WANT LARGER MARKETS

The citizens of Edmonton, in their address of welcome to His Royal Highness the Duke of Cornwall, a few days ago, declared for an increase in the British preference and they also took occasion to impress upon His Royal Highness that the demand for larger markets was a very urgent one in the west. The address read by the mayor said in part:

"For many years Canadians have demonstrated to the world their attachment and loyalty to the Motherland, by giving a decided preference and a decided ease of entrance to British wares and British manufactures, and we in Western Canada at all events are willing—nay, anxious—to further emphasize our practical loyalty by advocating a further increase of that preference. We believe that such increase would be mutually beneficial to Canada and the British Isles. Cognizant, however, of the fact that this young nation, mainly agricultural, is but on the very threshold of its tremendous possibilities as to production, it is incumbent upon us, if we are true to our best interests, to use all lawful endeavors to enlarge our commercial bounds in order that ready markets may be obtained for the ever-increasing products of the soil, to the end that our people may know that they are subject only to fair commercial and economic laws, and that the very best results may be obtained for them, and thus only shall content and loyalty rest upon a permanent and abiding basis."

Eastern Chronicle:—At long last Premier Borden has done something to make his friends jump with joy—he has been right perky before half a dozen women in London who called on him to get his views on the votes for women question. Why, he was just as bold before those women as a three months' old rooster before a bunch of sparrows. Besides being proud of his bravery they were exceedingly glad that he has done something he cannot take back. Great is Premier Borden for if he could not construct a navy to defend his own people in Canada he can be real sassy to half a dozen women in London. To contrast him with Sir Wilfrid Laurier, who could not sass a bunch of women if he tried would be sacrilege in the eyes of a Tory.

Victoria Times:—Perhaps in nothing more than his attitude on the naval question has Mr. Borden manifested so much inaptitude as in first issuing an invitation to being "a committee of experts" to Canada to "make speeches in many places," to explain to "expectant Canadians what imperial responsibility means," and as soon as he saw how his action would be resented in Canada, wriggling out of responsibility by cabling that such invitation could be officially tendered only by the council of his government.

The sidewalks of Broadway New York, have become too narrow to accommodate the traffic thereon, so the civic officials are engaged in lopping off several thousand feet of encumbrances. The Montreal Gazette says:—"Montreal will soon have a similar problem to deal with. On some of the thoroughfares there is hardly room to move at certain hours and the situation is growing worse." How about Halifax?

Nationalist members of parliament who a few months ago were going about the country declaring that they had to shoot the British flag full of holes in order to breathe the air of liberty were right on hand to participate in the welcome to Premier Borden at Quebec yesterday. It is not a question of principle with them now, it is a question of sharing in the spoils of office.

The total attendance at the St. John Exhibition to date is 77,399. That's going some.

Compulsory arbitration of trade disputes is strongly opposed by British trade unionism, who yesterday at the Trades Union Congress at Newport, G. B., cast an overwhelming vote against the adoption of the principle. Nearly 2,000,000 members of trades unions are represented by the 500 delegates attending the Congress, which began its sessions on Sept. 2.

A report that Hon. W. S. Fielding is shortly to reënter politics is greatly agitating the Tory press. The ex-finance minister is one of Canada's most gifted statesmen and his re-entry into public life would be warmly welcomed by Canadians irrespective of party.

Henry Bourassa does not appear to have been in evidence at the reception to Premier Borden at Quebec yesterday, but his lieutenant, Armand Lavergne, was there.

J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEW

St. John, Sept. 7.—The exhibition made by the securities market during the week has not been impressive and the same professional, narrow, uninteresting character remains unchanged. Lack of pressure on the one hand and indifference on the part of buyers on the other have been productive of stagnation. Underlying all, however, is a firmness of undertone and a spirit of optimism promising eventually better things.

Money has tightened considerably, a good feature in itself—as indicating a larger demand for commercial purposes, but at the same time suggestive of more difficulty in financing large speculative commitments and probably throwing the demand over to low rather than high priced securities.

Crop conditions seem to have passed entirely the problematical stage and prosperity on that score is assured on a scale far in excess of the usual.

Politics are getting warmer and the campaign will soon be in full swing. When a conservative state like Ohio adopts policies such as a recall and referendum, it is suggestive that the public mind is in a receptive frame for the advanced ideas of the experimentalists and will further encourage the politicians to efforts along radical lines.

Until the campaign closes playing to the socialistic and radical galleries will be the policy of all parties and during that period investors, business and speculation will be subjected to many chills.

Were it not for this influence, a position on the buying side could be logically and safely taken, but the danger exists and the narrowness of the market in view of these uncertainties aggravates the element of risk involved.

MONTREAL POWER.

There was no special news to account for the decline in this stock, other than stop orders being caught, and after the big advance this stock has had, it was only a natural reaction. Their earnings are steadily increasing and the stock should be a purchase on any further reaction from present prices.

RICHELIEU & ONTARIO.

After a weak closing last week there were a good many stop orders put in and further selling being in evidence.

DOMINION IRON.

This stock while not very active, has held very firmly around 65 and there is talk of their receiving something from the government when the session opens. It is estimated that London holds 45,000 shares of this stock now and they have been buyers in this market this week. The stock is a good one for a long pull.

TORONTO RAILS.

This stock is one of the best purchases on the list. Their earnings are good, and as an eight per cent. stock it is selling below its intrinsic value compared with other stocks paying the same rate. There was good buying of the stock at 140 and it rallied a few points easily on small sales.

S.O.

This stock will sell X. D. 3 1/2 per cent. on the 20th September, and as they will show over 10 per cent. earned this year against under 6 per cent. last year and as their earnings should steadily increase, owing to the large crops along the road, the stock looks attractive at present prices.

RUSSIA REMEMBERS BORODINO

Moscow, Sept. 7.—Modern Russia looked backwards 100 years today and bowed low to the warriors who met the French legions in the sanguinary battle of Borodino, the fight which greatly weakened the strength of the invaders and led later to the disastrous retreat of Napoleon from Moscow. The battle was fought 100 years ago today near the little village of Borodino not a great distance to the west of Moscow, where an elaborate programme of festivities was carried out today in celebration of the centennial anniversary.

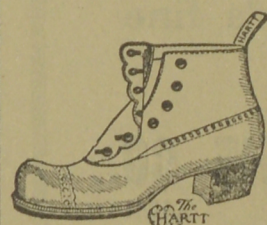

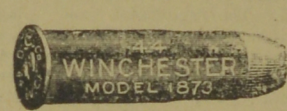
