SOUTH AFRICAN VETERANS ATTENDED DIVINE SERVICE

The members of the York County South African Veterans' Association attended divine service at the Brunswick Street Baptist Church last night and heard an able discourse upon "Man's Right to Rule," by the pastor, Rev. Dr. J. H. MacDonald. The music was by the Men's Choir, assisted by a male quartette consisting of Messrs. McLean, Edney, Cooper and Staples. The members of the Association were strong numerically and wore their medals.

THE SERMON.

The sermon was founded on Genesis 1:26, "And God said: Let us make man in our own image and likeness and let him have dominion over all the earth."

"It is only," said the preacher, "as he bears the stamp of the divine image that he takes his place not only as the crown of creation, but as its king."

After discussing the exercise of human authority over nature and the lower orders of creation, Dr. MacDonald proceeded to consider the conditions of leadership in the realm of men. Chief of these conditions, he pointed out was self-mastery. The necessity of self-control is based on the very nature of our being. We are made up of different faculties of different degrees of value and dignity. It is like an army where there are many ranks from commander-in-chief to private soldier. How would it be if in the ranks every soldier were to act on his own initiative, no man waiting for the supreme word of command? Even if every man were brave and true the army would be in disorder and a prey to the enemy. The strength of an army consists in its discipline, the subordination of the lower to the higher. Every life is precisely like that, it is made up of various elements but all intended to be under the domination of the spirit. The body has its rights and is continually asserting itself, endeavoring to get the upper hand. There are powers of the spirit of different rank and these too, though not intrinsically evil, must be kept in place. It is easy then to see how no man can exercise the power of leadership unless he has first learned to exercise self-mastery and when he has learned that he has in a true sense dominion over everything. "Greater is he that ruleth his own

spirit than he that taketh a city."

NECESSARY QUALIFICATIONS
Dr. MacDonald pointed out some of the qualifications a country must have to maintain supremacy among the nations. A nation must keep pace with enlightenment and make her conquests over natural forces minister to the universal good, she must recognize the image and likeness of God in the inferior races. The country which deals unjustly or tyrannically with any of its subjects withholding from them their inalienable rights, however rich and powerful that nation may be, forfeits her right to national supremacy. "To him that overcometh and keepeth my works unto the end, to him will I give the power over the nations." Whatever Britain's failures are and have been, she has fulfilled these conditions in a marked degree. It is not at all surprising that her sons should come from afar and with gladness and devotion put themselves at her service to fight her battles. It is not a matter of surprise that our own Canadian young men should have been inspired to make an arduous journey across 7,000 miles of ocean to assist in fighting the battles of the motherland. It is not at all strange that there is born within every British subject, whatever his race, a hatred of oppression, a love of liberty and a supreme regard for the rights of others, which we have come to call British fair play. This is the spirit which gave inspiration at Paardeberg, where under the cover of darkness our men entrenched themselves within sixty-five yards of the crackling Mausers of Cronje's soldiers, leading to the surrender of that stubborn fighter and making the name of Canadian a synonym of resourcefulness and valor in the annals of modern warfare. This is the spirit which should animate us to be loyal to the best traditions of the nation in other respects—for peace has her victories no less than war—to fight the foes of the nation which are nearer home, intemperance, impurity and all forms of corruption for these are the foes which enslave men and take from them the marks of the Divine image.

The preacher concluded by an urgent appeal for loyalty and devotion to Jesus Christ through whose redemptive work the Divine image is restored and through whose leadership we shall have the dominion.

THE OLD BURYING GROUND

To the Editor of the Mail:
Sir:—Will you kindly permit me through the columns of your valuable paper to add a protest to the action of the City Council in deciding to erect a fire station on the site of the old burying ground on Brunswick Street. I have been a resident of the city ever since my birth, which represents a large number of years, and have watched the actions and conduct of the several City Councils for the past twenty-five years and I think this is without doubt the greatest exhibition of bad judgment that has ever occurred. There is perhaps one feature of the affair worthy of thought and that is that the recommendation to erect the station did not come from any alderman, a native born of this city, but was suggested and recommended by that would-be important immigrant, who has the honour to be a representative from King's Ward, Alderman Cruikshank. If this person understood the feelings of the people of this city to some small extent, and the sacred ties that bind them to this revered spot in our beautiful city, he would hesitate before he would make any recommendation such as he did, and I cannot believe that the feelings of the citizens with reference to this matter will be so utterly disregarded by the other aldermen as to permit this recommendation to be carried out. When it is considered that Ald. Cruikshank has only been a resident of this city for a very short time, and occupies a position where he is wholly dependent on the country for his support and does not enter into the commercial or business life of the city, it seems to me that he should be made to realize that the citizens of Fredericton will not submit to any dictation from him, especially when it comes to acting on his advice, in desecrating a part of this city which all citizens "respective of denomination" feel should be maintained and kept in good order by the city of Fredericton for all time to come.
