RUSSIAN CROWN PRINCE

SERIOUSLY ILL

St. Petersburg, Oct. 23.—The condition of the Russian crown prince is causing the greatest anxiety at the imperial court and among the general public.

Although information is published in bulletins the strictest silence is preserved in regard to the nature of the accident met with by the Grand Duke.

That it was a serious one is indicated by the telegraphic summons sent to Dr. Rauchfuss, the court physician who attends to the imperial children to proceed at once to Spala in Russian Poland.

The National Butter Makers' Association, the International Milk Dealers' Association and a number of other large associations connected with the dairy industry will hold their annual convention in Chicago during the week of the show.

TO HEAR PIPE LINE CASE

Washington, D. C., Oct. 23.—The so-called "pipe line case" will be heard before the Commerce Court tomorrow, when counsel representing the government and the leading oil pipe line companies will present arguments on the constitutionality of the order of the Interstate Commerce Commission requiring the companies to file schedules of their rates for transporting oil.

TWENTY NINE STATES TO ELECT GOVERNORS

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 21.—In the elections one week from next Tuesday twenty-nine states will elect governors, in addition to other officials.

Arkansas, Georgia, Maine and Vermont elected their governors earlier in the present year. In Alabama, Arizona, California, Kentucky, Louisiana, Maryland, Mississippi, Nevada, New Jersey, New Mexico, Oklahoma, Oregon, Pennsylvania, Virginia and Wyoming the present executives hold over until next year or later.

The states that will elect governors on November 5, with the candidates named by the several parties for the office, are as follows:

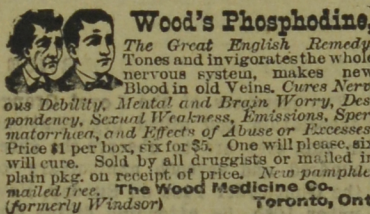

ASYLUM PATIENTS AS POTATO GROWERS

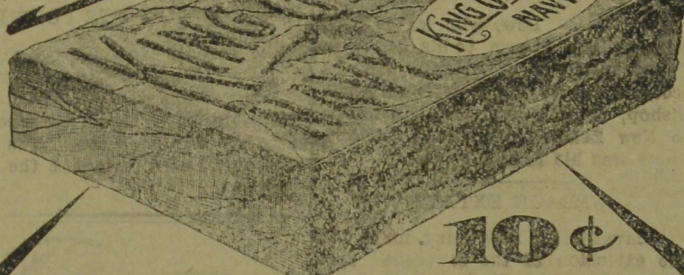
Toronto, Oct. 23.—With the average potato grower plunged deep in gloomy contemplation of his rot-infected crop the insane patients at the Orillia Hospital have just got through harvesting a crop of potatoes that breaks more than one or two records. On a four and a half acre plot, 1,386 bushels of potatoes were secured or an average of 3,648 bushels to the acre. Thirty-eight of the larger tubers filled a bushel measure.

The crop was absolutely free from rot and blight due to careful spraying.
