J. M. ROBINSON & SONS WEEKLY STOCK MARKET REVIEW

St. John Oct. 12.—Contrary to expectations, this week instead of continuing the advance the stock market has shown a decline and quite a severe one at that, this is due to expected announcement of hostilities in the Balkans and the fear of the war spreading and entangling the larger European nations, has caused weakness on every exchange.

The reflection of this in the New York market is not particularly noticeable, except in Canadian Pacific stock, which is so largely held in Berlin, that any difficulties there causing liquidation, affect this stock more than any other. The American market itself is firm and quiet, and is well supported, and we do not look for any trouble there due to a war so far away, in fact the general opinion is that this Balkan war trouble will be confined to a small area and will be of short duration.

C.P.R.

Much attention has been devoted of late to C.P.R. by the newspapers in consequence of its new issue of stock and it is rumored that the Directors of the Company consider this decision one of the greatest bull cards that has ever been played in this security. It is stated that it is the intention of the Company to use a part of the proceeds of the new issue to retire \$23,766,000 of bonds maturing in 1915, if this was done the bonded debt of the Company would be down to a minimum, and there would be nothing against the Railroad but the debentures and the stock, which would place C.P.R. in a very unique position, even at the present time its bonded debt averages much less than any road in the world.

It is also reported that in January the Company will announce that it has taken control of the Allan Line Steamships while during the past few days a rumor has been afloat that control of the Peninsular and Oriental Steam Navigation Company has been secured. If this proves to be the case, it will be found that Canadian Pacific Railway girdles the Globe, in any case it is in such a splendid financial condition that even though the stock may be temporarily depressed through liquidation, due to fear of war, it must eventually come back again and sell considerably higher.

NEW YORK

In discussing the situation our New York correspondents advise us as follows:

The liquidation of securities from abroad has been very large. There has also been local liquidation and the bull crowd, so called, have been compelled to take a great many stocks. They are carrying a pretty

big load but they seem to have absolute confidence in their ability to take care of them. It would indicate that they expect to be able to put the market higher later on. It is a very interesting situation and one that requires very careful watching in our opinion. By impression is that War will be settled without any serious complications, and when settled we will probably get a rally, unless the settlement comes at about the time of our elections.

It is a very hard market to form any opinion on, on account of absolute lack of public participation.

The renewal of liquidation in the London market from Paris and Berlin must have an effect here. Berlin has been for a long time in no condition to stand this extra strain and Paris seems to be panicky about the Balkan trouble. Of course if there is any truth that Austria is mobilizing as is stated in the New York papers it will make the situation more serious. We do not consider it a safe time for our people to make commitments in the market, especially considering the nature of our market."

MONTREAL

There has been excellent support this stock all this week from houses who have been at all times bullish on the stock, but whether the liquidation is over is hard to say. We regard the stock as a purchase on all sharp breaks for a turn.

DETROIT

The decline was helped along by articles in the daily papers that the city were going to try again to collect from the Company so much per day for running rights as which their franchise had run out, and this with the general liquidation in the market was the cause of the decline. As there is a good prospect of their dividend being increased in the coming year, think the stock can be bought on all breaks.

TORONTO RAILS

This stock has declined on a very small amount of liquidation, but as it has not enjoyed the advance that some of the high prices stocks gave had the decline was therefore not so large.

DOMINION IRON

This stock has not been very active this week, but has declined with the rest of the list. We are told that no advance will take place in it until after the cabinet meets, when they expect to get some further concessions from the Government. We do not see any hurry to buy the stock at present.

SEVERE FIGHTING IN THE MONTENEGRO FRONTIER

GREECE NOT TO BE CAJOLED.

Constantinople, Oct. 11.—The Porte is not expected to reply to the note of the powers concerning the trouble in the Balkans before Sunday. It is believed this reply will acquiesce in the views of the powers and accept their offer to submit a program of proposed reforms in Macedonia. It is presumed however, that the Porte is not unwilling to gain time by prolonging the discussion, knowing that each day gained means so much added to Turkey's strength.

The local newspapers in their articles today hint that attempts have been made by Turkey to separate Greece from the quartette of Balkan states now verging upon war with Turkey by offering Greece special advantages but that the Hellenic government turned a deaf ear to the proposals.

London, Oct. 12.—The Turkish troops on the Montenegrin frontier are offering stubborn resistance to the Montenegrin advance on Scutari, according to the latest advices from Podgoritz. The fighting has been of the most severe character, both armies losing heavily.

The Montenegrins are advancing in two columns, one commanded by Crown Prince Danilo of Montenegro operating to the south of Lake Scutari, and the other, commanded by General Martinovitch, having made its base at Antivari, to the south of Lake Scutari.
