PREPARING TO OPERATE N. T. R.

Ottawa, Nov. 12.—The Department of Railways is arranging to operate all the sections of the National Transcontinental on which steel has been laid. The line which was constructed through the wilderness, has produced settlement of a permanent character which requires train service. Arrangements are being made to operate trains over the stretch 150 miles westward from Cochrane, 150 miles eastward from Cochrane, from Quebec Bridge westward to the end of steel and between Edmundston and Moncton in New Brunswick.

TORONTO'S PROGRESS SURPRISES MONTREAL

Montreal, Nov. 12.—Montrealers were somewhat surprised the other day to learn that the Bank of Montreal was no longer the strongest financial institution in the Dominion. The Bank of Montreal has occupied the premier position so long that the knowledge that it was no longer first came as a sort of shock.

According to the latest bank statement, the Bank of Commerce occupies first place among Canadian banks. Some people in Montreal regard the rapid progress of the Bank of Commerce as an indication that the banking centre of Canada will eventually shift from Montreal to Toronto. There are eight banks having their head offices in Montreal, as compared with nine in Toronto. The paid-up capital of the Montreal banks, according to the September bank statement, was \$48,262,802. This compares with a total paid-up capital of the Toronto banks of \$41,494,001. The assets of the Montreal banks amounted to \$661,448,106, as compared with \$591,493,718 of the Toronto banks.

The number of branches controlled by the banks having their head offices in the two cities at the end of 1911 was: Montreal, 900; Toronto 973. The number of branches throughout Ontario is greatly in excess of those in the Province of Quebec. The number of branches of the various banks in Ontario at the end of 1911 amounted to 1,019, as compared with 390 in the Province of Quebec. Ontario is a more populous province, and has a much greater per capita wealth.

The recent amalgamations which have taken place between the various banks, such as the Bank of Commerce and the Eastern Townships Bank, the Royal and Traders Banks and the Banks of Nova Scotia and New Brunswick, are having a tendency to lessen the number of head offices and to consolidate these very largely in the two chief cities in the Dominion, Montreal and Toronto. Other banks have found it advisable for a variety of reasons to move their head offices from small cities to the larger financial centres. The Union Bank of Canada has moved its head office from Quebec to Winnipeg. Still more recently the Quebec Bank has moved a portion of its head office from Quebec to Montreal. A few years before that the Bank of Nova Scotia transferred its chief executive from Halifax to Toronto. This tendency to consolidate everything in the two or three larger cities in the Dominion will likely be continued in future.

RUDYARD KIPPLING'S "KIM" NOW A PAUPER

London, Nov. 8.—Readers of Marion Crawford's famous novel "Mr. Isaacs" and Kipling's "Kim" will welcome the interesting account of the remarkable life of Alexander Malcolm Jakobi, the real hero of both those notable works of fiction, given by Frederick W. Heath.

It would be difficult to find in all India, he writes a more remarkable personality than Jakobi, or to discover in any part of the world a man who had led such an amazing life.

Born at Constantinople, he was at the early age of 12 sold as a slave at the market there, and became the property of a rich pasha. Fortunately the pasha treated him well, and instead of putting him to work, mental work he encouraged the young Jakobi to take an interest in Oriental literature philosophy and occultism.

For some years Jakobi stayed in the house of the pasha, and it was during these years that his keenly receptive mind gathering so much of that curious Eastern wisdom that was afterwards to make him one of the leading figures in Anglo-Indian society at Simla.

On the death of the pasha Jakobi was thrown once more upon the world, and caring little what he did or where he went he decided to make the pilgrimage to Mecca.

After the pilgrimage he made his way to Bombay, and having starved there for a while he got small appointments at the Nizam's court at Hyderabad.

At Hyderabad he learned a great deal about precious stones, and after making a few thousand rupees by the sale of an emerald he boldly set out for Delhi and established himself there as a jeweller.

At Delhi he proposed amazingly and soon finding the city too small for him, he moved to Simla and entered the famous Mart. At Simla his real career began.

The charm of his magnetic personality, the strange mystery surrounding so much of his early life his great wealth and the wonders of his famous house Belvedere, and the marvellous success he held all combined to make Jakobi the most eagerly sought man in Simla.

He became the friend and adviser of viceroys and Governors, and he who had carved his way from obscurity and poverty to fame and wealth found himself the leading figure in Anglo-Indian society. But the years of business were few, for at the very height of his fame there came the tragedy of his life.

It was caused by the sale of the famous Imperial diamond to the late Nizam of Hyderabad. After having paid \$750,000 for the stone on the promise from the Nizam to pay him \$1,500,000 for it, the sale was stopped by the Government of India, and in addition to this heavy financial loss Jakobi had to face a legal case in the High Court of Calcutta.

The trial lasted 57 days, and the expenses were so enormous that after it was over, and Jakobi had secured a triumphant verdict, he found himself practically a pauper. He retired to Bombay, where he lives today in badly reduced circumstances.

This, in brief, gives the story of the rise and fall of Jakobi, one of the fullest interest.

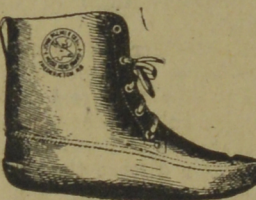
