WANT FREE POTATOES

A late issue of The Brooklyn Daily Eagle published the following communication relating to the high cost of living:

Being a subscriber of your valuable paper, I ask if nothing can be done to relieve the potato situation—one of the most needed articles of food for every family.

We sold today five cars of potatoes imported from Scotland to go to Chicago. The entire United States is in need of potatoes. With the high prices prevailing, is it not time that the government should take off the duty of 70 cents per bag of 168 lbs.? The commission men have done all they possibly can to relieve the situation. Thousands of bags of potatoes have been sold by our firm, as well as by our competitors, with a small profit of 10 cents per bag to relieve the situation. Our country will need foreign potatoes for the next two months, as our own crop will be very late this season, owing to the weather conditions.

Commenting on the above, The Eagle says editorially:

"A commission merchant whose communication is published on this page makes a practical suggestion which, if acted upon, would do much toward reducing the cost of living. The suggestion is that, for a period of time at least, congress should put potatoes on the free list. It will hardly be contended that potatoes are not a staple of food almost as important as flour. At the present time it would seem that the production of last year is practically exhausted and that months will elapse before this year's production will reach the markets. What stock of last year's growth is still held in the growers' hands is held at prices that are almost prohibitive. There are importations of potatoes from abroad but such do not relieve the situation, since there is a duty of 70 cents on each bag of 168 pounds.

"It is a situation that is not likely to grow better for some months, but worse. Congress could relieve it by suspending the duty of 70 cents, at least until after the new crop is gathered. If it were sincere it could relieve the situation in twenty-four hours. Such rapid work is, however, too much to be expected, for there must be the exploitation of a certain amount of oratory. Yet such action would do much to correct the growing idea that congress is less concerned in reductions of the tariff than it is in making political points in this presidential year."

The story told in the above scarcely corresponds with the absurd utterances of Tory flag-flappers, who went about York and other counties last autumn telling the farmers that if the reciprocity agreement went into force they would be put out of business by the potato growers of Aroostook. Now we have the farmers of Scotland and Ireland shipping their potatoes to the United States, and so far as we know, they are not looked upon as disloyal for so doing. Had the reciprocity agreement been ratified potatoes grown in New Brunswick would now be entering the American market free of duty, while those from Scotland and Ireland would be subject to a tax of 25 cents per bushel. The farmers of York listened to and heeded the flag-flappers' fast fall and today the United States customs authorities are collecting thousands of dollars in customs duties on farm produce being shipped from this county to the United States.

Will Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., bury the hatchet and assist in welcoming Hon. J. D. Hazen to the city this evening?

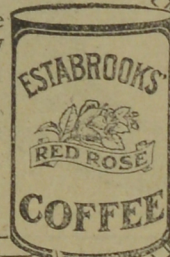

The local hack organ rises to remark:

"Mr. Hazen had sooo established himself as a man of influence in the Cabinet, one in whose judgment his colleagues could have implicit confidence, and who invariably viewed matters from the broad standpoint of the public good."

It is a well known fact that the hack organ and Mr. O. S. Crockett tried their level best to keep Mr. Hazen out of the cabinet. If he has "established himself as a man of influence" no thanks are due to the soreheads who in October last sent telegrams all over the province to prominent Conservatives urging them to protest against his appointment.

When Dr. Pugsley withdrew from the provincial field to enter the higher arena of politics, he entertained his colleagues, officials of the government and other friends to a farewell banquet in this city. When Hon. Mr. Hazen was summoned to the Dominion Cabinet, he pulled out of local politics without as much as saying good-bye to those with whom he had been associated. Now when he returns to Fredericton after the lapse of many days, his political friends as a means of giving expression to their joy or sorrow at his withdrawal from the leadership of the provincial government are to tender him a banquet.

Hon. J. D. Hazen, minister of marine, is coming to town. A lot of Tory grafters and office seekers will want to see him, but he will probably be able to find time to receive a delegation from the Board of Trade. We want the Valley Railway shops, we want the river dredged, we want the post office building enlarged and a whole lot of other things. As a former mayor of this city, the minister will no doubt lend a sympathetic ear to any demands which may be made upon him for public improvements.

In the year 1885 the electors of York rejected Mr. J. D. Hazen when he sought election to the Legislature. In 1890 they rejected the late Hon. A. G. Blair when he appealed for reelection. Both gentlemen, however, remained in the political game and lived to become members of the Dominion cabinet. It rather seems that York was more particular in choosing representatives in the old days than it is today.

The Tory grafters who did their utmost to prevent Hon. Mr. Hazen from getting the place in the Borden cabinet to which his ability and long service to the party entitled him, will be the first to grasp his hand upon his arrival here this evening.

The parties who are arranging the banquet for Hon. Mr. Hazen evidently have no regard for the feelings of Mr. O. S. Crockett, M.P., who lost to the ex-premier in the race for cabinet honors.

Only hungry Tory heelers seem to be eligible for Government jobs in York County. Special consideration is usually shown to those who have failed in everything they have under taken.

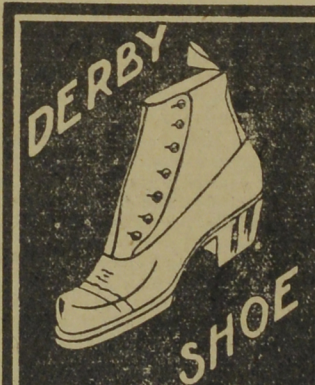
