St. John, May 4.—The market this week hesitated in anticipation of the quarterly statement of United States Steel, which came out after the closing of the market on Tuesday last, showing that the earnings on the common stock were not sufficient to pay the dividend for the quarter by about \$6,000,000.

The statement of the Steel Corporation for the first quarter of the current year presents poor prospects for earnings in the current quarter. Even if earnings reach \$25,000,000 a gain of approximately \$7,200,000 over the first quarter, they will hardly be sufficient to cover dividend requirements.

There has been quite a lot of bullish talk on Copper stocks lately and from sources which are considered reliable we are informed that while the metal will probably hover in the vicinity of 16 cents this price is sufficient to provide the Copper companies with a good margin of profit, especially those whose operating expenses and cost of production is low. Amalgamated Copper, Anaconda, Nevada Consolidated and Utah are all well spoken of and while there may be recessions in the market, due to liquidation, it is probable that with the staple price for the metal, increased dividends by the Copper companies will be in order.

RIO DE JANEIRO.

This stock has enjoyed a sharp ad-

vance this week, making a new record on buying from London. There has been talk of some shorts having been caught in the stock but apart from this, people are very optimistic as to the future of this company. Their earnings are large and they could easily pay a higher rate of dividend, which no doubt, will come some time this year. While the stock may react from present prices, we consider it a good purchase on reactions.

DETROIT UNITED.

There is a better feeling in the Street in regard to this stock. Their earnings are good and there is a feeling that they will eventually adjust their differences with the city, which seems to be the only thing that is holding this stock back.

At present prices it returns over 7 per cent, and we think for a hold it will show purchasers a good profit.

DOMINION IRON.

There is no doubt but that the public seems to have more confidence in this stock and while it may have reactions from time to time, we think it will see much higher prices. We expect the government will take some action in regard to protecting the interests of the Steel industries, and with the outlook of an improvement in the Steel business, we consider the stock a purchase on any setback from the present level.
