L.O.B.A. OPENING SESSION TUESDAY AFTERNOON

A considerable number of delegates to the Grand Orange Lodge of British America and allied organizations which will be in session in this city during the week, have already arrived and others will reach the city tomorrow. Between four and five hundred delegates and their relatives are expected to be here this week in attendance at the various meetings.

PROGRAM INCOMPLETE

Until the various bodies hold their opening sessions and some idea is obtained of the time that is to be occupied by business nothing can be done in the way of arranging for public entertainment of the visitors. The Grand Black Chapter will hold its opening session in the Y.M.C.A. Hall, York Street, at eight o'clock this evening. The business of this division of the Orange Order will probably require additional sessions tomorrow. The Ladies' Orange Benevolent Association will hold its opening session tomorrow afternoon at the Orange Hall, Queen Street, beginning at 2.30. This branch of the order will hold several sessions. The Grand Orange Lodge of British America will hold its opening session at the same hour 2.30 Tuesday. Its sessions will be held in the Knights of Pythias Hall, York Street, and will extend over several days.

LEGAL ACTION MAY BE TAKEN RE OLD BURYING GROUND

Vestrymen of Christ Church Parish to Meet Tomorrow to Consider Proposal to Erect a Fire Station on Old Protestant Graveyard--Terms of Original Grant from Crown said to Forbid use of Land for any other but Purposes of Burial

The vestrymen of Christ Church Parish will hold a meeting tomorrow evening at which action will be taken against the proposal of the City Council to erect a fire station in the Old Protestant cemetery. It is understood that a strong protest will be made to the Council against the erection of a fire station on that site and it was stated today by a leading member of the Parish Church that if it is necessary to do so legal measures will be taken to prevent the old graveyard being desecrated.

PREVENTED BY ORIGINAL GRANT

It is claimed by the vestrymen of the Parish Church that the original grant from the crown contains a clause which makes the deed a trust one for cemetery purposes only for ever and that the ground cannot be used for any other purpose without an act of legislation.

The clause in the original grant referred to reads as follows: "To have and to hold the said several lots or tracts of land and all and singular, other the premises hereby granted with the appurtenances unto the said rector, church wardens and vestry of the church aforesaid in the said Parish of Fredericton and their successors for ever, for the user following, namely, the said fifty-eight lots first above described as a glebe for the use, benefit and behoof of the rector, parson or minister of the said church for the time being for ever; the second lot above described to be for a burying ground and the third lot above described to be for a church yard for the use and benefit of the same church for ever--and to and for no other uses, intents or purposes whatsoever."

TRANSFER TO CITY.

When the grave yard was passed over to the city some years ago it was done with the idea that the city would keep it in order and the Church of England people as well as many other citizens and lot holders are expressing themselves very strongly about the proposal of the Fire Committee.

It is said that even while the pro-

posal does not go so far as to disturb any of the graves in this cemetery still it is most unseemly to erect a building there and the matter will be fought in a legal way if necessary.

Other representative bodies interested in this cemetery will also make their protest before the regular meeting of the City Council on Tuesday of next week.

YARMOUTH PAPER HAS WORDS OF APPRECIATION

Late Capt. Howland of Salvation Army Spoken of as a Superior Man--Funeral Saturday

Of the late Capt. Howland, of the Salvation Army, the Yarmouth Times says: "Captain Howland was superior in many ways to the average Salvationist. He was well educated speaker and possessed musical talent of a high order. He was born at Chatham, Kent County, England, and was 37 years old. He leaves a wife, whose health for several months has been very bad, and three small children. Just before coming to Fredericton, Captain and Mrs. Howland lost a child. The suddenly bereaved widow and children have the genuine sympathy of the people of Yarmouth. Mrs. Howland is a native of England, coming to Canada from a suburb of London. Mrs. Howland told The Times this morning that it was his custom when going out to kiss her but on that last occasion he kissed her twice, after which he left the house, never to return. During his walk to Rockville he passed several people, among them a number of children, to whom he spoke."

The funeral of the late Capt. Howland took place at St. John private ly on Saturday.

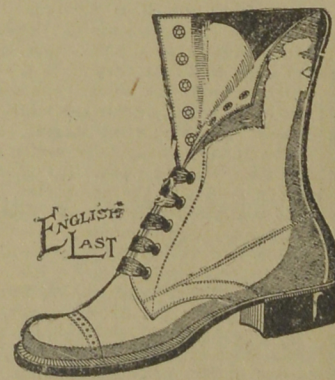
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
