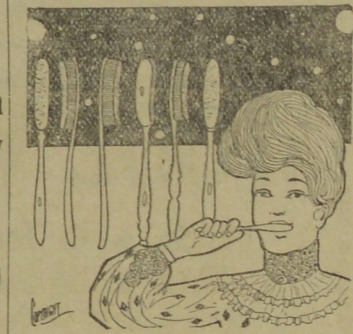

GUNNING TAKES

**GANDIL'S WITH ROYALS
 AT FIRST BASE**

Secured from Boston Americans—Was
 Formerly with Princeton where he
 was Star among College Players

(Montreal Herald Wednesday)
 "Chic" Gandil has left the Mon-
 treal Club. Last night the popular
 first sacker left to take up his new
 duties with Clark Griffith's team and
 in his place comes a first baseman
 from the Boston American with the
 name of Gunning.

Gunning does not appear to have
 cut any very large figure with the
 Boston Americans last year, but he
 was at Princeton the year before last
 and was considered in collegiate ball
 circles to be one of the best in the
 game.

Manager Lush, of the Royals, who
 coached the Yale team for many
 years has had his eye on Gunning for
 a possible vacancy and failing the
 appearance of any more experienced
 first sacker recommended the man-
 agement to connect up with Gunning
 right away. The result is that Gun-
 ning will be along with the club in
 Buffalo today.

Manager Lush thinks so highly of
 the new man that he states that the
 club will not miss Gandil at all.

Cunningham, Akers and Decker, the
 players Montreal receives in exchange
 for Gandil are already at Buffalo and
 will report to Manager Lush on the
 arrival of the latter.

 P. Pieper of the local New England
 League baseball team, made the
 statement today that \$7,000 is the
 price offered by the management of
 the New York team for Pitcher Ray
 Keating, whose phenomenal record in

This is said to be the highest
 price ever paid for a New England
 League player by a major league
 club.
