HOSPITAL BOARD HELD REGULAR MONTHLY MEETING

Troublesome Patients have Kept Physicians and Nurses Busily Engaged During the Past Month-- Three Deaths

FORTY-THREE PATIENTS TREATED AT INSTITUTION

The trustees of the hospital took a holiday on Dominion Day and held their monthly meeting yesterday, when Hon. Judge Barry presided and the other members in attendance were Vice President Sterling, Mr. Mitchell, His Worship Mayor Hooper, Dr. McGrath, Coun. Neill, Mr. Clark and Secretary-Treasurer Sampson. Of late physicians and nurses have been pretty thoroughly occupied and some troublesome patients claimed lots of attention but three deaths and several discharged convalescents in the month of June have resulted in rest and quietness through the wards and corridors.

The secretary-treasurer presented a statement of expenditures for June, showing a pretty large business but over against this the receipts covered considerable space.

From the matron's report it was shown that forty-three patients were under treatment, and on Dominion Day this number was reduced to eleven. Eighteen surgical cases were treated, one contagious case occupies the wing, six out-patients received attention. Among the summer gifts received were six jars of marmalade from Mrs. J. W. McCready.

Two young lady students who have served the required three months probation, were highly recommended for the student-nurse staff by the matron and by Dr. Vanwart. One of these, Miss Myrtle Russell, belongs to Fredericton Junction, and the other is Miss Leila Kitchen, daughter of Mr. Coles Kitchen of this city.

Rev. Father Carney held faithfully to the date for Hospital Sunday this year and in St. Dunstan's Church on the third Sunday in June gave his people their annual opportunity to contribute to the maintenance of the hospital and as a result he sent the treasurer his cheque for the generous sum of \$37.65. The other churches deferred the observance of Hospital Sunday until a later date owing to the proposed observance of the ladies of the 25th anniversary of the institution.

Mr. Whitehead reported that the ladies expected to have \$800 as a result of collections made on Anniversary Day.

During yesterday's meeting an interview was had with the matron respecting some irregularities in admittance of a patient to the hospital. Her explanation of the circumstances was satisfactory so far as she was personally concerned and it is presumed no very serious difficulty will follow to the management.

MANAGING COMMITTEE TO MEET THIS EVENING

Several matters of importance will come before the meeting of the Managing Committee of the Old Home Week Celebration at the meeting at the City Hall this evening at 8 o'clock. All citizens are invited to attend the meeting and take part in the discussion.

In connection with the programme of water sports, one of the most famous of the four oared crews of the United States has expressed a willingness to come here and compete against a crew from Halifax. This, it is considered would prove a big attraction. There is also the suggestion that Harry Atwood, the world's famous aviator, who proved such a grand drawing card at the Bangor Fair, be brought here for fights during Old Home Week. Of course this would entail a very large expenditure, but the results achieved would doubtless warrant the expense. It is probable that the Committee this evening will make a deputation to interview the county council on the matter of a grant. The city council last evening decided in favor of the grant of \$500 and as it is the desire to bring back as many former residents of the county as is possible it is felt that the municipal council may see its way clear to assist the movement in a practical manner.

The committee on the Polymorphian Parade met last evening with Mr. Thos. L. Kane presiding. This feature of the celebration promises to be attractive and a large list of entries is looked for.

IMPORTANT LAW POINT DECIDED BY JUDGE BARRY

Holds that a Tenant is Responsible for the Rent even Should Building be Badly Damaged by Fire

DECISION FOR PLAINTIFF IN ROMANUS VS. BLAIR

A tenant of a shop and dwelling continues to be liable for rent although the premises have been so badly damaged by fire as to be untenable. This is the result of a decision rendered by Judge Barry in Chambers today. Joseph Romanus in May 1911 leased a lot of land in St. Marys to Chas. Blair for two years at a monthly rental of \$12.00. There was a building on the lot which was used by Mr. Blair as a shop and dwelling. In November last the building was almost completely destroyed by fire. Mr. Blair demanded that the premises be repaired and refused to pay rent. Mr. Romanus refused to repair on the ground that there was no agreement in the lease requiring him to do so.

A short time ago Romanus brought suit claiming a forfeiture of the lease because of non-payment of rent accruing after the fire and Blair defended, but his counsel consented and Judge Barry ordered summary judgment to be entered for Romanus for the recovery of the property because the rent continued to fall due and had not been paid.

P. J. Hughes of McLellan & Hughes appeared for the plaintiff and H. F. McLeod, K.C., for defendant.

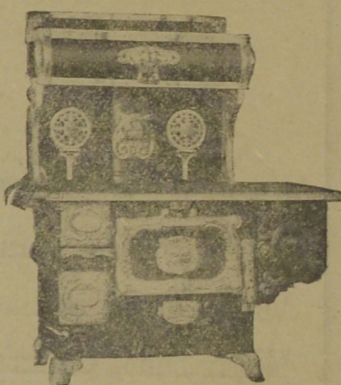
