## PREDICTS A BUMPER APPLE CROP

(Canadian Press)

Ottawa, July 26—Alex. McNeil, chief fruit inspector, reports that the present outlook is for a splendid apple crop evenly distributed throughout the Dominion. The British Columbia crop is particularly large and will have a large amount for export into the prairie provinces. The Ontario crop is fair and is evenly distributed over the province so that the aggregate is large.

Mr. McNeil has just returned from Nova Scotia and he states the crop is one of the largest on record. It will run up to 700,000 barrels.

## GRAIN GROWERS TO OPERATE ELEVATOR

Winnipeg, Man., July 26—The grain growers company will take over the operation of the government elevators system on September 1st, according to the terms of the lease, which have been agreed upon by the government and the representatives of the company. It is stipulated that this will give the commission at present in control of the provincial elevators sufficient time to make all the arrangements necessary prior to the transfer of control, when the commission will cease to exist.

## TEDDY ATTACKS DEMOCRATIC POLICY

Oyster Bay, July 26—An attack upon the Democratic majority in the house of representatives for refusing to adopt the two battalions program was made today by Col. Roosevelt. He declared that the upbuilding of the Navy must go on if the United States is to maintain its position among the nations of the world.

"Any talk as to what we intend to do about the Munro doctrine, the Panama Canal, the protection of Hawaii or any other matter is not merely offensive but contemptible," he said "if we abandon building up the navy and show that we really have neither the power nor the will if the need should ever come to make our words good, by deeds."

## RED RASPBERRIES REPAY RAISING

Where red raspberries yield 2,000 quarts per acre as they do on the farm of Mr. B. H. Lee, near Berwick N. S., there is undoubtedly profit in the crop as prices have been during the last few years. Mr. Lee recently disposed of a 3,000 quart crop grown on an acre and a half, for ten cents net. As berry-growing has only been a side line with him, he has not given close attention to the cost of production but he states that about 3 cents should pay for picking and marketing. Mr. Lee has never done any heavy fertilizing preferring to follow the rule of commercial fertilizers one year and stable manure the next, each applied lightly. A red raspberry patch is good for eight or ten years, possibly longer and constant cultivation takes out the nutrients hence the necessity for replenishing the soil with plant food.

In preparing the ground for planting he aims to have it in as good condition as for grain or potatoes. The rows should be placed far enough apart to allow a one-horse harrow to go through and the plants set as close in the rows as possible. The closeness of planting is largely decided by the cost of the plants. The more plants set the sooner you get a full crop.

When hoeing time comes, which should be quite often in dry weather, a very small handful of nitrate of soda worked into the soil around each plant about twice in the season is sufficient for the first year. Mr. Lee prefers to plant them before the growth starts in the spring, but says that no doubt fall planting would be equally satisfactory. If the land is in good condition and the plants are far enough apart in the row, some crop like potatoes or beans may be grown in the row. If the rows are five or six feet apart a row of such vegetables may be grown between the raspberry rows. Mr. Lee does not advise planting them in a young orchard unless the ground is moist and well fertilized.

The weeds and grass should not be allowed to get a hold at all. The rows should be kept level and between the rows cultivated lightly but thoroughly as the feeding roots are quite near the surface. Bone meal and stable manure are good fertilizers and about 300 pounds of nitrate of soda applied when the berries are nicely set will give them a great lift. Any fertilizers which are good for orchards are good for raspberries. However, Mr. Lee considers the nitrate of soda very important. With this careful treatment he says that in the second year you will get a few berries and about the third or fourth year owing to the growth and increase in the number of canes, a full crop may be expected.

value of our timber resources four fold. Such an organization could provide for protection of timber against fire. It would be in a position to secure necessary important legislation. It would enable us to control the lath market in the Eastern States. The value of our lath in the United States would be increased by from fifty cents to a dollar. It would do away with the competition among manufacturers for cars and vessels, and would strengthen the manufacturers' case in opposing freight advances as the trade of so large an organization would be an important item with the transportation companies.

### ADVANTAGES EXPECTED

"The experience gained by such an organization would result in adjusting outputs and shipments closely to market requirements and would prevent the frequent waste and trade depression caused by over-production. Instead of being cut and sold at a loss, much of our timber would be preserved for a future day when its value would permit of a good profit. The present year has shown the lumbermen that it is possible for some of them to be seriously mistaken in their opinions of future conditions. Some years ago many lumbermen predicted that deals would advance to \$20. They went up to \$15 and back to \$13. They could be sold for \$20 under normal business conditions if some such organization were formed as I have mentioned. At least ten of the strongest lumbermen of the province should form the foundation for such an organization. If they could be induced to take the matter up it would mean the salvation of the lumbering industry of the province."
