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### SHOULD BE INVESTIGATED

Commenting on the thug methods employed by the Roblin-Rogers machine during the recent bye-election in Macdonald, Man., the Halifax Chronicle says:

"One of the first duties which the Liberal Opposition at Ottawa should undertake when Parliament assembles next month is to demand that there shall be a thorough and searching investigation by a Committee of the House of Commons, into the methods employed on behalf of the Government forces in the recent bye-election in Macdonald. This is a matter which concerns not merely the people of Manitoba, and the constituency in which the contest was held; it is of vital concern to the people of the whole Dominion. Canada's reputation is at stake, and the right of free speech and the liberty of the subject must be vindicated."

"Manitoba long has had an unsavable reputation, taints of the corruption and trickery practised by the Roblin-Rogers gang in electoral contests in that Province. Their methods have become a by-word throughout the Dominion. Fair and honestly fought elections have become a thing of the past. They have relied wholly upon sinister 'devices,' in the use of which the Prime Minister of Manitoba and his comrade, the present Minister of the Interior, are past masters. Manitoba has been disgraced in the past by the corrupt exploits of the Conservative Party, its leaders and hirelings, but all these have been completely eclipsed by the far more profligate of justice and the brazen defiance of law and decency resorted to by the Borden Government forces, operating through the hirelings, and under the direction of the Roblin-Rogers machine in Winnipeg."

Senator Raoul Dandurand in a speech at Sorel on Tuesday dealt with the questions of reciprocity and the navy. He said that when he was in Europe he learned with surprise that the purchases of Canada from the United States last year were \$80,000,000 more than the previous year and that the purchase of Canada from Great Britain had only increased \$3,000,000. In view of the fact that the Conservatives had told the people of Ontario that any increase of trade with the United States would result in annexation, he expected to find them blue with fear when he returned to Canada. It did not seem to be worrying them much, however. He had then decided that it must be the fact that Canada had paid cash for her purchases that took away the element of danger. Had the \$80,000,000 been paid in kind that is in reciprocal exchange, we would have been annexed surely by this time.

Moncton Transcript: The Sackville Post seems to be in that happy position respecting the police magistracy of Moncton that whatever the Flemming government does is right. If it appointed Mr. A. N. Charters as The Post first announced, it was a splendid appointment; but according to its revised opinion it will equally as splendid a course when it did not appoint Mr. A. N. Charters but did appoint Mr. C. A. Steeves instead. It is a clear case of "how happy it could be with either if 't'other dear character were away." Mr. Charters was its first love for the position and then in his day of adversity like the conscienceless flirt The Post turns its back upon him and makes up to the supplanter. The Nationalist cabinet ministers from Quebec took no part in the Richelieu bye-election. They left it all to Sir Rodolphe Forget and now they are in a position to lay the blame for the defeat at his door.

### A LIBERAL TRIUMPH

The Federal bye-election in the County of Richelieu, P. Q., yesterday to fill the vacancy caused by the unseating of Mr. P. J. Cardin, Liberal, resulted in his triumphant reelection by a majority in excess of three hundred over Mr. E. A. Morgan, Conservative. The Tories made a desperate effort to redeem the constituency and must be deeply chagrined over the result. Sir Rodolphe Forget, M. P., a Montreal millionaire took charge of their campaign, and by a lavish expenditure of cash and reckless promises of public works sought to stampede the electors into voting for the Tory candidate. At a public meeting in Sorel on Tuesday evening he declared emphatically that he had a pledge from the Borden government that a marine railway would be constructed in the county and he further declared that if the promise was not kept he would ask Mr. Morgan to resign his seat. The voters of the constituency with a spirit of independence which some of the English speaking countries can afford to emulate, have rejected Sir Rodolphe's bribe, and have saved him the trouble of calling upon Mr. Morgan to resign his seat. So sure was Sir Rodolphe that bribery and corruption would carry the day for the Tories that he offered to wager \$5000 that Mr. Morgan would win. A plucky Sorel Liberal accepted his offer and now Sir Rodolphe is out \$5000 in addition to a generous contribution to the Tory campaign fund. He has been taught a lesson which is to be hoped will not be lost upon him.

All honor to the Liberals of the old County of Richelieu. They have nobly stood by the old party and the old leader, and have voted no confidence in the Tory-Nationalist outfit now in control of affairs at Ottawa. To quote the words of Sir Wilfrid Laurier it is "the beginning of the end."

St. Andrews Beacon: A gentleman who recently visited one of the upper counties of the province told The Beacon that in one highly promising agricultural section he visited the farmers were so divided over politics that they refused to co-operate in carrying on a cheese factory. When striking examples of this kind are presented it shows the great loss the province is suffering by reason of the people taking their politics and politics too seriously. The brand of party politics that will thus divide a community and prevent the carrying on of an important industry is one that we should strive to get away from as far as possible. It is a curse.

Sir Rodolphe Forget, M. P., the Montreal financier wagered \$5000 that the Tory candidate would win in Richelieu. He also promised that the government would build a marine railway if the people elected the Tory candidate Sir Rodolphe lost his \$5000 and the county will not get the marine railway.

Hon. J. D. Hazen visited Sorel a short time ago to straighten out a tangle in the Tory camp over patronage matters. As Sorel gave a Liberal majority yesterday of 264, it is to be presumed that the minister's mission was not altogether successful.

Mr. Morgan, the Tory candidate in Richelieu attended the big Liberal rally at Sorel on Tuesday and tried to interrupt one of the speakers. He was told to shut up and failing to do so, he was seized by several stalwart Liberal electors and led away to a place of safety.

Lethbridge Herald: It is said Borden will make an emergency contribution of three Dreadnoughts to the British navy, following which it is more than likely Henri Bourassa will contribute three axes for the removal of the heads of the Nationalist members of the government.

Montreal Herald: They complain because Sir Wilfrid talked more of the victory he was going to win in Richelieu than of the loss he sustained in Macdonald. That is how a man gets to be an optimist and stays one.

"They can take power away from us," Sir Wilfrid Laurier told the electors of Sorel, "but they can never take away the fifteen years of happiness and prosperity which we chine in Winnipeg."

## MEXICAN REBELS PUNISHED WITH DEATH

Vera Cruz, Mex., Oct. 25.—Two of the captured officers of the staff of Felix Diaz were shot by the federal troops at half past ten last evening a few hours after being sentenced to death by summary court martial. The execution was carried out with absolute secrecy, their names were Major Zagate and Major Cuesta. Public opinion against Diaz is so strong that it is thought a sentence of death may be pronounced on him as well as on all their officers and government officials who joined his cause and were captured. The troopers however, who rebelled will in all likelihood not be punished. Felix Diaz himself is to be brought before the court martial this afternoon.

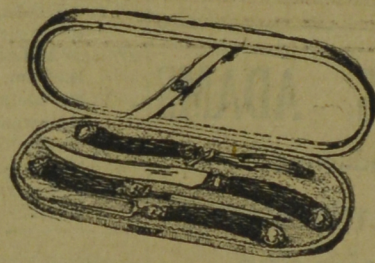
