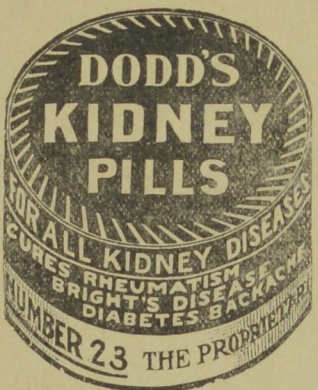

## CENTENARY OF NOTED SOLDIER

Washington, D.F., May 30—On this, the day universally observed as a day for honoring the memory of the soldiers who fought for the Union, it seems appropriate to call attention to the fact that the day also marks the one hundredth anniversary of the birth of Gen. John A. McClernand, one of the distinguished leaders of the Federal army. While his historic quarrel with Gen. Grant has cast something of a shadow over Gen. McClernand's fame, no historian has ever ventured to question Gen. McClernand's patriotism as a man or his ability as a soldier.

Gen. McClernand was born in Hardinsburg, Ky., May 30, 1812, but he spent the greater part of his life in Illinois. He was a fellow-townman and personal acquaintance of Lincoln. Successful in law and in politics, a man of undoubted ability and energy, it was natural enough that he should receive from the president a commission in the army at the beginning of the war. On order of the president, Gen. Grant placed McClernand in command of a corps. But for some reason the strongest ill-feeling existed between the two soldiers and Gen. Grant took the first opportunity, during the operations against Vicksburg, to relieve McClernand of his command, pending charges. The charges were not sustained and McClernand was restored to active command. He resigned from the army however, before the close of 1864.

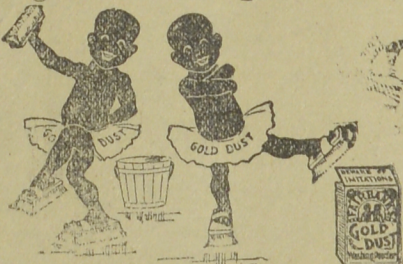
After the war Gen. McClernand was elected circuit judge for the Sangamon district in Illinois and in 1876 he was chairman of the Democratic national convention which nominated Samuel J. Tilden for the presidency. Gen. McClernand died at his home in Springfield, Ill., Sept. 20, 1900.

## HOW DARROW ARRANGED TO BUY UP JURORS

Los Angeles, Cal., May 29—Bert H. Franklin, former chief detective for the McNamara defence and now star witness for the prosecution in the trial of Clarence S. Darrow for alleged jury bribing, yesterday related what he declared to be the manner in which he and Darrow, then chief counsel for the McNamara brothers, attempted to bribe jurors in the trial of James B. McNamara.

"It's about time to get busy with the jury," Franklin quoted Darrow as saying to him on October 5, 1911. The next day he said Darrow gave him a cheque for \$1,000 to be used in buying the vote of Robert M. Bain, later became the first sworn juror in the trial. He said that he had known Bain for twenty years and that he had arranged for the corruption of the juror.

Franklin said he had entered the employ of the McNamara defence on June 29, 1911. Darrow, he said, wanted him to investigate all of the prospective jurors who might be called in the McNamara case as to their views regarding The Times explosion, the McNamaras and as to union labor. Copies of his reports on jurors, he said, were delivered to Darrow, Harriman, Scott and Davis, all attorneys for the McNamara defence.

Asked who paid him, Franklin said that Darrow usually did, but several times he received cheques from Harriman.

"Did you ever receive money from Darrow except for the purpose of paying your men?" asked Assistant District Attorney W. J. Ford.

"Yes, on October 6, I received a cheque for \$1,000 from Mr. Darrow" was the reply.

"Did you ever discuss the question of bribing jurors with Mr. Darrow?" was the next question.

"Yes, sir," said Franklin.

The witness said he discussed the question with Darrow first on October 5, which was six days before the McNamara trial was called.

"We were walking along the street," he said, "and Mr. Darrow made the remark: 'It's about time for us to get busy with the jury.' He said he wanted to talk with me about it."

"We talked the matter over," continued Franklin, "and had decided to spend \$5,000 on the jury, \$4,000 of which was to be given to jurors and \$1,000 to myself."

Franklin then told of taking the cheque for \$1,000 to the bank and depositing it in his own name. After drawing a cheque for \$500 against the deposit, he said, he went out to Bain's house.

On his second visit he found Mrs. Bain. He ascertained from her, he said, that there was a mortgage on their home and after learning whether the would look with favor on his proposition he said that he told her he would give Bain \$500 down if Bain agreed to comply with his conditions, and a further sum of \$2,000 after he had cast his vote for the acquittal of J. B. McNamara.

"Mrs. Bain said Bob was an honest man," continued the witness, "and there might be some trouble in getting him to agree to the proposition, but she thought he would do it."

At this stage court adjourned.

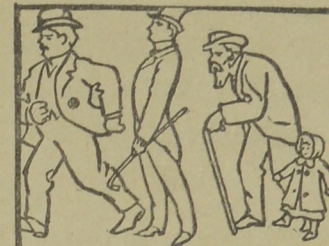
## MAINE MEMORIAL UNVEILED
