

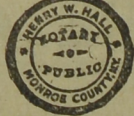

## GRAND CIRCUIT DATES HAVE BEEN REARRANGED

Next Week's Sale in New York Attracting Much Attention--Expected Hopple-rule will be Stricken from Books at Meetings of National and American Trotting Associations--Starting of Two Horses from one Stable may be Forbidden

Boston, Jan. 30--Readville and Rockingham have exchanged dates in the Grand Circuit and the crack harness horses will come to Boston for their first appearance in New England, then go to Salem, N. H. and from there to Hartford. The change was agreeable to both the Readville and Rockingham managements and was brought about by the desire to provide a better ship from Buffalo.

The Boston track now has the week of Aug. '18 and Salem that of Aug. '26. Possibly Owner-Manager Welch of Readville welcomed the shift with the thought that a week earlier in the season might get him clear of the rain that has harmed every Readville meeting in recent years.

Salem was anxious for the last week in August as this date is better for its fair position. Rockingham is going to have an agricultural exhibition that will stand second to none and the management was very glad to get a week in the circuit that would allow it to practically open the fair season.

Wilbur Duntley, who has charge of the racing end of the Rockingham fair, has closed with the American Horse Breeder to have its futurity raced at the New Hampshire meeting. This famous event for years has been one of the fixtures at Readville in fact the conditions of the futurity in its early day called for it to be decided over a two-minute oval.

### WAITING FOR PROGRAMS

The men who are to campaign down the Grand Circuit are awaiting the announcement of the early closing programs, but hardly expect to hear anything definite until the sale in New York next week. The circuit track managers will all be at Madison-sq Garden and as usual will talk with the trainers.

There is considerable interest as to what will come of the talk that has been made recently as to giving larger purses for the fast record horses.

Two-year-olds will be the feature of the New York sale that opens a week from today. Walnut Hall Farm as has been its custom for several winters, sends all of its colts and fillies of this age, while for the first time Patchen Wilkes Farm consigns its Peter the Great youngsters to an Eastern auction mart.

From the Harkness establishment will come 53 head, the get of Moko Walnut Hall and Ozone, and from the Stokes speed nursery 18 by the wonderful son of Pilot Medium.

### PROPOSALS ON RULES

Next month the rule makers of both the National and American Trotting Associations, the governing bodies of the harness horse turf, meet. Just what changes the National, which has most of the Eastern tracks in its fold, plans to make is not known, as its rules committee will report its recommendations until the opening of the congress. The American, however, has issued a circular which gives the proposed changes for the western turf.

The hopple rule, which bars the under-harness on 4-year-olds and under and has been the cause of much worry among the half-mile track folk is to be stricken from the books unless all signs fail. This was about what was expected when the rule was placed on the books two years ago.

Another important recommendation of the Chicago committee is that all rules be made mandatory, so that no member nor track manager can hereafter set them aside by special published conditions framed to suit himself.

Some of the effects of such a change would be sweeping, since the rules fix a maximum entrance fee of 64 per cent, limit races to five heats and forbid many other things which the track managers have heretofore been allowed to decide for themselves.

### ABOUT THE TWO-HORSE START

The practice of starting two horses from the same stable in the same race is to be forbidden if the proposed amendments are adopted. This is a return to the old rule which had stood for 40 years, when it was changed a few seasons ago in hopes of increasing the dwindling fields in early closing races.

A change in the system of dividing purses is among the proposed amendments. The committee recommends that the long existing practice

of considering a heat won as better than any number of second positions be abolished, and that the rank of the horses, excepting the winner, be determined by adding together the positions of each horse in all heats.

The effect would be to give second money to a trotter that finished 2-2-2 in preference to one placed 1-4-6.

An extraordinary change in the by-laws recommended by the committee would seem to put it in the power of the president of the A. T. A. to control the make-up of the board of appeals as long as he was in office. The plan is to give him authority to appoint three of the seven members of the tribunal, of which he is himself a member.

### TRIMMED NEW GLASGOW

Halifax, Jan. 30--Before 4,500 excited people at the Arena tonight, Johnny Murphy's Halifax Crescents decisively trimmed the fast New Glasgow aggregation of hockeyists by a score of 5 to 3. Many fast and exciting games have been seen in the Halifax Arena, but tonight's contest is easily the best of them all. It took ten minutes overtime to decide the victory, but in that time the locals had annexed two.

From the start to the finish there was not a dull moment in the play, fast rushes, clever stick handling and effective combinations bringing the spectators to their feet with cheers.

Moncton, Jan. 30--By a score of 9 to 6, the Moncton Victorias defeated the Halifax Socials here last evening before about 1,000 spectators, and increased their lead in the Maritime hockey championship race.

The Socials came with a strengthened team, Mallen, McPherson and Lightfoot appearing on the line-up. At the end of the first period the score stood two all, but in the second period Moncton scored three goals, and at the beginning of the third period ran the total up to nine in quick order.

Then the Socials took a turn, scoring four goals in succession, leaving the totals at the close 9 to 6.
