GOVERNMENT CRITICIZED BY OPPOSITION LEADER

THE FISHERY QUESTION

It was surprising to him that no intimation was made in the address to the unsettled fishery question, another matter of paramount importance to the province. Was it because the hon. Minister of Marine had told the Premier that he had troubles enough at Ottawa and not to bother him about fishery questions from New Brunswick. He hoped that the Government would secure a settlement expediently, and carry out its promise made in this regard.

The Government told the House little of proposed legislation. His followers would give no factions opposition. No doubt considerable time would be occupied with the St. John Valley Railway question. In the recent bye-election in York the Government had made promises regarding the construction and operation of this railway.

TORY PROMISES.

Hon. Mr. Flemming—"We remember the election." Mr. Copp said he trusted his hon. friend also remembered the promises that were then made. The people were told that the railway would be constructed but would not be operated by the Intercolonial.

Hon. Mr. Flemming said Mr. Copp's statements were incorrect.

Hon. Mr. Murray stated that he had made the statement that the government would build the road and even if there were no co-operation from the federal government.

OPPOSED I.C.R. OPERATION.

Mr. Copp said that the newspapers supporting this government, until a short time ago, were strongly opposed to I.C.R. operation of the Valley

Railway. He read extracts from the Fredericton Gleaner, which he felt were inspired by the government, strongly objecting to Intercolonial operation. In an article in that journal on June 8th the public was told that forty per cent. of the earnings would not pay the interest on the bonds for the construction of the railway. If we are to be saddled with a great debt in the building of the railway, every elector should be consulted. He did not wonder that in view of the existing conditions, he heard rumblings from the North Shore and other sections of the province over the step that the government proposes to take to build the railway, involving a great debt—a burden that would bring ruin to the province.

The speaker noticed some changes in the administration since Hon. Mr. Hazen had retired. He believed every member of the House had a great regard for the ex-premier. He (Copp) had sat with him in the House for ten years and he trusted that Mr. Hazen would work for the benefit and advancement of his country while he was at Ottawa. In the changes necessitated by Mr. Hazen's retirement, he (Copp) felt sorry that his friend from York had been side-tracked for a younger man. He sincerely hoped that his friend would be spared to that time when the ambitions of other supporters would be satisfied and he would finally be given his reward.

In conclusion, he said that the members of the opposition would lend their assistance to the advancement of any practical legislation that would inure to the benefit of the people of the province.

Hon. Mr. Flemming followed in defence of the government and moved the adjournment of the debate, which was made the order of the day for the afternoon.

TO FORCE MANITOBA BILL THROUGH PARLIAMENT

(Continued from page one.)

If there were any movement for abolition of the tariff it would have come to a head during the time of the late government. However, both for the purpose of revenue and the promotion of industrial life, some sort of a tariff was essential for Canada. It was desirable therefore, to have the best sort of a tariff. In the past tariffs had been largely influenced by pressure from one source or another. It was desirable to take the tariff out of politics, but that would not be possible. However, it was desirable to deal with it so far from outside influences as was possible. Therefore it was proposed to create an independent commission, whose duty it would be to make a thorough inquiry into industries and report to the minister of finance. If there were to be tariff walls it was desirable to have them built as fairly as possible for all. That was what the government proposed to do with the assistance of this commission.

CARTWRIGHT'S CAUSTIC COMMENT.

Sir Richard Cartwright congratulated Hon. Mr. Loughheed upon his candor in stating that the purpose of the commission was to enable the government to put up this tariff.

Hon. Mr. Loughheed said: "My hon. friend must have misunderstood me. I made no such statement."

Sir Richard said he had so understood, but whether that had been said or not, there was no doubt but that is what would happen. Talk about taking the tariff out of politics was clap-trap. It always had been in politics and would continue to be a burning political question as long as Canada is Canada. A proper commission to inquire into the tariff he would approve of, but this proposal of the government seemed to him as unnecessary and mischievous. It was a design to place a screen between the public and the government.

"I have no doubt but that the tariff commissioners will be agents and tools of manufacturers to whom the present government owes its existence, and to whom I support they have to pay tribute."

Sir MacKenzie Powell said any proposal to take the tariff out of politics was absurd. In the last election the Conservatives had promised to create a tariff commission, and now proposed to do so. He did not agree that the representatives of the manufacturers' Association. It would, as the government promised, be a body which would obtain information which would properly guide the government in tariff making.

Sir Richard had claimed credit for the late government for British preference. However, in the case of many articles the preference had been accompanied by first raising the general duty and then granting a preference which left the duty charges against British goods higher than before. If he thought the tariff commission would be the tools of the manufacturers, he would vote against this bill. But he believed it would be a thoroughly independent body.

The discussion was continued by Senator Davis.

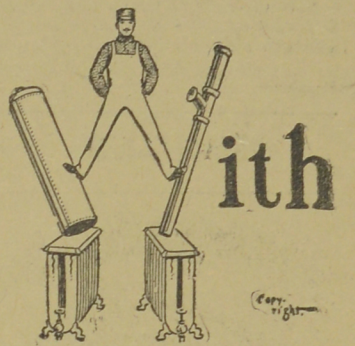
