## Woodstock Lost To Pets In Tenth Inning

Corcoran's Error let Duggan Score Winning run With two out--Reckless Base Running on Frederictons' part again Feature of Play--Callahan at Second can put Better Game Than he did Yesterday--Harrington and Whitney pitched Good Ball.

It took almost ten innings of baseball that varied from good to indifferent, before Fredericton scored the run necessary to win from the Woodstock Colts yesterday. The end came in the tenth with two men out, when "Father" Corcoran fell down on Hoyt's drive and Pat Duggan scored from second base on the error, although Corcoran should have retrieved the ball in time to prevent the score.

Had the league leaders played a little more carefully the game would not have gone an extra inning. There was more reckless base-running which cost runs and in the fourth inning Callahan completed the circuit but having neglected to go through the formality of touching third base en route was put out. That was another run lost.

PRETTY GOOD PITCHING.

Harrington pitched for Fredericton and Whitney for Woodstock, and both gave great demonstrations of the pitchers' art when everything is taken into consideration. Each had five strike-outs to his credit but Whitney grew rather wild towards the end of the game. Harrington fielded his position faultlessly. In the fourth Woodstock was retired with just four balls delivered. Seven hits were called off the delivery of each, singles, with one exception.

GROUNDS IN POOR CONDITION.

Three days' rain had made the grounds soggy and slippery as Whitney found in the third inning when he stopped a hot one from Duggan's bat and landed on his back. Some of the errors were due to this state of the grounds. Joe Callahan was covering the second sack for Fredericton, "Red" Wildes grading the bench. Callahan was hurt for some hot effort but it is well known that he is able to play a poor game than they have here and elsewhere.

## QUEEN WORTHY WON M & M AFTER GREATEST RACE OF EVENT

Won First and Fifth Heats--Bierne Holt, Arona McKinney and Dave Halle Each Captured one Heat--Track was Heavy and Time, 2.10 1/4 is Considered Good--Winner has had Good Record

Detroit, July 24--Masterful driving by Thomas W. Murphy won the 1912 "renewal of the Merchants' and Manufacturers' Stake after the greatest race in the history of that classic. Queen Worthy given a close decision in the first heat, appeared to be tried out in the next three, but she came back in the fifth and won by a hair's breadth, Murphy making no mistake in his calculation in either of the heats in which he finished first.

The public disagreed with the judges in both of the decisions which placed Murphy's mare in front, thinking The Wanderer had won the first heat and Bierne Holt the fifth, but the judges are the only ones in a position to say which one wins in a nose finish, and the laurels go to the young New Yorker, who today stands as premier of the reinmen of America.

Never was a renewal of the M. and M. fought through five heats with such vigor. Four horses in turn won heats, Queen Worthy, Dave Halle, Arona McKinney and Bierne Holt. Then Queen Worthy won the fifth, the conditions ending the race at that period, so long as no horses at the top were tied in the summary.
