ROME HONORS AN AMERICAN PRELATE

Rome, July, 25—In the chapel where 25 years ago he was ordained a priest, the Rt. Rev. Thomas F. Kennedy, the popular and distinguished rector of the American College in Rome, today celebrated mass and received the congratulations of a host of friends and admirers on the occasion of his sacerdotal jubilee. The Pope and practically all of the members of the Sacred College resident in Rome, together with a host of other high officials at the Vatican were among those who offered their congratulations to Bishop Kennedy, and in addition the American prelate received a bundle of felicitous messages from his personal friends among the clergy and laity of the Roman Catholic church in the United States.

Few churchmen in Rome, outside of the limited circle of high Vatican officials, enjoy a wider measure of fame than the rector of the American College, and it is safe to say that none is more highly esteemed. It is now more than ten years since the late Pope Leo XIII., largely upon the recommendation of Mgr. Satolli, called Bishop Kennedy to Rome to fill the rectorship of the North American College.

Previous to his appointment as rector of the college, the young American prelate was connected with St. Charles Theological Seminary, near Philadelphia. Mgr. Satolli at that time apostolic delegate to the United States, visited the seminary and was particularly impressed with

the work being carried on there by Mgr. Kennedy. The apostolic delegate declared that nowhere in America had he seen a training school for priests so closely approaching the models and high standards established in Rome.

Bishop Kennedy has met with equal success in his rectorship of the North American College, which is now conceded to be the most important of the foreign colleges in Rome. From the beginning of his service he has distinguished himself by his business ability, his governing power, his tact and courtesy in dealing with the large number of visitors from the United States.

The attendance at the college has increased beyond all precedents. The students have been more successful than ever before in their competition with the students of other colleges of the propaganda. The rector has won the admiration and commendation not only of the various Cardinals with whom he comes in contact, but especially the heads of the Cardinal Secretary of State and of the Holy Father.

All those acquainted with what is going on in high Vatican spheres knew that Bishop Kennedy is persona gratissima at headquarters and that he is considered to deserve a high distinction, but he remains rector of the American College, it is said chiefly to gratify the desire of the Pope that he should remain longer than any of his predecessors at the head of the institution.

TWENTY-FIVE YEARS BEHIND THE TIMES

St. Thomas, July 23—Eon. F. D. Monk, minister of public works, after visiting Port Stanley Harbor today, where he arrived on the government yacht Speedy, from Windsor, later motored to St. Thomas with D. Marshall, M. P. for East Elgin, and was received at the City Hall by members of the Council, Board of Trade and others. Speaking of his present tour, he said:

"I have been impressed all the way with the superior equipment of American ports. We are twenty-five years behind the times in the way of port and navigation improvements. Yet we have all the requirements, too, for the proper equipment of our ports. We have ships, we have men, and we have money, too."

Mr. Monk also motored to Ayler and Port Burwell, returning to his boat at the latter place.

MOTOR TURNS TURTLE A DOCTOR IS KILLED

Carleton Place, July 23—Dr. Daniel Muirhead, one of the best known physicians in the Ottawa Valley was killed tonight near North Grower, when an automobile in which he was driving with Mr. Norman Cram also of this town turned turtle on a side road. The machine went into a ditch, crushing Dr. Muirhead beneath it and injuring him so terribly that he died within half an hour. Mr. Cram was able to jump clear of the machine and escaped with minor injuries. Dr. Muirhead was about 50 years of age and unmarried.

Chatham, July 25—Weary and foot-sore, after walking fifty miles from Windsor, Mrs. Elizabeth Turner, aged 50, hobbled into Chatham this morning on the way to Hamilton, where a daughter is dangerously ill. She had only twelve cents in her pocket and had undertaken to tramp the entire distance. Chief of Police Holmes secured her a railway pass as far as London.

THIS IS MY 51ST BIRTHDAY

James K. Vardaman, who has been selected to succeed United States Senator Le Roy Percy of Mississippi, when the latter's term expires next March, was born in Jackson county, Texas, July 26, 1861. At an early age he moved with his parents to Mississippi and his education was received in the public schools of that State. He was admitted to the bar in 1882 and began the practice of law in the town of Winona, where he subsequently engaged in the publication of a newspaper. Later he established a newspaper in Greenwood and Jackson. From 1890 to 1896 Mr. Vardaman was a member of the lower branch of the Mississippi legislature and during a part of that time he served as speaker. In 1904 he was elected governor, after having twice been an unsuccessful candidate for the United States senate in 1907 he was elected to the senate last year for a term beginning next March.
