COL. SMART IGNORED RED TAPE METHODS

Ottawa, June 30—Colonel Smart, Commandant of the Farnham Camp, has received the special commendation of the Minister of Militia for his failure to recognize "red tape" methods in dealing with a case of smallpox which broke out in the camp, a cavalryman from Sherbrooke being stricken with the disease. Immediately the case was diagnosed, Lieut. Colonel Smart ordered the man sent to the isolation hospital in his own district, while his companions in arms were placed under medical supervision in a separate tent on the grounds. The orders were carried out, but when Colonel Smart further ordered that the blankets and accoutrements should be burned an officer of the permanent staff respectfully objected on the ground that the property of the country could not be destroyed without first holding an inquiry as to the reasons for smallpox and everything pertaining to the outbreak. "Burn the blankets and tents first, then hold your inquiry," was the order issued by Colonel Smart, which was carried out.

TWENTY-FOUR HOUR SYSTEM IN FRANCE

Paris, July 1—All France or at least that part of it having to do with official life, is experiencing its first taste of the new system of computing time, counting from 0 to 24, the change having come into effect this morning. The twenty-four hour system now applies to all the work of the Post Office Department and also to the government railways, the latter having revised their time tables to conform to the new system.

WOMAN HIRED OUT TO HER HUSBAND

The following letter won a prize of \$25 offered by The Woman's Home Companion for the best account of a vacation. It was written by a woman who lives on a farm in Wyoming:

"To begin with, then I'm a rancher's wife, and was a farmer's daughter, so I know what it means to get up early and work till late. I've read a great deal about vacations, but not much about vacations on the ranch.

"Most woman who live on a ranch know something about horses, and can harness and drive a team. Now everyone knows that to people who have always worked with their hands idleness is not rest, and that recreation comes quicker and surer from a change of work; so I 'hired out' to my husband.

"We have seventy-five acres of alfalfa and here in the West men are scarce and wages are high, so I hired a girl to do the housework and take care of the children, while I donned a pair of overalls, a jumper, a broad-brimmed hat, and a pair of stout gloves, and went forth to take my vacation.

"The first day I mowed, and the first night I kicked levers and drove horses all night. I wasn't so enthusiastic the second morning, but I mowed some more, and raked some, and that night I slept; and I slept every night that followed during the harvest, for I stayed with it till the hay was in the stacks, doing team-work altogether, and when we were through, my husband said I was 'the best man on the job.'

"I was decidedly a better woman, for I had gained five pounds of flesh stronger nerves, harder muscles, and a coat of tan that hasn't all worn off yet.

"I told the girl that I was not to be consulted about anything, so I shifted the whole responsibility of the household, and did just as the men did; washed ate my meals, and then rested till time to start to work again.

"My Girls cost me four dollars per week, and I made twelve which per week in cash, besides the other good things. I felt so rested when I took up the reins of the household again, that what had before been a task was now a pleasure. Really, it did seem good to cook a meal once more, and I had not thought it possible.

"And next year I'm going to do it all over again."

NOTED GERMAN TO VISIT AMERICA

New York, July 6—Among the noted passengers on the steamship Amerika, due to reach New York tomorrow, is Dr. Hermann Paasche, first vice president of the German reichstag and leader of the national liberal party. Dr. Paasche is making a world tour for the purpose of studying systems of government and public questions of general importance. He is particularly interested in legislation for the abolition or restriction of the liquor traffic. He will visit many of the principal cities of the United States and Canada.


