 BOSTON MEET

George T. Gamble hit low in Second Round of Semi-final--Dan McDonald Lost on Decision

Boston, Mass., April 9--George T. Gamble of St. John, N. B., fought a hard and furious bout in the semi-finals of the 145 pound class of the R. A. U. national boxing championships tonight in Mechanics Hall, only to lose out in the second round, being disqualified for hitting low. Gamble, until ordered from the ring, held his opponent, Askins, of Boston, well. It was the opinion of the fans that Gamble's blow was accidental, as he was in-fighting when disqualified. Askins later won the championship.

The other lad from the provinces to do well, was Dan McDonald, of New Glasgow, who went as far as the semi-finals in the 150 pound class. Mac fought a hard go with Arthur Sheridan, the New York champ, who finally won the championship. At the conclusion of the three rounds between MacDonald and Sheridan, both were so weak that they could hardly stand. Many of the spectators thought they should have been sent another round before a winner was declared.

Jimmy Lynch won the 105 pound title, John Cooper, of Chelsea won the 125 pound class, and Tommy Regan, the A. A. U. champion, was victorious in the 115 pound class. Al Walmagna, of New Orleans, was the final victor for the middleweights and J. Silverino won the heavy weight medal.

Silverino, however, was defeated in a special bout, with A. Berkler, of New Orleans, after the latter had lost out in the middleweight trials.
