Under the name "Canton Berner
 Frauenverein," a Swiss society of
 women, representing all parts of the
 canton of Bern, has just been form-
 ed in the Swiss capital to carry out
 a somewhat original scheme on behalf
 of girls and women. The object of
 the society is to prevent girls enter-
 ing factories, cafes and trades
 which are already overcrowded with
 women workers, and where the wages
 are, therefore, cut down to the low-
 est limit. The Bernese society wishes
 girls to learn men's trades and to
 become bookbinders, carpenters, sign
 painters, chemists, farmers, mas-
 seurs, travelers, etc.

TAFT'S OLD HOME UNDER HAMMER

Cincinnati, O., July 3—The old
 home of President Taft was offered
 for sale at auction today. Since the
 president lived there the house has
 been occupied by several persons,
 the last owner going into bankruptcy
 with the result that the property
 was ordered sold to satisfy the
 creditors.

The paper manufacturers of Holy-
 oke, Massachusetts, recently volun-
 tarily granted an eight-hour day
 with no cut in wages. The majority
 of the employes in the paper mills
 formerly worked eleven to thirteen
 hours per day.
