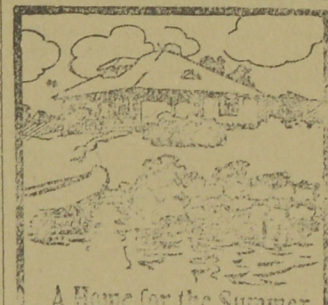

BADEN WON
CHARTER OAK PURSE
AT HARTFORD

Esther W. Made Him go Five Heats
to win--Other Interesting Races
on Hartford Track

Hartford, Conn., Sept. 5--The Massachusetts bred stallion Baden, won the \$10,000 Charter Oak purse this afternoon in a slashing five-heat race. The victory of the grandson of Bingen was clean and decisive and it stamps him the best stake trotter now racing.

He won the first two heats as he liked from Ruth McGregor in 2:08 1/2, 2:09 1/2, lost two to Esther W in 2:06 1/2, 2:08 1/2, then came back and won over a seldy track in 2:10.

Not in the nearly thirty years that have passed since Director won the first Charter Oak, has there been a more interesting race than that of this afternoon.

The Charter Oak was not the only race this afternoon worth seeing, as both the two and three-year-old trots were interesting, while the duel between Dorsh Medium and Zaeine, driven by amateurs, was a classic.

Frank Jones of Memphis, sat behind the Medium mare and John Dodge of Middletown, N. Y., piloted the Denver four-year-old. The pair raced four heats and Dorsh Medium out her record to 2:07 1/2 and Zarrine touched 2:07 1/2. As expected, Dorsh Medium won but she had to trot faster and go longer.

The Memphis reinsman won his heats, as Geers did with Dorsh at Roadville, by rushing through the stretch. In the third heat Zarrine had a lot of brush herself and in trying to match it Dorsh over-stepped herself, making a bad break. The fourth heat was trotted after the shower, but even then the final quarter was in 30 1/2 seconds.

Dillon Axworthy won the two-year-old trot, cutting his record to 2:13 1/2 in the second heat. His relative, Nathan Axworthy, was always a comfortable second.

Axworth, a son of Guy Axworthy, 2:08 1/2, and Miss Calita, by Bingen, 2:06 1/2, owned and bred by J. O. Winston of Kingston, N. Y., won the 3-year-old trot in 2:13, 2:12 1/2. In this well-bred, handsome young stallion, Murphy has a trotter that is likely to be a factor in the futurities this fall.

CABEL WON ON 2.18 PACE
AT LEWISTON MEET

Lewiston, Me., Sept. 5--The closing day of the racing at the Maine State Fair brought to a successful conclusion the contests, which, on account of Monday's rain, were crowded into three days. There were three races on the card.

The 2:23 trot was the second race of the week to require more than three heats. Lady Tilley, a fleet daughter of the great Todd, acted badly in the first heat and finished last, but after she got to going there was brought to it.

In the 2:18 pace the judges thought Lawrence did not drive Cheerful Charlie to win in the first heat and put Bob Waite up for the second. Though he forced Cagel to go the mile in the fastest time of the week, he didn't win it and Lawrence was permitted to return to the sulky for the final heat. The 2:22 was won in straight heats by Tornado.

Fredericton took yesterday's game from the Marathons and the score, 5-3, shows pretty well the relative strength of the teams as they played in the first contest of the series. Harrington had the locals in hand at all stages and did not have to work very hard, the hitting ability of his opponents yesterday being limited to six scattered hits. Jordan pitched good ball for the locals except in the seventh, when the visitors connected for two singles, a double and a home run. Only three hits were made off Jordan in the other eight innings.

Ganley put up a good game at center for Fredericton, while L. Conley left field, and Fitzgerald, catcher, each retired four men. The Greeks lacked snap. O'Donnell had good chances to throw en out at first by putting on a little speed but he had the strolling habit and didn't seem to care. In one instance specially his failure to get a slow grounder and put the runner out at first was absolutely inexcusable and he batted very poorly. O'Brien had two errors, which helped the Fredericton's total and they were mostly the result of poor judgment. One was glaring. Pinkerton, too, handed a pass to the visitors. There were errors on both sides but Fredericton was able to hit when hits meant runs and that is what counts. Winters' friends, and he has many of them here, were sorry that he was not in the batting form he displayed earlier in the season.

GAME IN DETAIL

Fredericton made two in the first. Wildes singled. Pinkerton fumbled Ganley's grounder and Ganley was safe. Wildes going to third. B. Conley died to Winter. L. Conley singled, scoring, scoring Wildes and Ganley and was caught trying to take two bases. O'Donnell to McGovern to O'Brien.

The visitors did not get another hit until the sixth, when Harrington singled and scored on O'Brien's wild heaving of B. Conley's grounder. The "Caps" made the seventh their big inning. Hoyt singled. Fitzgerald hit safely. Ramsey sacrificed, Winter by Dutton. Hale cleared the bases with a double and was caught trying to take third. Fraser to O'Brien to Winter. Harrington hit over left field fence for this circuit. Wildes died to Pinkerton.

O'Brien opened for the locals with a double, Winter died to B. Conley, Fraser hit to right and was safe on Hale's muff. O'Brien taking third. Pinkerton singled, scoring O'Brien.

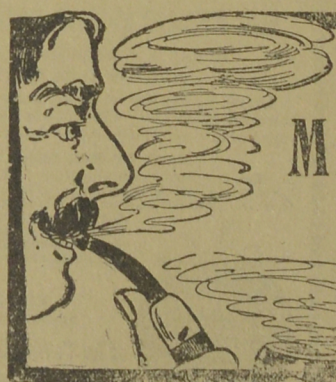
