GEN. DIAZ HAS ESCAPED FROM PRISON

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 12—General Felix Diaz, leader of the late revolution in Mexico has escaped from prison according to a letter received here by R. J. Kirwan of this city from R. H. Diskerson at Oaxaca Mexico. Diskerson is from Boston and is interested in mining in Mexico. The letter was dated Oaxaca, November 3rd and that part of it bearing on Diaz reported 'escape' follows:

"This afternoon a special edition came out here saying General Felix Diaz had escaped from prison by bribing sentries and gone by boat down the coast. The whole town is wild and Emilio goes round with a broad grin on his face. Emilio says he is going with several other Mexicans here."

Kirwan says the Emilio referred to is Felix Diaz, nephew.

White of Paris, Tenn. The exchange of greetings and the organization of the convention occupied the initial session. This afternoon the delegates went to Arlington to attend the ceremonies at the laying of the cornerstone for a monument to be erected in memory of the Confederate dead in the Arlington national cemetery.

DARING ATTEMPT AT WHOLESALE POISONING

(Halifax Chronicle)

One of the most sensational attempted wholesale poisoning cases that has ever occurred in Nova Scotia has just been discovered in Kings County, and Arthur W. Dorey, a resident of the New Ross Road is in the Kentville jail, charged with the offence. The case was successfully investigated by Detective Kennedy of Halifax, who caused the arrest of Dorey.

It is alleged that the case had its origin in family troubles. On the New Ross Road, about ten miles from Kentville, the Dorey family reside. The father, mother and four sons reside on one farm. About two miles distant, two more sons reside on another farm. One of the latter is Charles Dorey, and he is in very comfortable circumstances. He has a good farm, a saw mill and he also owns the farm on which his parents and the four brothers reside. Charles has in his employ a man named Jas. Lowe and his wife. The farm works on the farm, and the woman does the cooking.

DOREY WAS POISONED

Recently Mrs. Lowe went out on the farm and dug some potatoes. She cooked them and served them for dinner. The first one to partake of them was Charles Dorey. As soon as he partook of the potatoes he was taken ill, his jaws became paralyzed, and for five days he was unable to move them. He discovered that he was poisoned, and that the poison was in the potatoes.

The matter was reported to Hon. W. H. Wickwire, of Kentville, who communicated with Attorney General and the latter sent Detective Kennedy up to investigate the case.

POISON IN POTATOES

After gathering some facts the De-

tective went to the potato patch, and had a quantity of potatoes dug. Then the startling discovery was made that the potatoes had been filled with poison. Circular pieces had been cut out of a number of the potatoes, large quantities of strychnine inserted, the piece of potato replaced, and the tubers put back into the ground again, and covered up. There was sufficient poison in some of the potatoes to kill ten persons.

ARTHUR DOREY ARRESTED

After getting this evidence the Detective continued his investigation and as a result of the facts gathered he caused a warrant to be issued in Kentville for Arthur Dorey. On Thursday Kennedy, accompanied by Policemen Davis and Jailer Coleman, went out in an automobile to the Dorey homestead, and arrested Arthur. They brought him into Kentville and locked him up.

On Saturday morning, it is stated Arthur Dorey broke down, and made a clean breast of the whole affair to the detective.

The trouble between the members of the family has existed for some time, and quite recently a dog belonging to Charles was poisoned.

The affair had caused a tremendous sensation throughout Kentville, and the surrounding countryside. Charles Dorey is an industrious man and highly respected in the neighborhood in which he resides. His escape from death is almost miraculous. His timely discovery of the poison no doubt, saved the lives of the other members of the household. The solution of the case has brought general relief to the people of the neighborhood and Detective Kennedy is to be congratulated on his good work. On next Friday Arthur Dorey will come up for a preliminary hearing at Kentville and it is stated, that some startling evidence will be brought out at the trial.

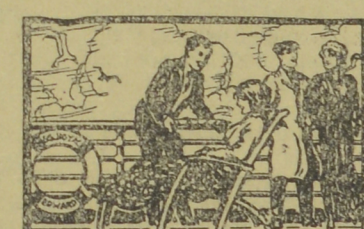

CIVIL WAR MONUMENT DEDICATED

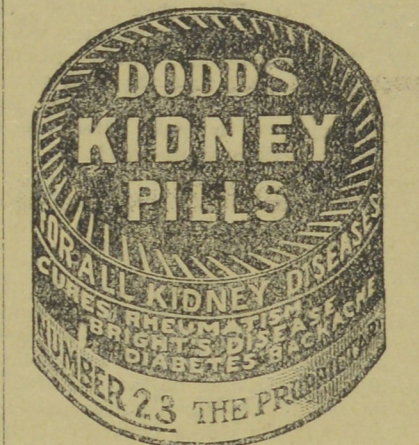

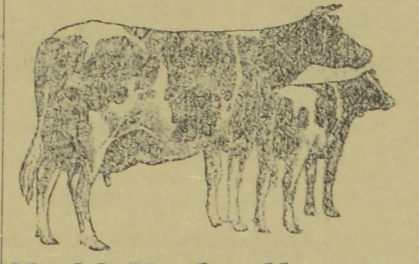
