## CONGRESS OF UNIVERSITIES

London, July 2—The Congress of Universities of the British Empire, for which preparations have been making for nearly a year, began its sessions in London this morning with Lord Rosebery, chancellor of the Universities of London and Glasgow, in the chair. The attendance was made up of delegates representing more than fifty of the leading institutions of learning of the United Kingdom of Great Britain and Ireland, Canada, Australia and other portions of the empire. Specialization among universities and inter-university arrangements for post-graduate and research students were the chief topics of discussion at the initial session.

## TEACHERS TO TOUR GERMANY

New York, July 2—On the steamship Grisser Kurfurst, specially chartered for the occasion, an army of German-American teachers recruited from every section of the country, sailed today to spend the summer in the Fatherland. After visiting Hamburg, Bremen, Cologne, Heidelberg, Stuttgart, Jena and other places of interest, the teachers will gather at the Niederwald-Denkmal, the colossal German national monument on the banks of the Rhine. Here an elaborate musical program will be carried out, and there will be patriotic speeches by Germans and Americans.

## FINNISH BAYROUTH FESTIVAL

Helsingfors, July 2—Great preparations have been completed for what is ambitiously termed the Finnish Bayreuth festival, which is to be opened tomorrow at Nyslott, a picturesque little town on the Kyrosund. The festival, which will continue four days, will be held within the walls of the ancient historical castle of Olofsberg. The main feature of the program is an opera based on the Finnish national epic poem, the "Kalevala," and is entitled "Aino," after the well known Finnish singer Mlle. Aino Ackte, for whom it has been composed and who will fill the title role. M. Erkki Nelartin, the composer of the opera, will conduct personally.

## EARLY RISER

To rise early in a country town so that you may do your chores before others are abroad may be a good thing. It may make a man feel that he is more enterprising than his neighbors, and this is an innocent gratification which benefits him without injuring them. There is also a cheeriness in the greeting of one early riser to another in a sleeping village which one does not note later in the day.

It is different in the city, early rising in Toronto is another matter. In the country the sun between four and five a. m. floods the whole landscape, while in the city it at first floods only the housetops, and early risers are not on the housetops. The streets are cold chasms not yet ventilated. The air is damp. If you see a man hurrying along he does not greet you as if you were a brother member of the Early Risers' Association. He does not greet you at all, and the houses look empty and desolate. As you wander about you feel as you have done when you have arrived in town on an early train and entered a familiar restaurant for breakfast, only to find scrubbers at work and the chairs stacked on the tables. If you try to work in your garden at 6 a. m. and make a slight noise you will hear a neighbor's window close sharply and know that you are included with cats and roosters in the list of nuisances. And you have roused your own household. The younger children must up, too, especially those not old enough to dress themselves, and out they scamper to wade in the fatal wet of the dewy grass, and shouting to dispel the unfamiliar quiet. You arrive at your place of business too early and "Toothache?" somebody asks solicitously.

## BIGGEST DRY DOCK FOR CANADA

Ottawa, Ont., July 2—The time limit expired today for the reception of bids for the construction of the great Canadian dry-dock, which is to be the largest in the world. The dock is to be built either on the St. Charles River or the Beauport flats, on the Quebec side, or at St. Joseph de Levis. The dock will be 1150 feet long, 137 feet wide and 37 feet deep. The government itself will not build the dock, but the company or firm whose bid is accepted will be paid for a subsidy of 34 per cent. for thirty-five years on 45,000,000.

## A TERRIBLE DISASTER

men, held in by a meshwork put on after the second trip of the balloon three weeks ago, unable to escape broke away from the envelope. It upended the bow turning first in a slow arc. Then it reversed suddenly and plunged downward barely above it in a long spiral was the gas bag a smoking mass of rubber and silk, with the flames shooting out from a dozen sections as it collapsed. It fluttered a moment and then streaked down after the car. In the descent, something which appeared to be the body of a man shot out to the left of the wreckage and hit the water before the rest of the descending mass. It was reported that this was the headless body of Melvin Vaniman. At 8:20 a. m. a message was relayed ashore that the body had been recovered. With it came the statement from Captain Lambert Parker of the Abscond Federal Life Saving Crew, that this was true and that the other four members of the crew were entangled in the wreckage beyond reach, in eighteen feet of water. Efforts are to be made to draw them to the surface. Thousands of persons from every part of the resort are gathered along the inlet board walk and the Vaniman cottage, just across from the hanger at the inlet, where Mrs. Vaniman has collapsed and is unconscious from the shock. Police reserves who helped to launch the craft which sailed along gracefully until the accident occurred, kept the crowds from about the villa. The flight this morning was the second that the ill-fated airship had taken by air. After tinkering all winter on the ship Vaniman took her for a short flight on Saturday, June 1st. On that time the balloon was nearly wrecked by some of the mechanism going wrong but it was safely landed at the hanger without serious mishap.

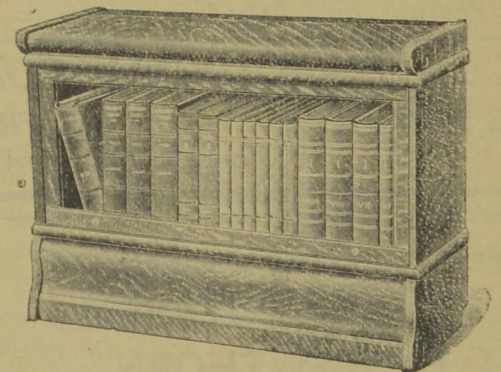
