THE POWERS ENDEAVORING

(Continued from page one)
Constantinople, Nov. 13—The Turkish government has been informed that the European powers have instructed their representatives in the Balkan States to communicate Turkey's application for mediation to the allies, with a view of arranging an armistice preparatory to the conclusion of peace.

The departure of Musurus Bey, the minister of posts and telegraphs, for Europe yesterday, is believed here to be connected with the arrangements of an armistice.

Vienna, Nov. 13—The Bulgarian government has so far not shown itself favorable to the idea of entering Constantinople, according to M. Natchovitch, former Bulgarian foreign minister, in an interview with the correspondent of Neu Freie Presse at Sofia.

Bulgaria, he said, wanted to have Constantinople and Saloniki made free cities. The Bulgarian army, he continued, would halt before Constantinople and leave the fate of the Turkish capital to the decision of the powers.

TURKS IN FORCE AT MONASTIR

Athens, Nov. 12—The Servian and Greek armies have not yet reached in front of Monastir, where it is reported 50,000 Turks under Ali Riza Pasha are preparing for a vigorous defence.

The Greek gunboat Alpheion, patrolling the coast of Ephesus, was fired on off Valona by concealed riflemen, the gunboat replied, destroying part of the customs house.

The king's consent has been asked to summon further classes of reserves to the colors. Bitter comment is appearing in the Greek newspapers, complaining that the European press gives greater prominence to the victories of the allied armies than to those of the Greek arms.

BULGARIAN VICTORY RUMORED

London, Nov. 12—Rumors are current today in Sofia that the Bulgarian army has captured the line of forts at the Tchatalja, in front of Constantinople. According to a news agency despatch, a Bulgarian column is said to have reached Bivuk Cakmedie, on the Sea of Marmora, to the south of Tchatalja. It also stated that the Bulgarian army, under General Theodoroff, has reached Saloniki.

Madrid, Nov. 13—The recent movements of Parkins are known in outline to the Spanish police. He was expelled from Buenos Ayres last March on account of his participation in anarchistic agitations. He returned to Spain and stayed for a few days in Madrid whence he travelled to Paris, London, Biarritz, Bordeaux and Marseilles, and then to Paris which city he left ten days ago for Madrid. The Paris police notified the authorities in Madrid of Parkins' departure and informed them of an official article he had written against King Alfonso for an anarchist paper published in Paris. The Madrid police however, did not know that Parkins had arrived in the Spanish capital, nor have they learned anything of his doing there before the crime.

CODERRE OPPOSED IN HOCHELAGA

Montreal, Nov. 12—The Hon. Louis Coderre will have to fight for his seat. This afternoon the nominations were filed in Ste. Cuneonde town hall and just before two o'clock, after Mr. Coderre's nominations had been accepted, backed by many prominent Conservatives in Hochelaga division, there came a surprise.

Leo Paul Doyon's name was brought forward, backed by the signatures of J. A. Labelle, J. B. Daous, J. H. Bedard, Jos. Gagnon, Jos. Clement, T. Normandin, M. Leclair, E. Bouchier, J. Picot, J. B. Bordeaux and others, but with no indication of his politics.

Mr. Coderre was very indignant when he heard of the nomination and stated that Mr. Doyon had worked for him until ten days ago. Mr. Doyon is a member of the firm of Doyon Realty and lives in Point St. Charles. He refused to give his program and is suspected of planning to capture the votes of Nationalists and labor men alike.

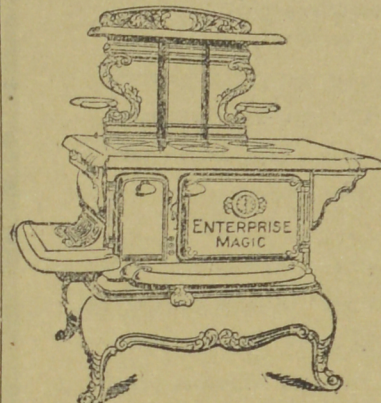

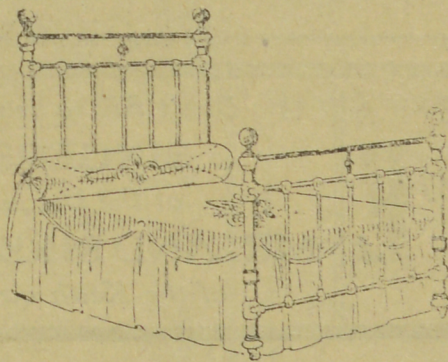
