 Boxer who was in Good Shape--Crowd Strongly
 against Ferguson--Sandy Looked Good from very
 Start of Bout

Sandy Ferguson continued his
 "come back" campaign at the Cen-
 tral A. C. last night and he was
 again a winner, getting the decision
 over Sailor White of New York in
 their 10-round bout.

It was after over an hour's delay
 that the big fellows got into the ring,
 as they had an argument with the
 club officials, who finally agreed with
 the boxers in their contention.

White looked small compared to
 Sandy, but there was only about 10
 pounds difference in the weights.
 White weighing 205 and Sandy 15.
 Sandy was again in good shape and
 so was White, the latter proving a
 tougher customer than was supposed
 at the start. It looked as if Sandy
 was going to make a quick finish, for
 about half a minute after the first
 round started Sandy nearly floored
 White with a right and left to the
 jaw.

After that, White did some good
 blocking and Sandy found it hard to
 land either hand.

QUICK TO CLINCH

Sandy was there with his old
 clinching tactics, and when White
 stung him with a left in the face or
 jaw, as he did many times, Sandy
 was quick to go into a clinch.

At times there was little action,
 the pair standing looking at each
 other to make a lead.

In the second session, White forced
 matters and sent Sandy's head back
 many times with stiff left hooks and
 jabs in the face. Sandy jabbed White
 a few times in the face with the left,
 but was countered on the body.

In the fifth round it looked again
 as if Sandy was going to win. White
 had jabbed him a few times and
 Sandy got a bit riled and went after
 White, jabbing and hooking the left
 to face and shooting the right to the
 head. He finally sent the left and
 then the right to the jaw and White
 went to the mat.

TRIED TO WIND IT UP

Sandy tried hard to wind up the
 affair but White covered up well and
 Sandy could not get over a decisive
 punch.

Sandy got his left working well in
 the next session and poked White sev-
 eral times in the face. He got some
 stiff counters on the body and face in
 return. Sandy hooked his left to the
 jaw and body and landed a stiff
 right uppercut toward the close of
 the round.

White planted his left several times
 on Sandy's face in the seventh ses-
 sion, but Sandy came back with left
 stabs and a right uppercut. In the
 next round Sandy landed some stiff
 jabs and crossed the right to the side
 of the head, but White gave him some
 stinging returns.

LOOKED GOOD FOR SANDY

In the 10th round it looked again
 as if Sandy was going to stop White.
 After White had hooked a hard left
 to Sandy's jaw, the latter rushed
 matters and with rights and lefts to
 the face and body he had White in a

bad way. White finally met Sandy's
 rushes with a hard left to the jaw
 that sent Sandy staggering for a
 second.

Sandy was back quick and was
 working both hands on White in rapid
 fashion when the gong sounded. San-
 dy was declared the winner.

The action of the large crowd was
 discouraging, for most of the fans
 were cheering for White.
