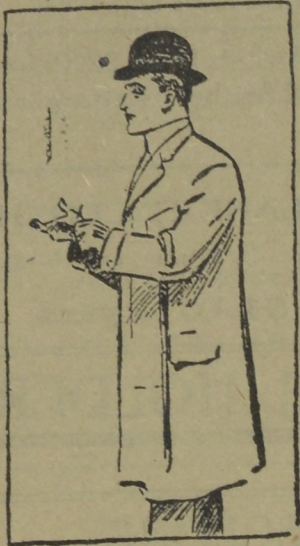


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ROGERS BRESNAHAN LET GO
BY ST. LOUIS NATIONALS

President Jones Says
Rogers Was Regular
Bull in a China Shop—
Club in Unsatisfactory
Condition Financially
and Otherwise—Bres-
nahan Says he Will
Hold Club to Contract

St. Louis, Oct. 22—That formal notice has been served on Roger Bresnahan, manager of the St. Louis National team, that his contract has been terminated by the club management, although it still has four years to run, was admitted tonight by J. C. Jones, president of the club.

Bresnahan said he would take every means to force the club management to live up to the contract. No specified reasons for the action were given.

"I can now confirm the statement that notice of the termination of his contract has been served on Mr. Bresnahan," Jones said, after refusing all day to discuss the situation.

BRESNAHAN DEFIANT.

"I have a contract with the club which has four years to run," Bresnahan said. "I will make every effort to force the club owners to live up to their end of it. I have fulfilled all my obligations to the club and will expect the club to fulfill its obligations to me."

"Roger is a regular bull in a china shop," said Pres. Jones tonight. "Things have gone from bad to worse under his administration. The club had a most unsatisfactory season financially this year."

"Bresnahan has been at loggerheads all season with Mrs. Britton, principal owner of the club; also at cross purposes most of the time with his players. The ball players complain that he has been 'riding them' too hard. The team fell behind its 1911 record in club standing and percentage."

"Roger has had a strong desire to get rid of Huggins and complained that Mrs. Britton was interfering with his prerogative as manager when she refused to sanction several deals involving the transfer of Huggins."

STARTED IN SPRING.

The trouble in the club, according to sporting writers, started last spring, when Bresnahan, without waiting for orders, took the Cardinal team from Jackson, Tenn., which place Sec. Seekamp had selected for the Cardinals' training camp, to Jackson, Miss., to train. Bresnahan said that Jackson, Tenn., was unfit for training, that his men had to eat at cheap restaurants, sleep two in a bed, etc.

AD WOLGAST MADE POOR
SHOWING AGAINST MALONEY

Philadelphia, Oct. 23—While Champion Ad. Wolgast had no difficulty in winning from Teddy Maloney in their six-round bout before the Olympic club here, fight fans are greatly disappointed over the champion's showing.

On several occasions Wolgast was hissed for clinching and holding. He had the better of the first three rounds by a good margin, punching Maloney almost at will.

During the last round, Maloney kept Wolgast pretty busy. Both boxers slipped through the ropes, and when they were pulled back, Maloney landed three terrific wallops on Wolgast's jaw just as the final gong sounded.

London, Oct. 23—Hughie Meghan, the Australian lightweight boxer, has been matched with Harry Jones of Cardiff, Wales. The articles of agreement will be signed immediately. The match is arousing much interest and will take place in London on October 28.

KING'S FORWARDS
HELD ACADIA XV
AT WINDSOR, N. S.

Eaton of Acadia Team Ordered off
Field for Assaulting Referee—
Match Full of Scrapping

Windsor, Oct. 21—Windsorians today witnessed the first game of Rugby football to be played here this season, Acadia of Wolfville, triumphing over King's of Windsor, scoring nine points in the second half of the game. Referee W. H. S. Ritchie was in a most uncomfortable position, and on one occasion an Acadia man was ordered from the field.

In the first half King's failed to take advantage of two open opportunities thereby losing many points. The play was very even throughout this half, neither team scoring.

In the second half Lester Andrews, Acadia's fast half, replaced an injured player with the result that he figured prominently in all but one of Acadia's scores. This player did not make a touch himself, but was the chief factor in the scoring of four points. Phil Andrews, also of Acadia, started in dropping a nice one from field scoring four points.

Although Acadia ran away with Dalhousie forwards in the scrum, they met their match here today, King's scrum holding them to a man.

H. B. Helbert, the shining star of King's, saved many scores, always kicked to advantage and made big gains for his team. King's half-line failed to mark their men and here Acadia took advantage. Their halves were always in position, ready to assist in the game-winning tactics of good half-line combination.

The game was rough at times and on one occasion L. Eaton threw the ball into the referee's face, for which offence he was ruled off the field. One of Acadia's forwards jumped into the spectators and handed one of them a fast one. It was exciting indeed. The scraps came thick and fast and the referee was the busiest man on the field.

NOT GOING TO WOLFVILLE.

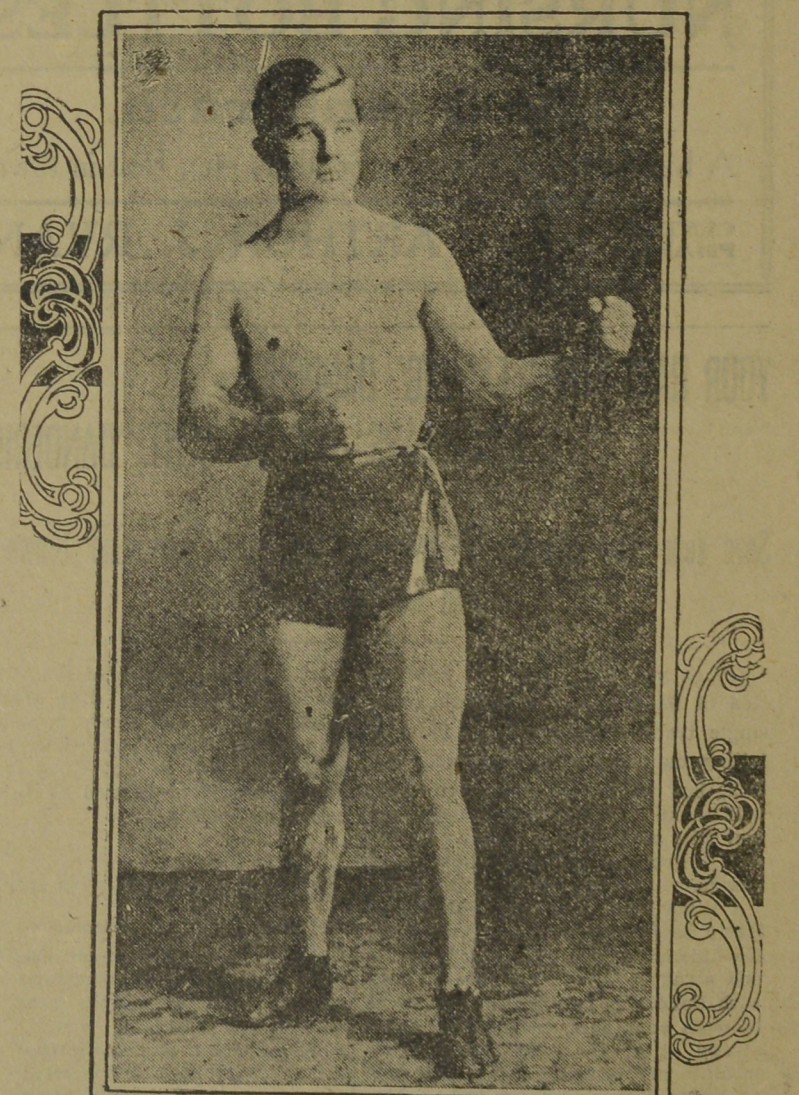
