ELDERLY MAN KNOCKED DOWN BY ROUGH RIDER

Patrick Crowley Had a very Narrow Escape from Death near Corner of Queen and Regent Sts. Last Evening

RIDER DID NOT STOP WHEN ACCIDENT OCCURRED

Fredericton came near being the scene of a fatality last evening at about eight o'clock when an elderly gentleman who gave his name as Patrick Crowley was knocked down by a galloping horse on Queen Street. The animal which was ridden by a young lad named Belyea came down Regent Street at a furious clip and turning the Queen Street corner struck Crowley who was crossing the street at the time. A young lady who was nearby also had a narrow escape from injury.

The old man was literally ridden down the horse striking him in the breast and passing completely over him. In his fall his head struck the curb stone, effecting a severe gash, but he seemed otherwise to have escaped serious injury.

A large crowd gathered quickly and Crowley was conveyed into Hunt & MacDonald's drug store where the necessary aid was rendered, after which he was taken to his home.

Much unfavorable comment was passed by reason of the fact that the young man who was the cause of the accident immediately disappeared without making an effort to assist the injured man or to enquire concerning his condition.

It was also pertinently stated by those who witnessed the accident that the speed limit is being daily ignored. Occurrences of this kind have been too frequent lately and a sharp lookout should be given to see that the regulations to prevent a repetition of such furious driving should be strictly observed.

MANY FISHING PARTIES COMING TO PROVINCE

The St. John River has long been popular with tourists, and of the report that additional steamboats are to be put on in the near future is well founded next month will see a big influx of America visitors to this city.

Already a number of American fishing parties are in the province and more are expected during the next few weeks.

A party of California people are arranging to spend three weeks salmon fishing in this province during the present season.

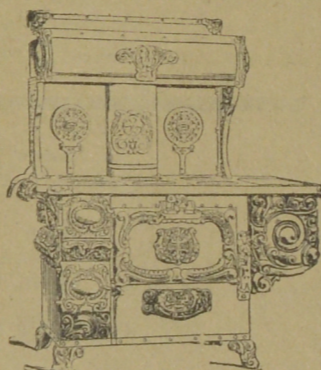

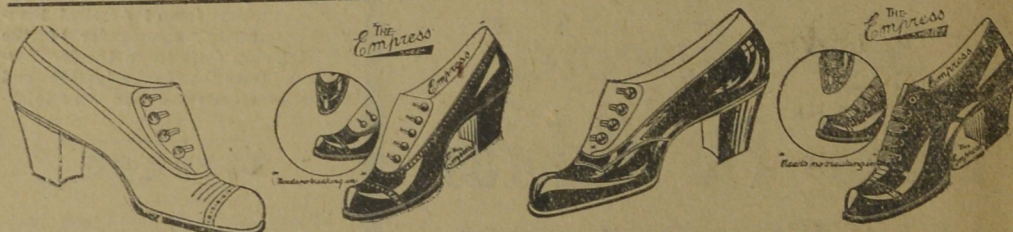
