MONCTON CLERGYMAN ON KAY'S DISMISSAL

(Moncton Transcript)

The temperance meeting held in the Central Methodist Church on Sunday afternoon was well attended.

The Rev. J. L. Batty in opening his address referred to the meeting held on the preceding Sunday, and pointed out that that meeting had succeeded in directing public attention to a much greater extent to the questions.

The meeting had one good effect. It helped to unify the forces. The action of Mr. Sumner in rescinding the motion endorsing chief of police Rideout helped to unify the forces on the temperance side and he thought that that would make Chief Rideout's position secure, (applause) and the meeting also served to show unification on the other side.

Incidentally he referred to the reports in the St. John newspapers, The Telegraph and The Standard. One was on the Liberal side of politics and the other on the Conservative, and the people who read these papers thought they were getting independent views of public affairs, but to his surprise on reading these reports, he found that they were UTTERLY BIASED AND UNFAIR.

Even the name of the recorder of the resolution was omitted and that of the recorder alone given prominence. The Bible says the bitter and the sweet cannot come out from the same fountain and this was proven in the similarity of these two reports. On investigation he found that both reports one to a Liberal newspaper and the other to a Conservative emanated from the same newspaper office in this city. The reports of the meeting published in the two newspapers named were a disgrace to decent and fair journalism (Prolonged applause).

The dismissal of Mr. Kay from the police magistracy was made as the result of an agitation instigated by those who desire to sell liquor in the City of Moncton. There were some 420 signatures to a petition on which this investigation was granted and some of those petitioners were those who desire to sell the liquor. Among the petitioners there were some 75 who had been before the police magistrate on one charge or another. This was the character of the petition. This petition was sent to Fredericton many months before any action was taken. There was an election and it resulted in what is termed a clean sweep for the government. With party politics he had nothing to do but as a Methodist minister he had a right to see that fair play was extended to an officer of his church. The temperance issue was also an issue for which the church stood. After the election it was then decided with this petition with the result now known. He had had over the telephone.

urging fair treatment for an officer of his church, who was the police magistrate. Mr. Flemming said that Mr. Kay had been dismissed and that the matter was ended. Mr. Batty said that in reply to Premier Flemming he made these remarks, "I beg to disagree with you. The matter is not now ended; it is only just beginning," and so it is only just beginning. This issue will not down; it will continue until justice is done, and it will continue so long as I am associated with this church and the City of Moncton.

The audience heard him (Mr. Batty) ask the M.P.P. for this city in the Grand Opera House last Sunday the question as to whether he directly or indirectly caused or set in motion the machinery which led to this investigation and the dismissal of Mr. Kay and the local M.P.P. answered "No." All I have to say on that is this, with a full recognition of its force, "there is a big black lie somewhere behind this." (Prolonged applause.)

He (Mr. Batty) wrote to Mr. Flemming for a statement of the cause or the grounds on which Mr. Kay had been dismissed and he received a letter in reply from Mr. Flemming and after he read this reply Mr. Batty knew as much about it as before he asked the question. (Laughter.)

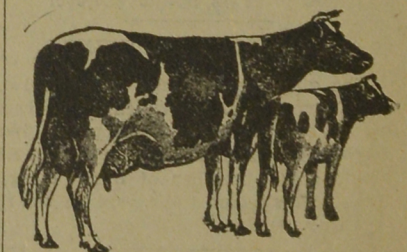
