DUKE OF FIFE DIES IN EGYPT

Assuan, Upper Egypt, Jan. 29—The Duke of Fife died at 6 o'clock this evening.

The Duke of Fife who has just died of pleurisy and congestion at Assuan, Upper Egypt, was a son-in-law of the late King Edward, whose daughter, the Princess Louise Victoria Alexandra Dagmar, he married in 1889. He succeeded his father as sixth Earl of Fife in 1873 and was created Duke on his marriage. He was born Nov. 10, 1849, and educated at Eton. He afterwards took a great interest in business and was a partner in the London banking firm of Sir Samuel Scott & Company, as well as vice-president of the British South African Company. He was a colonel of volunteers and deputy lieutenant of the Scottish Counties of Aberdeen and Banff. He was a Liberal member of parliament from 1874 to 1879. He leaves two daughters.

London, Jan. 29—The tragic end of the Duke of Fife's ill starred voyage to attend the consecration of the cathedral at Khartoum erected as a memorial to General Gordon, has given a great shock to British public. Although he showed no effects of his experiences in the wreck of the steamship Delhi on his arrival in Egypt, the duke's death is universally attributed to the exposures and shock resulting from that event.

A WILD SCREAM FROM
A BIGOTED TORY ORGAN

The Toronto Telegram (a newspaper supporting R. L. Borden's government) says: "A Government of trucklers and an Opposition of bigots and time servers at Ottawa—these stand shivering on the brink of E. A. Lancaster's resolution against the Ne Temere decree."

Canadians could not get a hearing for their objections to the Ne Temere decree last September. Clericalism was a foe that could be faced after "continentalism" had been defeated. The leaders of the Borden Government are as unwilling to have E. A. Lancaster carry the Ne Temere issue into the arena of parliamentary debate at Ottawa as the managers of the Borden campaign were to have D. C. Hossack carry the same issue into the arena of an electoral struggle in South Toronto.

THE PERILS OF SHIRKING

The Ne Temere issue is only dangerous if Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and his advisers try to run away from it.

The Borden Government cannot meet the Ne Temere issue by inciting its flatterers to speculate as to the motives of E. A. Lancaster, M. P. It may be that Mr. Lancaster's hatred of the Ne Temere decree has not been modified by the fate that isolated Mr. Lancaster from a portfolio in the Borden Government.

The question of motives may be left out of the discussion.

The motive that inspires E. A. Lancaster to RAISE THE NE TEMERE

ISSUE is as noble, patriotic and praiseworthy as any motive which may inspire Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden to EVADE THE NE TEMERE ISSUE.

The Borden Government should not provoke a warfare upon motives and records. Canadians hope and believe that the procedure of the Borden Government may be such as to cause them to forget the truths of history. These truths principally teach that Mr. Borden made up his Cabinet from among public men who are as free as Mr. Borden himself is free from the taint of respect for "Protestant ideals."

TYLED THE DOORS

The doors of the Borden Cabinet were tyled against enthusiasts who had opposed the prejudices of the French-speaking Canada and fully open to all the extremists who had outraged the principles of English-speaking Canada.

Toronto is represented at Ottawa by four pro-clerical Protestants of the class of 1896 and one non-clerical Roman Catholic. There is nothing in the careers of four of Toronto's federal members, especially Hon. George E. Foster and Hon. A. E. Kemp to suggest that these gentlemen care three straws about the principles that are assailed by the Ne Temere decree except in so far as these principles might operate against the fulfillment of their partisan or personal ambitions.

The Borden Government is designedly destitute of even one Cabinet Minister who represents the ideals of non-clerical Canadians in the same sense that these ideals were represented by N. Clark Wallace.

TRUTH IN A BITTER TAUNT

The record of the Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and of his colleagues with one possible exception, is emphatically pro-clerical. That record edges with the sharpness of truth the bitter taunt that "there is not one Protestant in the whole Borden Cabinet."

Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and his associates have all but unanimously proved themselves recreant to the ideals cherished by the non-clerical peoples of the Canadian electorate. Mr. Borden should be helped by timely knowledge of the solemn truth that opponents of clericalism regard Ministers from the English-speaking provinces as an aggregation of "Gallios," who "care for none of these things." Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and his Cabinet Ministers have not earned, and do not enjoy, the confidence of Canadians who put Protestantism before party. These Canadians despised and hated the pro-clericalism of the Laurier Government. They distrust the pro-clerical tendencies of Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden and all but one of his Cabinet Ministers from outside of Quebec.

This distrust can be removed. The proof that Mr. Borden, Mr. Foster, Mr. Kemp, Mr. Rogers, Mr. White, Mr. Cochrane & Co., are more friendly to non-clerical principles than their past careers would indicate.

THE PREMIER OF A FREE PEOPLE OR THE PUPPET OF A THEOCRACY

The Lancaster resolution will show whether Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden regards himself as a Premier of a theocracy.

E. A. Lancaster, M. P., should avoid the danger of having a great issue side-tracked by quibbles about Provincial rights and Federal jurisdiction. Let Mr. Lancaster move to strengthen the Criminal Code with amendments which will make it as impossible for the Pope's writs to run in Canada as in Germany. Such an amendment would enable Rt. Hon. R. L. Borden to meet the issue fairly and settle it for Canada as effectually as Emperor William settled the same issue for Germany.

Legislation that could set bounds to the excesses of ecclesiasticism would be welcomed by Canadians (Continued on page three.)
