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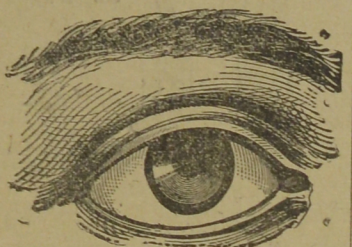

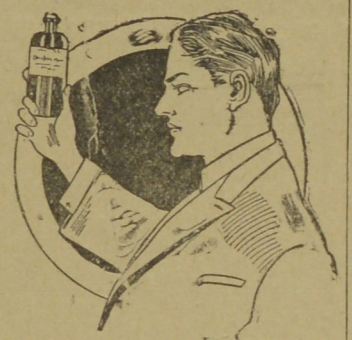

Chatham Won Hockey Championship of Province

Play-off at Sackville Last Night in N.B.H.L. Series
 Resulted in North Shore Team Trimming St. John
 ---Thousand People Saw Match---Play was Fast
 and Clean in Spite of Poor Ice

Sackville, N. B., March 7—Chatham are the hockey champions of the province, winning their laurels here tonight by a score of 7 to 5 over St. John. The match which was clean, fast and interesting throughout was witnessed by nearly 1,000 people who went away satisfied that they had got the worth of their money. From the first it was seen that the chances were with Chatham for while St. John had the better of the combination play, they were not quite as fast nor as aggressive as their opponents from the North shore town.

Play started with a rush and in a few minutes Godfrey notched one for Chatham. St. John followed suit, Gilbert doing the trick. Chatham kept on going, Wattling this time shooting the goal and later Godfrey netted the third.

Within the last three minutes of the first half St. John evened the score, Clawson notching one and H. McAvity the third. The first twenty minutes period thus ended, 3 to 3.

The second half was faster than the first half and at times was particularly interesting. Up and down the ice the players went now St. John seemed to have the advantage, then Chatham. At length Godfrey secured the puck on a pass from Synott and Chatham supporters had a chance to yell. Then it was St. John's turn to get busy and they bent all their energy to evening up the tally. After a time they succeeded, Gilbert shooting the goal. Chatham rained shot after shot on the St. John goal tender but luck and skill were with him and the puck failed to pass him. The second half ended 4 to 4.

According to arrangement, play

was now resumed for two five minute periods, the teams changing ends at the close of each period. In the first five-minute period there was something doing and no mistake. Both teams struggled hard for mastery, the game being a battle royal. Honors were with Chatham, Godfrey scoring, just after his return from suffering a penalty for tripping. Early in the second five-minute period Chatham notched two, then St. John tied and the game ended 7 to 5.

St. John was strong on defence, being superior to their opponents, who left their goals poorly protected. M. McAvity played a star game for St. John and Godfrey, and Milford carried off the honors for Chatham. Duncan, who played on the Chatham team, was the best stick handler on the ice. The ice was in good condition considering the soft weather and altogether the game was a good exhibition of hockey.

No one was seriously injured though the game was delayed five minutes on two or three occasions by slight injuries to players. "Shorty" Trites, of Moncton, who acted as referee gave excellent satisfaction. The line up was as follows:
