### A NOTABLE OMISSION

Lieut. Col. Scott, Grand Master of the Sovereign Grand Lodge of Orangemen in his annual address delivered here this week found cause for gratification in the fact that Bro. Col. Sam Hughes and Bro. A. E. Kemp had been admitted to the Borden Cabinet. He appeared to take it for granted that their acceptance of office was a guarantee of good government. The Grand Master also noted the fact with great approval that Dr. T. S. Sproule his immediate predecessor in office had been elected to the honorable and dignified position of speaker of the House of Commons. He was particularly careful, however, not to tell the delegates that the Borden government had selected for the post of deputy speaker Mr. P. E. Blondin, a fiery Nationalist who represents the County of Champlain at Ottawa. Mr. Blondin it will be remembered took an active part in the memorable bye-election in Drummond-Arthabaska last year and speaking in support of the Nationalist candidate was reported to have said:

"We owe nothing to Great Britain. 'England did not take Canada for love or to plant the cross of Christ' as the French did, but in order to 'plant their trading posts and to 'make money. The only liberties we 'have are those we won by force and 'today England tries to dominate 'her colonies as Imperial Rome once 'did. The English have never done 'anything for the French Canadians. 'Those who disembowelled your fathers on the Plains of Abraham ask 'you today to go and get killed for 'them. We are French Canadians not 'English. French Canadians are not 'going to cringe to Englishmen. They 'will not go out to get their backs 'broken for them."

It is passing strange that the gallant Col. Scott who has apparently kept in close touch with political events should have omitted to make some reference to the deputy speaker and to the beautiful and patriotic sentiment given expression to by him only a few months ago. It is also strange that he omitted to hand out to the Borden government a word of praise for having selected this illustrious anti-British fire-eater to serve in the capacity of a deputy to that distinguished student of the French language, Past Grand Master Sproule. Such an omission on the part of Col. Scott is very apt to strengthen the impression that some people already have that the Orange Order is a mere adjunct to the Tory party.

This is certainly a world of surprises. The announcement has been made in the Tory press that Col. Harry McLeod has accepted from a wicked Yankee a medal for competition among the men of the 71st Regiment. Why should a citizen of a foreign country be interested in promoting marksmanship in a British regiment? It is doubtful if the military annals of the world offer a precedent for such an act. Col. McLeod, if he is one-half as patriotic as he pretends to be, especially at election times, will lose no time in returning that medal to the donor.

It is the duty of both political parties of York to select as candidates for the Local Legislature the very best men available. The man whose object in seeking to enter public life is to further his own ends should not be considered for a moment. Only the claims of those who will conscientiously seek to promote the welfare of all the people in season and out of season should be given serious consideration. Water cannot rise above its source and unless we send good men to the Legislature we cannot hope to have good government in this province.

Although he is acting as arbitrator between the rival factions in York, and striving to restore harmony, the sympathies of Mr. O. S. Crockett, M. P., are clearly with Mr. Pinder. He regards Mr. McLeod as a dangerous rival and does not at all like the fashion he has of butting in on patronage matters.

The Standard in a high toned article on provincial politics says: "He (Mr. Copp) has defended the scandalous neglect of the old government in their failure to collect the territorial revenue of the Province and has shouldered the responsibility of their enormous over-expenditures in the Public Works Department."

It is a well known fact that the chief editorial writer of the Standard defended the old government as long as it had patronage to dispense. He has since flopped over to the other side, and is now singing the praises of the Flemming government, and incidentally sharing in the spoils.

The farmers throughout the County of York seem to be in good humor at the present time. They have disposed of their surplus products in the markets of the New England States at prices which have not been equalled since the civil war. We cannot see that they are under any special obligations to the Flemming government and its agricultural department either.

Tory organs are fond of quoting opinions of that alleged Liberal journal the St. John Globe, on provincial politics. The following which appeared in its columns a few nights ago, seems to have escaped their notice:

"The Conservative ticket (in St. John City) is not as strong as a judicious selection of candidates for nomination would have made."

The Flemming newspapers are having a busy time endeavoring to explain away the fact that no financial provisions have been made for the constructing of the Valley Railway from River du Chute to Grand Falls. The reason why the bonds have not been floated for this section of the road is quite obvious—the C. P. R. authorities do not want it built.

There are so many stenographers employed in the departmental building under the Flemming government that difficulty is experienced in finding accommodation for them. Only a few days ago it was found necessary to send one to St. John to work in the Standard office until after the elections.

According to a despatch to the Standard the electors of Elgin, after listening to addresses by those great patriots, W. B. Dickson, F. M. Sproule and George D. Prescott, "Will express their preference for honest government in no uncertain way on June 20th." All honor to the electors of Elgin.

The Tory heelers who have not yet been given jobs on the Valley Railway should get busy at once. Polling day is less than three weeks off and if they are not provided for before that time the chances are that they will get nothing.

The present local government has been in power four years and they have increased the annual expenditure by \$400,000 a year. This is in excess of \$1 per head for every man, woman and child in the province. It is time for a change.

The Tory ticket in St. John is positively the weakest combination ever put up in that city by either party. We are very much mistaken if the people of the Winter Port, in these days of expansion, stand for that outfit.

The present local government in a period of four years, added \$1,000,000 to the public debt of the province. This means an additional burden of \$15 on every family in York County. It is time for a change.

The great speech of Sir Wilfrid Laurier delivered at Montreal, indicates that the Liberals have no notion of abandoning their policy of closer trade relations with the United States.

No Tory newspaper has ventured to deny the statement that the defeat of reciprocity in September last has cost the farmers and lumbermen of York at least \$200,000.

The heavy rain storm of the past few days bodes no good to the Flemming government. The roads were bad enough before, they will be much worse now.

Tory heelers should get busy and demand a share of the spoils. Don't let the patronage dispensers put you off until after the election.

## WOODSTOCK CASE TO BE APPEALED

St. John, May 30—In the case of Catherine Carr of Woodstock versus the C. P. R. on application of F. R. Taylor for the defendant, and Dr. Currie, K. C., for the plaintiff, Judge McKeown this morning approved of the bond given for an appeal to the supreme court of Canada. It will be argued at Ottawa at the October term. The trespass for which the action was brought was committed nineteen years ago when the defendant company laid a siding across the property of the plaintiff at Woodstock, destroying the lawn. At the trial the defendant company claimed that the limitation of two years as set in the railway act had expired. The court, however, held that this did not apply to the case and the plaintiff was awarded twelve hundred dollars damages.

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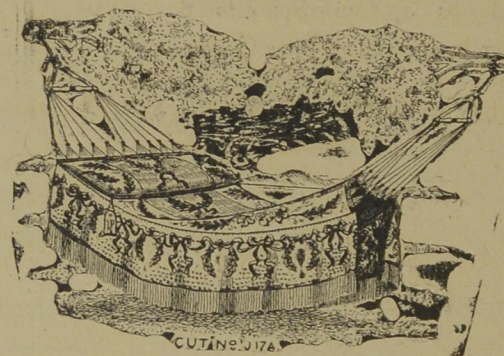
