TRACADIE WOMAN TELLS
A PITIFUL STORY

Montreal, Aug. 20—Absolutely destitute, with a fretful little boy clinging to her shoulder, Mrs. Michael Sullivan of Tracadie, N. B., was the subject to much sympathy at the Windsor street station today.

Mrs. Sullivan and her baby, who is so ill that she fears he will die before reaching home, arrived from New York last night, where she has been for the past month searching for her husband, who left home three years ago but who had written promising to meet her on her arrival there.

During the first year after the father had left she had received occasional remittances from him but for the past two years she has slaved to save enough to take herself and the boy to the father who wrote occasionally saying he could send no money as he was saving all he could to prepare a home for them if they would come to him.

With \$100 put by, Mrs. Sullivan left Tracadie about a month ago for New York, writing to tell her husband that she was coming. He failed to meet her at the station and she was unable to find him, although she followed every clue for a month. Finally, with no money left, she applied to one of the railroads which granted her transportation to Montreal, and wired an uncle concerning her plight. The uncle has promised to meet her here and take her home. He is expected here tomorrow morning.

Passengers at the station, hearing her story, collected enough money to secure her board and lodgings for the night and to pay for a visit to a doctor.

THE SPOILS SYSTEM IS
TAKING A FIRM HOLD

(Halifax Chronicle)

The spoils system is obtaining such a hold in Canada that honest men are unable to see what the end is to be. Public offices as a reward for votes has openly become the creed of even those reputable leaders in the Conservative party who heretofore had strenuously disavowed all connection with the ways of the henchman. The fact is the Conservatives in the last campaign everywhere promised lavishly that the good men who fought for them should enter upon the inheritance of Government offices which it intended to purge of their holders from Atlantic to Pacific.

The first parliamentary session under Borden rule had scarcely been summoned before all sorts of campaign workers with expectation written on their faces were on hand at Ottawa to remind the Tory chiefs of their claims. They had pulled down a Government in order to set up another and now the new "lords" were to drive out one set of incumbents of the minor offices in order to establish another set—themselves.

"Routine in office" was the name of the new principle and they declared it good. Proscriptions began immediately. Public office became suddenly a new object of interest and desire—a chance for thousands at the whirl of the Government wheel. "Routine in office" was altogether too mild a formula for the mouths of these men. "To the victors belong the spoils of victory" was more like it and the horse race soon resounded from every city village and hamlet.

Men long in the public service were dismissed without warning. Outlets were taken up to dispossess others whose tenure of office was more tenuous. The Government at once determined upon the new policy of holding Public interests in every constituency.

The onslaught on the office-holders of the country became, as it continues to be, the chief occupation of thousands of Conservatives everywhere.

Two main causes are behind all these dismissals, that are now taking place in every province. In Nova Scotia, each of these main causes leading to the dismissal of civil servants are, it is believed, more rampant than elsewhere in Canada. Revenge is the first cause. The opportunity of some person who the open competition of commerce, the man who takes the place of another is currently called a scab, no matter how innocent he is of any previous conditions. If there is any one who should incur the aversion due to a scab it is the political place-hunter who gains position by the dismissal of another. When such a place-hunter is the informer and the sole witness against the present incumbent and by that means becomes the new appointee himself, he outrivals the worst sort of scab, scab known to any kind of industrial employment. Yet it is yielding to the opportunity to this class of scab that the Conservative party is now making the chief activity and concern of government in this country.
