SUCCESSFUL IN WEST

GRAND ORANGE LODGE TO MEET IN 1913 AT ST. JOHN'S, Nfld.

Newfoundland Capital Selected on First Ballot—Choice Came as Surprise—Grand Lodge has Completed Business

ELECTIONS RESULTED IN FEW CHANGES IN OFFICERS

The Grand Orange Lodge of British America which has been in session in this city since Wednesday afternoon closed at one o'clock this afternoon. Today's session was occupied largely with alterations to constitutions and bylaws which was continued from last evening. The election of officers also took place and it was decided that in 1913 the Grand Lodge should meet in St. John's Newfoundland. The decision with regard to the place of next meeting came as a surprise as Hamilton, Ont., had been conceded generally to be the city most favored. A very strong plea was made on behalf of the Newfoundland city, however, and proved effective. St. John's being decided upon as the first ballot. The other cities proposed were Hamilton and Ottawa.

SUMMER SCHEDULES GO INTO FORCE ON RAILWAYS SUNDAY

On the I. C. R. the Usual Summer Changes have been made—Express will Arrive Two Hours Earlier than before

CHANGES ON CANADIAN PACIFIC ARE SLIGHT

On both Canadian Pacific and Intercolonial Railways the summer time-tables go into force at midnight Saturday. The new time-tables have arrived but on neither line are there any marked changes, the departures and arrivals of trains being about the same as last summer.

CANADIAN PACIFIC CHANGES.

The changes in time-table as announced by the local C.P.R. officials, are only three in number. The train connecting with the evening express would Montreal and Boston express will leave at 5.50 p.m., instead of 5.45 p.m. The train connecting with the east-bound morning Boston and Montreal express will arrive at 11.55 a.m., instead of 11.50 a.m. The train connecting with the east-bound night Boston express will arrive at 10.50 p.m., instead of 10.40 p.m.

INTERCOLONIAL CHANGES.

The new time-table of the Intercolonial Railway provides for several changes. The mixed train for Loggieville will leave at 5.00 a.m., instead of 5.45 a.m., but there is no change in the time of departure of the express or suburban trains. The mixed train from Loggieville will arrive at 4.00 p.m., instead of 4.30 p.m., and the express from Loggieville at 11.25 a.m., instead of 1.20 p.m. In the suburban service the only change in arrival is in the case of No. 313, which will arrive at 7.45 a.m., instead of 8.45 a.m.

The heavy rain which began Wednesday afternoon continues and is general. The river has risen about a foot and reports by telegraph are to the effect that the rise is general at all points. Reports of damage to roads and bridges in the country are beginning to come in and will increase in number. The rainfall up to this morning was about four inches and has been larger than at any time for years.

CANADIAN DENTAL ASSOC. AT HAMILTON NEXT WEEK

The annual meeting of the New Brunswick Dental Society will take place in this city on June 17th and 18th Monday and Tuesday. About ninety delegates are eligible to attend but the attendance, it is expected will be between fifty and sixty. Dr. F. L. Bonnell of St. John is president. The sessions of the society will be held in the Y.M.C.A. Hall, York Street. A committee of local dentists are making arrangements with regard to the meeting of the society and the program will be announced shortly. The society last met here about eight years ago.
