IMPORTANT BUSINESS AT CITY COUNCIL

(Continued from page one.)

Ald. Calder said he had no desire
to oppose granting concessions asked
by this company. He was not op-
posed to its members. However,
there were other lands as suitable as
Queen's Square and there were other
uses to which that Square might
well be put in the near future. It
would not be a business-like act to
plunge headlong into such a proposi-
tion. He could see no need for undue
haste. He moved that a special com-
mittee be appointed to consider the
petition of the company, to report
at a special meeting of the Council
to be held not later than a week
from date.

Ald. Kitchen seconded the motion
and strongly supported Ald. Calder.
Ald. Guthrie said he did not ques-
tion Ald. Calder's motives in advis-
ing caution but he thought imme-
diate action was necessary. He had
been informed on credible autho-
rity that St. John men were making
determined efforts to get the indus-
try concerned located at St. John.
In amendment he moved that the
prayer of the petition of the Palmer-
McLellan Shoeapack Company be
granted as far as consistent with the
city charter and that the special
committee report to the Council on
the matter at an early date.

ORIGINAL MOTION CARRIED.

The vote on the amendment was
as follows:

Yea—Ryan, Guthrie, Moore and
Cruikshank.
Nay—Calder, Kitchen, Wilkinson
and Burchill.

On the Mayor's casting vote the
amendment was lost and the original
motion was carried. His Worship ex-
plaining his action in voting stated
that a delay of a few days would
make no difference in the matter of
granting the prayer of the petition.
He had talked with Mr. John Palmer
and he certainly had received the
impression that a few days delay
would not mean the loss of the in-
dustry to Fredericton.

GRANTS FOR BANDS

A petition from the Fredericton
Brass Band for a grant of \$500 on
condition of the band playing fif-
teen concerts during the summer
was received.

Ald. Kitchen seconded by Ald.
Cruikshank moved that a grant of
\$350 be given the Fredericton Brass
Band on condition that it play fif-
teen concerts during the summer un-
der the direction of a committee of
the council.

Ald. Calder stated that he would
support the motion. He had every
respect for the members of the 71st
Regt. Band but did not think the
city could support two bands.
The motion was carried.

Upon the same day Mr. Fowler
called upon a local stationer, who
also issues money orders, and by tel-
ling him a cock and bull story, was
able to work him for \$200 in money
orders. The stationer has not yet
been able to negotiate the check
given in exchange for the orders.
An insurance man was taken in in
the same way to the extent of \$150.

MADE ANOTHER RAISE.

Some time last week Mr. Fowler
called upon a down town citizen and
induced him to endorse a note for the
sum of \$200. The man refused at
first, but finally consented when it
was pointed out to him that the note
already contained the endorsement of
Mr. Fowler's mother.

Being still short of funds, Mr. Fowler
called upon a Regent street hotel
man and succeeded in working him
to the tune of \$200 in exchange for a
note. He also secured from a county
official a check for the sum of \$100,
which he had made payable to the
order of his mother.

FRIENDS SOAKED.

Mr. Fowler enjoyed the close per-
sonal friendship of Provincial Secre-
tary McLeod, and was able to secure
endorsements from him to the extent
of about \$1,750. He gets the credit
of being the largest individual credi-
tor. Another friend, Mr. H. M.
Blair, was on his paper at one
time to the tune of \$1,200, but get-
ting wise to Mr. Fowler's financial
condition he was able to reduce the
liability to \$650.

A well known spinster lady is said
to have had such faith in Mr. Fow-
ler's business ability that she en-
trusted to his care the savings of a
life time, amounting to \$500, and the
money is gone.

Numerous other personal and pol-
itical friends are involved as endorsers
in sums ranging from \$40 to \$300,
and the name of at least one relative
is on paper for a large amount.

The assets, which are placed at
\$8,500, include stock in trade and

asking for a grant of \$300 was read.
Ald. Guthrie stated that he was
strangely in favor of the motion just
passed. The Fredericton Brass Band
was an excellent organization of

He moved seconded by Ald. Calder
that the prayer of the petition be
granted.

The motion was lost by the fol-
lowing vote: Yea—Ryan, Guthrie,
Moore, Nay—Cruikshank, Calder, Bur-
chill, Kitchen, Wilkinson.

On the motion of Ald. Guthrie se-
conded by Ald. Ryan a grant of \$150
was voted the 71st Regt. Band under
conditions similar to those under
which the other grant was given.

The following committee was ap-
pointed to have supervision of the
band-concerts and grants:

Ald. Guthrie, Ald. Wilkinson, Ald.
Moore, Ald. Cruikshank, Ald. Cald-
er.

CURFEW LAW.

The request of a delegation from
the W.C.T.U. concerning a curfew-
law, a juvenile reformatory and a
bylaw for the registration and licens-
ing of drivers of public conveyances
was then considered.

Ald. Guthrie spoke strongly in
favor of a curfew bell. It was par-
ticularly noticeable about the mov-
ing-picture shows that many children
were out at a late hour. He moved
that a curfew law be prepared.

Ald. Cruikshank was of a similar
opinion.

The motion was carried.

Ald. Guthrie moved that the City
Clerk be instructed to prepare a by-
law providing for the licensing and
registration of hack-drivers.

The City Clerk and Ald. Kitchen
both pointed out that the hack-
drivers had asked to be heard before
a bylaw was prepared.

Ald. Kitchen moved that a commit-
tee be appointed to confer with the
owners of hacks, etc., on the mat-
ter.

Ald. Guthrie seconded the motion,
which was carried.

The committee is composed of the
following:

Ald. Kitchen, Ald. Guthrie and
Ald. Burchill.

In connection with the report of
the establishment of a reformatory
for juvenile offenders, a resolution
endorsing the proposal and calling
upon the provincial government to
take steps in the matter was passed.

When he reached the dock, all but
two of the boats had left the ves-
sel, and the third class women pas-
sengers, were coming from their quar-
ters. He was overcome by the cold
in the life boat, and a woman threw
her cloak over him, after which he
lost consciousness.

Southampton, May 8.—The White
Star Liner Oceanic sailed for Cher-
bourg and New York at half past
twelve. Every lifeboat was lowered
into the water and tested before the
vessel's departure.

Madame Navratil the mother of the
two French waifs from the Titan
now being looked after in New York
is to join the liner at Cherbourg.

London, May 8.—Lee a lookout man
who was rescued from the Titanic,
repeated much of the evidence for the
senate committee. He said that when
the vessel there was no light in sight.

After leaving the ship he saw a
light but could not see what it was.
It might have been the light of one
of the Titanic boats. No women
were waiting when his boat was
launched.

Under cross examination, Lee said
it was quite a common thing to put
a lookout at the bows as well as in
the crow's-nests of a vessel. He
could not say whether it was easier
to see an iceberg from the bows than
from the crow's-nests. There was no
special examination of eyesight for
lookout men.

But all doubt as to who will be in
the field on both tickets will be set
at rest next week when both govern-
ment and opposition hold conven-
tions at Hampton, the former on
Tuesday and the Opposition on
Thursday, May 16. Announcement of
the same will no doubt be made in
the usual way.

The opportunity for the Opposition
has never been better than it is to-
day in Kings County. The represen-
tatives elected four years ago have
never done credit to themselves or
to their county. Mr. Sproul's record
need not be dwelt upon. Mr. Jones

servative officials are openly taking
part in the local elections.

The Liberals here are jubilant over
the choice of the Conservatives. While
there never was any doubt about
Gloucester, the county is now doubly
sure for the Liberals.

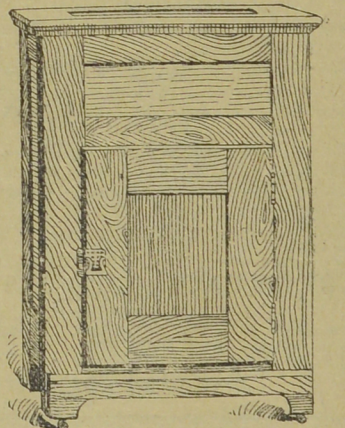
