Train will be in this Province from June 6th until June 20th—Large Staff of Lecturers to Accompany it

H. P. TIMMERMAN HERE
IN THAT CONNECTION

Mr. H. P. Timmerman of Montreal, Industrial Commissioner of the Canadian Pacific Railway arrived in the city last night. Mr. Timmerman is here making arrangements with regard to the C. P. R. Illustration Farm at Fredericton Junction and also concerning the special agricultural train which for demonstration purposes will be run over the Atlantic Division of the railway next month. It is probable that about twenty train the majority being members of lecturers will accompany the special staff of Macdonald College, Ste. Anne de Bellevue.

The special train will begin its work in New Brunswick on Saturday, June 8th at Fredericton Junction. The final lectures and demonstrations on the division will be given in this city on Thursday, June 20th. The train will be in this city from nine in the morning until ten at night. Arrangements are to be made for special rates on the river steamers as well as on the railways and everyone whether a farmer or not is invited to visit the train.

FORTY-FIRST YEAR
AS POLICE MAGISTRATE

Col. J. L. Marsh Sworn in by Late Chief Justice Allen on May 2nd 1871

Col. John Lothrop Marsh today is observing the forty-first anniversary of his appointment as police magistrate of Fredericton and is being heartily congratulated upon the event. He is the senior police magistrate of this province and also senior barrister. On May 2nd, 1871, he resigned the position of city clerk and was sworn in as police magistrate by the late Chief Justice Allen, afterward Sir John Allen. Col. Marsh is in his eighty-fourth year, having been born January 22nd 1829 and is the oldest acting magistrate in New Brunswick. He was admitted to the bar in 1853, and practiced law in this city for some years.

Col. Marsh tried the first case under the Canada Temperance Act and although an appeal was made from his judgment to the Privy Council, it was sustained. He also was the first magistrate to impose a penitentiary sentence.

His military rank is obtained from his service in the Canadian Militia he having been retired in 1895 with the rank of colonel after commanding the 1st York Regt. for twenty-two years. On retirement he received the Colonial Auxiliary Forces Decoration.

Appointment Goes into Effect at once
—To Hold Office for Three Months at Salary of \$100 Per Month

PUBLICITY AGENT HAS
HAD WIDE EXPERIENCE

The Publicity Committee last night appointed Mr. E. J. Payson as Publicity and Industrial Agent for Fredericton and as permanent secretary for the Board of Trade. Mr. Payson is expected to arrive here tomorrow or Saturday and will take up his duties on arrival.

The appointment was made for three months, terminating after the Old Home Week, which is to be held here in August. The salary is one hundred dollars per month. Mr. Payson was selected out of about half a dozen applicants.

The details concerning the location of the offices of the Publicity Agent have not yet been decided. It has been suggested that he use the City Council Chamber but it is possible that office-room may be secured elsewhere.

Mr. E. J. Payson is well known here and is considered eminently suited for the office of Publicity Agent. He has had extensive experience in journalism in the Maritime Provinces having at various times been located in Fredericton, Moncton, Sydney and Glace Bay. He was also Y.M.C.A. secretary in this city some years ago.

Dr. H. S. Bridges of St. John Grand Master of the provincial lodge F. & A. M., will pay an official visit to Hiram Lodge of this city tonight.

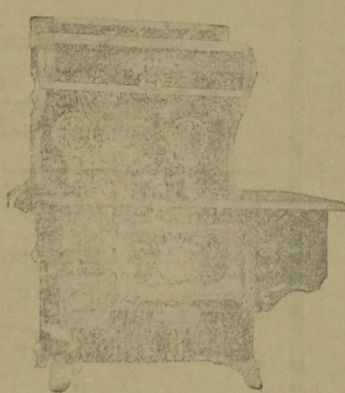
NOT AFTER APPOINTMENT

SERIOUS FIRE
AT L.R. QUEENSBURY
LAST EVENING

Residence of Messrs. Charles and Lee Courser Destroyed—Barns and Out-buildings Saved through Efforts of Neighbors

BUILDING FORMERLY OWNED
BY EX-WARDEN McNALLY

Word has been received here of a serious fire last evening at Lower Queensbury in which Mr. Charles Courser and his son Mr. Lee Courser suffered heavy loss. The dwelling which they occupied together with a shed adjoining was totally destroyed as was also a quantity of potatoes in the cellar of the house. Other out-buildings and a barn near the dwelling were saved largely through the strenuous efforts of the neighbors who gathered to fight the flames. Two other barns standing some distance from the house also escaped the flames. The greater part of the furniture of the house was removed safely and the stock and implements were uninjured.

The loss of the Messrs Courser is estimated at \$1,500. They are insured for that amount in companies represented by Frank I. Morrison & Son of this city but the insurance is on the entire group of farm-buildings.

CAUGHT FROM CHIMNEY

The fire broke out shortly after five o'clock in the evening when the family were seated at supper. The odor of smoke was the first indication of the fire that was noticed and it was found that the attic of the rear portion of the house was burning. It is thought the fire caught from a chimney.

The building destroyed was formerly owned by Ex-Warden Byron M. McNally of Kingsclear the Messrs Courser purchasing the property some years ago.

DEATH AT GIBSON.
