## FRUITS OF LIBERAL POLICY

The returns of the immigration for the fiscal year ending March 31st, 1912, show that not less than 354,257 persons came to this country to make their homes, a number about equal to five per cent. of our population, as shown by the census of 1911. This is about one-third of the total to the United States, and in proportion to population is many times greater than the annual arrivals of which that country could ever boast. This vast and rapidly growing tide of home-seekers says the Halifax Recorder is the main spring of Canada's wonderful progress, and it was Liberal energy and statesmanship which initiated and developed this tremendous translocation of peoples from overcrowded Europe to new homes and new hopes on this side of the Atlantic. During the long regime of Conservatism from 1878 to 1896, it is no exaggeration to say that more than half a million Canadians left home and flag to settle in the United States, while the compensation received for this loss in the shape of immigration was small indeed, and grew every year still smaller. Here is the record from 1892 to 1896, inclusive:

In any one of the latter years named, the immigration was larger—in 1912 more than three times as large—than the total immigration for the five years from 1892 to 1897. But this is not all. Another feature of the recent immigration is the large and ever-increasing number of Americans settling in the country. In 1903, 49,473 "came over the border," and this movement has steadily grown until, during the fiscal year just closed, these arrivals numbered 133,740, bringing with them on an average one thousand dollars in money and effects per individual, or a direct addition to our material wealth of \$133,000,000. Eighty per cent. of all the newcomers were English speaking people, the highest percentage yet, with every likelihood of this increasing.

Such is the record of the Liberal Administration in connection with the stopping of the exodus and the directing hitherward the current of immigration, and future historians will claim that the real birth of Canada was in 1896, when Sir Wilfrid Laurier came into power.

A strike on the N. B. and P. E. I. Railway, a road controlled by influential Westmorland County Tories, has been in progress for several weeks. It seems that the men are being paid the same scale of wages which was in vogue on the I. C. R. before the Liberals came into power in 1896. Some of the men were drawing \$1.20 per day and more were paid more than \$1.75. The men struck for a living wage and who can blame them. The manager of the road recently told a reporter that none of the strikers would be taken back to work. Commenting on the strike the Sackville Tribune says:

"The sympathy of the town and in fact of all the eastern end of the country is strongly in favor of the striking employees, who are known to be faithful men. It is stated that engines are sometimes run which have been pronounced unsafe and the engineers and firemen are asked to risk their lives for a mere pittance."

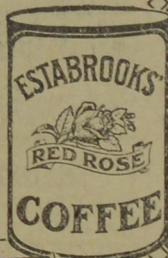

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The members of the City Council are firm believers in the old adage "that music hath charms to sooth the savage beasts." McKenzie, a rising young barrister of Campbellton and a graduate of the U. N. B.

There are so many patriotic Tories so anxious to serve their King and country in the capacity of keeper of the Common goal for the County of York that the patronage dispensers are having great difficulty in making a choice. Of course the job will go to the man with the strongest pull regardless of his qualifications.

The presence of two prominent C. P. R. officials in the city on Saturday when a meeting of the St. John and Quebec Railway Company was held may have been only a coincidence, but it is one which will likely set some people thinking.
