RAPID PROGRESS  
MADE IN BUILDING  
MINTO RAILWAY

In Spite of Unfavorable Weather Twenty-Two Miles of Rails Have Been Laid--Telegraph Line Now Being Constructed

The construction of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway from Gibson to Minto, which has been in progress during the past summer, is an instance of rapid progress under difficulties. Twenty-two miles of rails are already laid although not continuous. This has been accomplished in spite of one of the most unfavorable summers in years and through a country of which certain sections are hard to reach. Absence of highway communication has made it difficult to get material and supplies to certain sections of the line but all obstacles have been overcome and the entire line will be completed early next season.

## BUILDING TELEGRAPH LINE.

The C.P.R., which is behind the construction of the Fredericton & Grand Lake Railway at present, has a crew of men building a telegraph line along the new railway. This will be used for operation and also for commercial purposes.

## COMPLETING SUB-CONTRACT.

Mr. J. Cook Kitchen of this city, who had a sub-contract for grading about five miles of the line, is about completing work.

## DREDGE SHIFTS POSITION

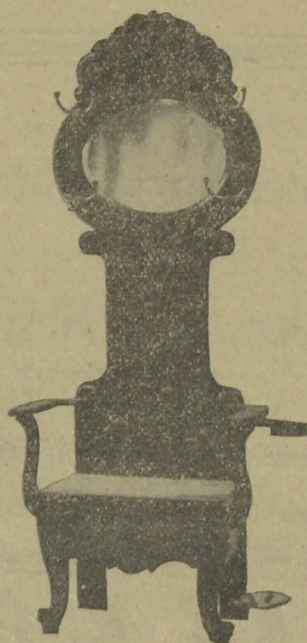

CHILD SEVERLY  
BURNED MONDAY  
AT DOWVILLE

Mildred Dow, Aged Eleven Frightfully Injured by Fire--Clothing Caught When She Placed Wood in Stove

Word has been received from Dowville in the Parish of Canterbury, of the severe burning of a young girl of that place on Monday last. The child is Mildred Dow, youngest daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Spurgeon Dow. As far as is known at the present time, she will live, although terribly burned about the body.

The child had gone to put some wood in the stove while her mother and little brother were out to the hen pen; and in some way the sleeve of her dress caught fire. In a twinkling her dress, which was of some light, inflammable material, was all on fire and she ran, screaming, to where her mother was. The terrified mother caught an overcoat and a mat and wrapped them around the child to put out the flames. In doing so she burned her right hand to a blister. When the flames were extinguished she threw the coat and mat back of the house.

Dr. McIntyre of Hawshaw, was at once telephoned for but unfortunately he was engaged on a case that he could not leave. He telephoned back to apply linseed and sweet oil freely and keep the child in the quiet until he could get there. This was done. In the evening when the doctor came he found the little sufferer lying on the bed very quiet but quivering like a leaf in her suffering.

The child is frightfully burned. Beginning just above the right knee the terrible burn follows up the limb to the body, up the right side of the body to the chin, then across under the chin and across the upper lip. But the mother's action was so quick in putting out the fire after the child reached her that the major part of the body was untouched by the flames.

Mrs. Millard Wright, elder sister of the little girl, who lives on the opposite side of the river, was attracted to the scene by the smoke of the burning garments which her mother had used to smother the flames.
