TODAY'S COUNTRY MARKET.

Today's country market was not largely attended, the farmers present being those residing within a few miles of the city. Prices showed little change, ruling as follows:—butter, 30 to 35 cents per lb; eggs, 25 to 25 cents per dozen; potatoes, \$2.75 to \$3 per hbl.; veal, 5 to 10 cents per lb.; maple honey, 25 cents per bottle.

TRUCKMEN MAY BE SUMMONED

MAY ISSUE NEW STOCK

J. M. Robinson & Sons in their weekly market letter thus refer to C. P. R. stock: "It is reported that the Canadian Pacific Railway Company will construct four new steamers all the size of the Manratana, capable of making the trip from land to land in three days. It has also been rumored that \$40,000,000 new stock will be issued notwithstanding that only two out of the five instalments have been paid on the \$18,000,000 of new stock offered in January, this rumor, however, has not been confirmed."

MARYSVILLE LOSES APPEAL OF MARKEY CASE IN SUPREME COURT

Settlement with Plaintiff Expected—Verdict for \$300 Obtained before Judge McKeown in Circuit Court

CASE AROSE OUT OF NON-PAYMENT OF DOG-TAX

According to judgment given by the Supreme Court yesterday, the Town of Marysville lost its appeal in the case of Markey vs Sloat et al, which arose out of the arrest of the plaintiff for non-payment of dog-taxes.

In the case of Philip Markey against George R. Sloat and Fraser Saunders, the unanimous judgment of the Court was delivered by Judge Barry, affirming the verdict recovered by the plaintiff and dismissing the motion of the defendants for a new trial.

CIRCUMSTANCES OF CASE.

This case arose out of the arrest and imprisonment in the York County jail of Philip Markey of Marysville, under a warrant issued by Mr. Sloat, town treasurer, and executed by Fraser Saunders, town marshal, purporting to act under a bye-law of that town, which bye-law and warrant the Court held were illegal and found no justification for the arrest. Markey, having been placed in custody under the warrant, made application by his counsel to Judge Wilson, for his discharge. This was opposed by the defendants on behalf of the town, who retained Mr. A. J. Gregory, K.C.

The discharge was, however, granted upon habeas corpus application. The defendants, supported by the Town Council, having failed to make any settlement with Mr. Markey for his wrongful arrest and imprisonment, the latter brought an action in the Supreme Court through his attorney, Mr. J. D. Phinney, K.C. Messrs. Sloat and Saunders, under instructions from the Town Council, defended the action, Mr. J. W. McCready appearing as their attorney. The case was tried at the York sittings of the Supreme Court before Judge McKeown and a jury, last October, Mr. McCready being assisted by other counsel in behalf of the town, and a verdict was rendered in favor of the plaintiff for \$300.

APPEALED FROM VERDICT.

From this verdict the defendants appealed to the Court en Banc, and the case was argued at the last January term. The defendants contended

Telegram to Dr. T. C. Allen from his Son Removes all Apprehension as to Their Safety

Dr. T. C. Allen has received a telegram from his son, Mr. Charles H. Allen of Winnipeg, who is now in New York, to the effect that Mrs. Mark Fortune and her three daughters, who were passengers on the White Star steamer Titanic which sank off the Grand Banks with great loss of life, had arrived safely in New York. Mr. Allen's fiancée is one of the Misses Fortune. She, her mother and sisters were transferred from the Titanic to the steamer Carpathia. According to the telegram, they are bearing up well under the terrific strain which they have suffered. Mr. Fortune and his son went down with the ill-fated Titanic.

MEETING WITH SUCCESS

EIGHT MILLION FEET OF BANK-LOGS READY FOR RAFTING

First of them Expected at Springhill Next Week—J. M. Scott Cut Between Four and Five Million Feet

CREW FOR DRIFT-DRIVE LEFT TODAY FOR ST. JOHN

Preparations already are being made for the rafting of bank-logs along the St. John River between this place and Woodstock and rafting operations on the part of the farmers and other small operators will be under way next week. It is probable that the first of the bank-logs will arrive at Springhill late in the week. It is estimated that the cut of bank-logs will be about eight million feet, slightly less than that of last year. Mr. J. M. Scott, who has been operating in York County has cut about four or five million feet of bank-logs which is included in the quantity named above.

DRIFT DRIVE

The drift-drive on the lower river will probably be in full swing next week. A crew of men left for St. John Saturday to go on this drive the majority coming from Wasis, Rusiagornish and vicinity. Hugh Murdock of Wasis will be in charge of the crew.

WATER FALLING

The water at this point fell several inches during the night, the fall being due to cold weather. The run of ice is pretty well over and reports are to the effect that the river below Grand Falls is now fairly clear. There was a jam near Florenceville yesterday but the ice was very much broken and no great damage was anticipated from the jam.

PREPARING FOR DRIVING

Preparations for driving are now under way and crews of men are being sent out already. JAMES H. CROCKET TO PAY COSTS, WITH LEAVE TO FILE DEFENCE

Application Made before Judge Barry Yesterday on Judgment Obtained by Late George F. Gregory 21 Years ago

DEFENCE TO BE FILED BEFORE 30th INST.

Application was made before Judge Barry yesterday by Mr. M. G. Teed, K.C., on behalf of the defendant, James H. Crocket, to set aside a judgment signed by the executors of the will of the late George F. Gregory on March 27th, for \$5,203.20. Mr. J. F. Winslow of Winslow & Gregory, appeared on behalf of the plaintiffs to oppose the application. His Honor decided to set aside the judgment and the defendant will be allowed to file defence on or before the 30th inst., but to pay the plaintiffs the costs of signing judgment and of application.

The application was made on an action brought on a judgment recovered against James H. Crocket October 29th, 1891, by the late George F. Gregory for some three thousand dollars. The writ on the action on the judgment was specially endorsed and was issued by Gregory & Winslow in October last. Crocket & Guthrie filed appearance for the defendant and the plaintiffs' solicitors then made application under order 14 of the Judicature Act for an order for summary judgment. On the matter being heard before Judge Barry, the defendant showed a possible defence, and therefore, the judge refused the order for summary judgment, giving the defendant leave to defend.

As the defendant's solicitors did not deliver a defence within the time required by statute, judgment was signed against the defendant for the amount claimed in the writ, \$5,203.20. The defendant's solicitors claimed that it was through a misunderstanding that they did not enter defence and the application mentioned was made yesterday by Mr. Teed.
