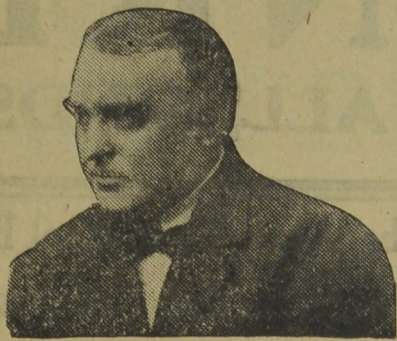

## SAYS LAURIER WILL WIN THE NEXT ELECTION

Toronto, Oct. 11.—Sir Lomer Gouin, premier of Quebec, after a month's tour through the great west, is returning home filled with admiration and wonder at the possibilities of that country and outspoken in his regret that this, his first visit, was not undertaken six or seven years ago.

It was without doubt, the most interesting part of the Dominion, he remarked in an interview here last evening, and every public man should at all events have a thorough acquaintance with it.

The Quebec premier scouted the idea of any western secession.

"We need the west and the west needs us," said he, "and consequently the eventual result will be a perfect union. The pressing cry of the prairie provinces at the present moment, though, is for industries and manufacturers. Those in Ontario and Quebec should establish branches in the west and thus help the growth."

"One thing, however, the west is insisting upon," added the premier, "and that is larger markets. On that point they are determined, and at the same time the feeling in favor of the Liberal party is becoming warmer and warmer."

Sir Lomer met a number of French-Canadians while on his trip, and not one, he said, but had made good. Although he will not advise his fellow countrymen to go west, lest Quebec should be depleted, Sir Lomer certainly would not dissuade a single one.

The question of friction between the west and the Canadian Pacific Railway was touched on by Sir Lomer.

"I talked to many westerners on the subject," he said, "men who were absolutely antagonistic to the methods of the railroad, but not one would take upon himself the responsibility of opposing the proposed increase in capital, which will lead to the double tracking of the road. The first thing the west wants is better transportation facilities; the question of cost comes second."

"Most of the complaints, so far as I could see, were rather against the lack of adequate railroad accommodation than the high rates, though these also were a cause of complaint."

Referring to political matters, Sir Lomer declared himself convinced that Sir Wilfrid Laurier will return to power triumphant at the next general election, perhaps this coming year.

## ELECTION IN MacDONALD TAKING PLACE TODAY

Winnipeg, Oct. 11.—The arrest of two more Liberal workers by the provincial police today was the feature of the windup of the MacDonal campaign and added fuel to the bitter controversy now raging as to whether these arrests are justified or are merely to intimidate the opposition candidate's organizations.

The arrests were made at Cardinal in the French-Canadian district of the riding of R. J. A. Prince, one of the men arrested is a Winnipeg law student whose parents are respectable French-Canadians living across the river from St. Boniface. He is charged with having given a voter \$100.

An evening paper says that Frank Turcotte, now of Winnipeg is the same man who ran in the Conservative interest against Hon. Mr. Turgeon, in Duck Lake at the recent Saskatchewan general elections.

R. L. Richardson, the opposition candidate comes out with a final appeal to the electors in which he says that his victory will be the definite formulation by the west of a demand for a square deal in trade which the Dominion government will be obliged to respect. He appeals from the Cossack government in the Province of Manitoba to the integrity of the unpurchasable citizens of MacDonal.

## NEWS FORECAST FOR COMING WEEK

Washington, D. C., Oct. 12.—The greatest naval show in the history of the United States will reach a climax when President Taft and the Secretary of the Navy Meyer will review the great line of armorclads and lesser naval craft now assembled in the Hudson River. The President, aboard the Mayflower, will review the line of ships as they pass down the river and our into New York bay. More than 700,000 tons of fighting ships will be in the display, and of this grand total more than 450,000 tons will be superdreadnoughts, dreadnoughts first-class battleships and armored cruisers.

A distinguished body of Pennsylvania civil war veterans and public officials will go to Culpeper, Va., Thursday, for the dedication of the monument erected to the memory of the Keystone State soldiers buried in the national cemetery at that place.

More than a score of cases of unusual consequence are on the docket for early hearing before the Supreme Court of the United States, which will convene Monday for its fall term. The cases include those of the anthracite coal trust, the Union Pacific, Southern Pacific merger, the intermountain rate cases, the Kansas election case, the cotton corner case, the suit to dissolve the bath-tub trust, the Louisville and Nashville rate case and several cases involving the interstate commerce laws.

Delegates from many countries will assemble at the end of the week in Lethbridge, Alberta, to take part in the International Dry Farming Congress. Other gatherings of the week of more or less general interest will include the international convention of Disciples of Christ, at Louisville; the annual reunion of the Society of the Army of the Cumberland, at Chattanooga; the annual convention of the National Association of Life Underwriters, at Memphis; the annual meeting of the American Humane Association, at Indianapolis, and the convention of the American Meat Packers' Association, at Chicago.

On the day following his review of the first President Taft has promised to go to Worcester, Mass., to help the American Antiquarian Society celebrate the 100th anniversary of its organization.

The consecration of Rev. Heber J. Hamilton, the bishop-elect of the new Canadian diocese of Japan, is scheduled to take place Friday in Christ Church Cathedral, Montreal.

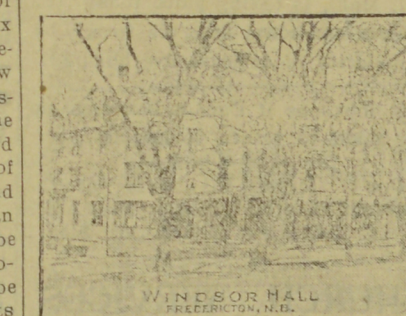
