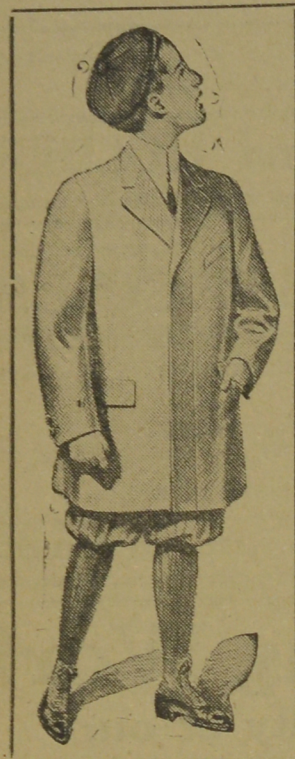


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BRANHAM BAUGHMAN MADE NEW RECORD AT ROCKINGHAM

On Poor Footing Placed Track Record at 2.06 3-4
---Al Dillard won 2.11 Pace in Fast Time---Bought at Augusta two Weeks ago---Very Successful Meet---Alcyde out Side Money in 2.11 Pace

Salem, N. H., Aug. 20--The Grand Circuit horses played their first engagement on New Hampshire soil this afternoon at Rockingham Park, where they are one of the attractions at the fair which gets its name from this splendidly appointed racing plant.

The trotters and pacers did not get quite the welcome that was anticipated for the reason that devotees of the sport in Massachusetts took it for granted that the rain of the night before would make the track unfit for racing. The footing was not first-class, but before sunset Branham Baughman placed the track record at 2.06 3-4.

Rockingham was a revelation to the circuit followers, the grandstand, stables and lawns being the finest down the line. All were loud in their praise of the plant and predicted a brilliant future for it as a home for harness horse racing. As a rule the racing men do not take kindly to the combination of a Grand Circuit meeting and a fair, but the vastness of Rockingham does not permit the horse show, stage shows, live stock exhibitions, the midway or the other attractions to bother the racing.

The condition of the track made last time almost impossible, but the racing was interesting, and the men who have come from Grand Rapids through saw a brand new field of trotters parade, which added considerable spice to the sport.

BAUGHMAN TAKES FEATURE

Branham Baughman, the pacing star of the Cox stable, won the feature event, the \$3000 2:05 class. For the first time this season and almost in his career, the good son of Gambetta Wilkes found himself in a field without a horse ready to smash out a mile around 2:03. Peter the Second had him to a drive in the second heat and the finish was close enough to make the crowd applaud.

Keynote, a pupil of the Connecticut trainer, Frank Murphy, was the best of the nine trotters who were breaking into circuit company for the first time. He was not quite able to catch the Massachusetts bred Susiewood in the first heat, but after that he found Billy Miller more dangerous, having to step in 2:12 1-2 to stall off Farley's likely acting gelding.

The north country scored a good win, when the Vermont-bred horse, Al Dillard, won the 2:11 pace, entering the 2:10 list in the third heat, being forced out by the Manchester-owned Edna B. Al Dillard is the son of Abbott Wilkes, 2:11, who has been winning so regularly over the half-mile tracks for three years, this being his thirty-first victory in thirty-four starts. He was bought by C. A. Stevens of Fulton, N. Y., at Augusta two weeks ago for \$400 and is now in the stable of Ed Sumner.

There are three other races on the card, the two-year-old division of the American Horse Breeder Futurity, 2:19 pace and 2:14 trotters. The summary:

FRANK PATCH WON MONCTON FREE-FOR-ALL IN FOUR

Spooney Boy Captured First Heat--Leonard Wilton and Gallagher Upset in Collision--Cherry won 2.40 Mixed Race After Rose W. Took First Heat --Good Racing

Moncton, N. B., Aug. 21--Good racing was witnessed on the Moncton speedway this afternoon. About 500 people were in attendance and the races were voted the best seen here in years. Both classes furnished exciting sport. The first heat in the 2:40 class especially was of the sensational kind, five horses being within a length of each other as they passed under the wire, with Rose W slightly in front.

When Spooney Boy captured the first heat in the free-for-all, it looked like an exciting fight for first place, as there were seven fast horses in the field. In the second heat, however, Frank Patch proved his ability by winging out on the home stretch and repeating the trick in the next two heats. In the third heat Pearl Pick and Spooney Boy pocketed Patch, but the clip was so fast that Spooney Boy made a skip, letting Patch out, and he won the heat in the home stretch amid excitement.

In the first heat of the free-for-all, there was a collision between Leonard Wilton and Gallagher at the first turn, both sulkies being smashed up, but the drivers and horses escaped injury and they did not finish the heat. The judges allowed them to start in the second heat. Spooney Boy got second money. Vesta Boy, with fine burst of speed in the third heat, won third money and Pearl Pick got fourth.

Cherry Ripe showed the way in the 2:40 class, after losing the first heat to Rose W.
