**DEATH RESULTED FROM ATTACK OF SWARM OF BEES**

Frederick Gunter Formerly of Bear Island Passed Away in Vancouver General Hospital On Tuesday Last

**IN STATE OF COMA FOR TEN DAYS PREVIOUS**

Advice received from Vancouver concerning the death of the late Frederick Gunter, formerly of this county, include details which came as a severe shock to his friends and relatives in this city. The deceased passed away in the Vancouver General Hospital on the morning of Tuesday last as the result of being attacked by a swarm of bees while at work in his garden. The bees stung him severely about ten days before his death and his injuries were so serious that he was taken to the hospital, where he lay in a state of coma, not recovering consciousness before death. Medical men of Vancouver state that the case is one of the most unusual which ever came to their notice, not only on account of the nature of the injuries which finally caused death, but also on account of the symptoms which preceded death. The deceased was a native of Bear Island and went to Vancouver a few years ago.

**LIEUT. GOVERNOR NOW IN RESIDENCE HERE**

Decoration of Public Buildings Preparatory to Vice-Regal Visit Proceeding Rapidly

His Honor the Lieutenant Governor accompanied by his daughters Mrs. Black and Mrs. Nichol arrived here from St. John by motor-car last night and took up residence at Frogmore preparatory to the visit of the Governor-General and the vice-regal party on Saturday. **BITE OF SPIDER FOLLOWED BY VERY SERIOUS RESULTS**

John H. Parsons Confined to bed as Result of Sting of Insect Received at Camp Sussex Several Weeks Ago

**UNDER MEDICAL ATTENDANCE RECOVERY PROBABLY SLOW**

The bite of a spider received several weeks ago has had very serious consequences in the case of Mr. John H. Parsons, Sr., who is now confined to his home on Brunswick street by an abscess on the under side of his knee. He was compelled to take to his bed on Saturday last and since that time has suffered considerable pain. He is being attended by Dr. H. H. McNally.

**BITTEN AT SUSSEX.**

Mr. Parsons, who is caterer for the Officers' Mess of the 71st York Regt., received the injury which has resulted in the abscess while in camp at Sussex in the latter part of June and first week of July. He was bitten. The injury was painful but no serious results were anticipated at the time. Mr. Parsons soon was caused much inconvenience however, and after his return from Sussex suffered so much pain from his knee that he was unable to work.

The remarkable injury finally caused so much pain that medical assistance was called in. Mr. Parsons' recovery is expected but it is understood that it will take some time.

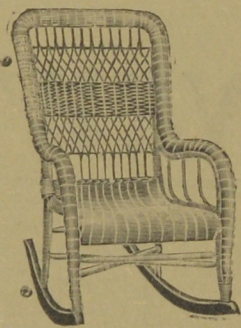
