Sea-Captain Robbed of Over Five Hundred Dollars at Newcastle—Alleged Thieves Being Sought by Police

WANTED MEN HAVE
BEEN IN TROUBLE BEFORE

The local police received word this morning from Newcastle to the effect that a sea captain had been robbed at that town and that those suspected of the robbery might be on the I.C.R. express due here at 11.25 a.m. The names of the men suspected are James Phalen and Clarence Wright. Their victim it is understood was under the influence of liquor and was in company of these men when his money was taken. The thieves are said to have got \$550. Both have unsavory reputations and have figured before in theft cases.

Chief of Police Hawthorne is in St. John today and in his absence Policeman Chapman went to Gibson and boarded the I.C.R. train on its arrival there. No persons corresponding in appearance to the men who were wanted were on the train and the conductor stated that a commercial traveller was the only one who had come from Newcastle or any station near that place.

The suspects evidently have gone in another direction.

POTATOES DROPPED IN
PRICE THIS MORNING

Country Market for Week-end was Largely Attended—Good Variety of Produce Offered

There was a largely attended country market this morning and a good variety of produce was offered. The outstanding feature of the market was the slump in the price of potatoes which dropped below \$1 per bbl. Butter also eased off a little while eggs remained about the regular price.

INDIAN CHIEF ARRESTED

Joseph Paul, Chief of the Melicete Indians was arrested at his home in Upper Gagetown early this morning by Sol Brooks, Indian policeman of the St. Mary's Reserve. He was brought to this city by steamer but the charge against him not being pressed he was allowed to go. He was charged with assault on an aged woman of the St. Mary's Reserve, named Mrs. Brooks. The offense was committed on August 24th but the warrant was not issued until yesterday. It is said that as a result of the case an effort will be made to have Chief Paul removed from office. Some of the Indians have expressed the opinion that the elected head of the tribe should not be in a position to have such a charge made against him.

MAY DISSOLVE.

Rumor has it that members of a legal firm of this city, both of whom have taken prominent and active part in politics for some years past, may dissolve partnership at an early date. Disagreement over the apportionment of the firm's work is said to be the cause of the trouble.

ROBERT KAY GORDON NEW
PROFESSOR OF ENGLISH

Senate of University of New Brunswick Make Appointment of Successor of Prof. F. P. Day Who Goes to Pennsylvania—New Member of Faculty Graduate of Toronto and Oxford Universities—Comes to U. N. B. Highly Recommended

Dr. C. C. Jones, Chancellor of the University of New Brunswick announced this morning that the University senate had appointed Robert Kay Gordon, M.A., of Toronto to the chair of English Language, vacant by the resignation of Prof. F. P. Day who will leave on Tuesday for Pittsburgh, Pa., near which city he has taken a position on the staff of an important educational institution. Mr. Gordon has been appointed to the chair named and is expected to arrive here next week.

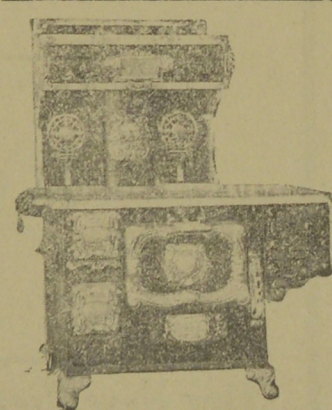

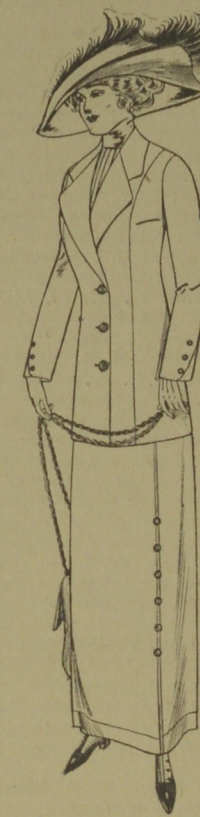

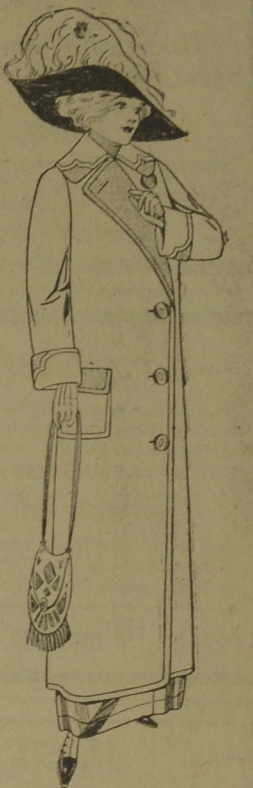
