## BURNS COMMENTS ON BECKER VERDICT

## Conviction of Policeman, the Famous Detective Says, Will Put a Curb on Lawlessness

(Brooklyn Eagle.)

That Detective William J. Burns is well pleased with the outcome of the Becker trial is evident from statements made by him last night in an address before the Dramatic and Literary Society of the Church of the Holy Innocents, Flatbush, and in an interview immediately after the meeting.

The return of a verdict of murder in the first degree will, in his mind, teach a lesson that will tend to curb lawlessness all over the country. Burns doffed his hat to District Attorney Whitman for the excellent manner in which the latter conducted the case.

"Today in New York City," said he in his speech, "we have an example which shows how little regard some men have for human life. Here is presented the opportunity to see how men will take human life for a nominal price."

"I was astounded to hear that many people in the city were doubting the testimony given by the informers because of the character of these witnesses. You cannot expect to find ministers, physicians and men of education who resort with underworld characters so that they could testify in a murder case of this kind."

As Detective Burns was called in to help run to earth the quartette of Rosenthal gunmen at the same time they were still at large, his connection with the case has been very intimate. His views on this and many other questions relative to his work as a sleuth were listened to with interest by over two hundred persons who crowded into the parish hall of Holy Innocents, at 1710 Beverley Road. It was his first address to a Flatbush audience.

The greatest of all vices, he said, is municipal corruption, and after explaining his simple remedy for this vice, he astounded the audience by expressing the belief that "the head of a municipality is responsible for all corruption which arises within it."

While men are searching wildly for a method of eliminating this corruption, Detective Burns thinks that it is the simplest thing in the world to stop municipal graft. His plan is merely to arouse the citizens so that they will take an active interest in the affairs of the city. It is his belief that the most substantial thinking men of the community almost always constitute the class which fails to perform that most important of all duties—the suffrage. If the honest men in the community would see that only honest men are elected to office, corruption would quickly be eliminated.

The practice, which is often resorted to by lawyers in criminal trials of today, of attempting to befog the situation by abuse, was scathingly denounced by the detective. He has been the victim of just such groundless abuse, notably at the Darrow trial in Los Angeles, he said, and knows what it means.

In speaking of blackmail, which he pronounced one of the burning crimes of the day, the detective said if victims would follow his advice and show up the blackmailers instead of meekly submitting, the practice would soon be done away with.

"The stupendous sums paid out for blackmail right here in the City of New York would astound you," he told his auditors.

The great detective quickly dispelled the illusion that a detective's work is shrouded with mystery and carried on by uncanny methods. He said that a detective merely had to apply his common sense and business judgment like any other business man.

Mr. Burns deplored the fact that the detective profession is not on so high a plane as it should be. This he ascribed to the evil practices of many cheap detectives who use their

title as a cloak to blackmail and defraud their clients.

That the country is better now than it ever has been and is getting better all the time, as regards crime, is the detective's firm belief as expressed last night.

"Time was," said he, "when members of a legislature or city council or any public official who betrayed the trust of the people went unprosecuted; but that day has passed. The public conscience has been awakened and those men are held responsible for their transgressions."

The detective recounted many interesting incidents in his wide experience and reviewed in considerable detail the methods by which the grafters of San Francisco were run to earth.

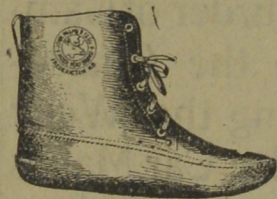

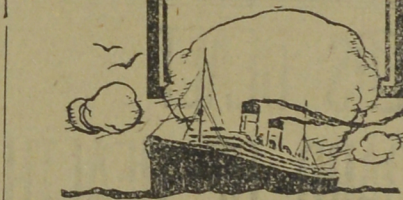
