## DISGRACEFUL SQUABBLE IN WINNIPEG COURT

Winnipeg, Oct. 21—Provincial Police Magistrate McMeilen, on Saturday morning sentenced two Winnipeg lawyers, W. H. Trueman and E. J. McMurray, to ten days in jail on the charge of stealing a court document, but later released them on their own recognizances and bound them over to appear next Friday morning.

This was the outcome of a general mixup in which the magistrate, the two lawyers and the police were engaged.

The trouble started over the J. J. Sullivan case, in connection with the MacDonald by-election. Mr. Trueman rose to address the court, and after securing possession of the information papers, said he wished to make a copy of it. The magistrate then called on the provincial police to arrest the two lawyers, and handed out the above sentence.

Hugh McMeilen, another lawyer, engaged by Trueman on the spot, declares the magistrate threatened to hit him over the head with a chair if he did not get out of the court room. Feeling is running high on both sides in connection with the various cases arising out of the recent by-election.

The W. H. Trueman referred to in the above despatch is a well known former St. John barrister.

### A MAGISTRATE WHO DISGRACES THE BENCH

Winnipeg, Oct. 21—Additional particulars of the struggle in Magistrate McMeilen's court on Saturday states that the trouble arose over the Magistrate seeking to prevent Mr. Trueman from getting a copy of the information.

The Magistrate demanded the paper and Trueman said that he wished to make a copy of it, and refused to give it back. The Magistrate said, "I will leave the court and have you up for stealing the document." Trueman still kept the paper. The Magistrate came down from the bench and ordered the police to arrest Trueman, but none of them moved. The Magistrate then rushed at Trueman and tried to forcibly take the paper from him, shouting, "Put that man in the lockup, give him ten days for stealing a document." Still the police watched the wrestling match between the Magistrate and the lawyer.

### CALLED ON THE POLICE

As the Magistrate called for help, Provincial Constable John Parr walked over and laid his hand on Trueman's arm, but made no attempt to take the paper from him. This Automobile Inspector McNamara and David Brown, who is a C. P. R. Constable, rushed a ruse the room, seized Trueman violently and tried to take the paper from him.

Trueman tried to press the paper to E. J. McMurray, another lawyer who was standing near, but was unable to do so. Constable Brown twisted Trueman's arm violently, and finally the lawyer said, "You can take the paper," whereupon the Magistrate snatched it. He was led away by the Court Clerk to his private room, and as he went he shouted, "Arrest both those men." McMurray asked for the arrest to be properly made.

NICE TALK FROM THE BENCH  
 The Magistrate retired for a few moments, came back and addressed both lawyers:

"You blackguards, you have no sense; you have no law."

McMurray—"You've hit it on the head; we have no law here."

Magistrate McMeilen—"You thin livered brutes, you mean sneak thieves, you must remain here in court until I am ready to let you out."

Trueman moved forward as if to pass from the court, when the Magistrate raised his arm wildly and seized a heavy chair as if to strike at him, but was restrained by his clerk and others, and forced into his private office. Brown, the C. P. R. constable used abusive language toward both lawyers, threatening to "lay them out."

E. J. McMurray at first took no

active part in the argument, but when he saw Trueman surrounded by Constables Parr, McNamara and Brown, all the men holding him; while at the same time Brown tried to twist his wrist and seize the paper which he was holding in his left hand, he leaped across the floor and scattered the three men, who, however, quickly surrounded the two lawyers. Brown let go of Trueman, and turned his attention to McMurray, who, however, pushed him aside. Two of the other court hangers-on, however, surrounded McMurray, who was then held fighting with his back against the wall of the court room. Magistrate McMeilen was then forcibly taken to his private office, shouting, "Arrest them, arrest them!" He, however, came out again almost at once as Trueman was putting on his coat.

MR. TRUEMAN'S RESTRAINT  
 "You don't leave this courtroom," he shouted, his voice quivering with rage. He put his hand up and pushed Trueman back, and the latter, thinking he was about to strike him, raised his hand, his face as white as a sheet. For a second it looked as though he was going to smash the Magistrate in the face, but he restrained himself.

"You thieves, you miserable thieves," cried the Magistrate. "Arrest them, you too," (referring to McMurray.) He saw Sullivan in a chair at the railing, and quickly he turned on him. "Did you take any part in this; did you? did you?" Sullivan neither arose from his chair nor spoke.


