AMERICAN LUMBER MARKET FIRM, DULL ACROSS THE WATER

(St. John Telegraph.)

Conditions at this port have been improved both from the standpoint of the shipping men and lumbermen. For the first time in some years the American lumber market has been stimulated and just at a time when it is most desirable, on account of the dullness of the English market and high ocean tonnage. The diversion of the bulk of the shipments to the United States market has found tonnage hardly in proportion to the demand, and coastwise freights have advanced materially.

To account for some of the conditions, many reasons have been given. The situation so far as the English market is concerned is unfavorable with extremely high ocean freights which combine to practically prohibit shipments. Were it not for the stiff ocean freights, things might not be too bad, however. Freights have advanced about twenty-five per cent. over last season's quotations. The demand for grain, cotton and oil tonnage has had the effect of boosting freights all along the line.

Forced off the English market, the mill operators here have turned their attention to the American market and are manufacturing now largely for that business. All the mills hereabouts are manufacturing to their full capacity and the season at the present time gives much promise.

The reason for the improvement in the American market seems to be explained best by the statement that business conditions generally in the States have taken a new lease of life. Building operations are reported to be quite brisk, and the lumber shippers here will be perfectly satisfied if prices remain steady. Sailing tonnage is decidedly scarce at a time when, ordinarily, it should be quite plentiful. The hard pine business has been very lucrative of late and has attracted vessels to southern waters. The opinion was advanced by one prominent shipping man yesterday that from now out sailing tonnage would continue to be scarce as there were few new vessels building and that the coastwise trade was slowly but surely going to steamers. 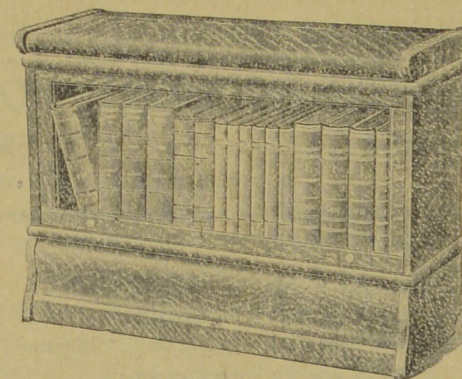

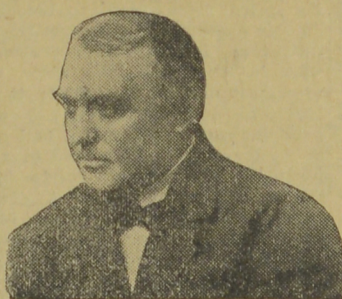
