## MR. TWEEDDALE'S SPEECH

A report of the very excellent address of Mr. J. F. Tweeddale, M.P.P., delivered in the legislature on Monday evening will be found in another part of this issue and will repay a careful perusal. Mr. Tweeddale is easily one of the foremost lay members of the House and the County of Victoria has every reason to be proud of him. He is a practical man with a good fund of general information and he has the ability to present his views forcibly and intelligently.

Before coming to the legislature Mr. Tweeddale served for many years in the Victoria County Council and his extensive knowledge of municipal affairs stood him in good stead in the larger sphere of politics and the province has reaped the benefit.

In his speech of Monday evening Mr. Tweeddale took occasion to deal with the attempt which had been made by government supporters to make it appear that he is an opponent of the Valley Railway project. It was Mr. Tweeddale who moved the amendment on the third reading of the bill calling for simultaneously work on all sections of the road. In taking this course he was only performing a simple duty to the people of Victoria County who are now in the matter of freight rates held firmly in the grip of the C.P.R. octopus and are looking eagerly forward to the day when they will have a competing line to and from the West. Connection by the Valley Railway with the Transcontinental at Grand Falls means life or death to them and they will appreciate Mr. Tweeddale's honest efforts to secure for them justice and fair play.

Mr. Tweeddale in the course of his speech took occasion to put in a good word for the sturdy young men of Victoria County who guide tourists to the wilds of the Tobique and who are the means of bringing many thousands of dollars into the country. The guides of the Tobique are skilled in woodcraft and they have the reputation of being the finest canoe-men in the world. Their work is hazardous and they are entitled to fair and generous treatment at the hands of the government. They have in Mr. Tweeddale a representative who will stand up for their interests and will see to it that their right to earn a livelihood from the natural resources of the country is not denied to them.

Although the most valuable timber lands in Victoria County were given away by a Tory government years ago, the county is still a liberal contributor to the revenue. It has rich natural resources and offers unexcelled opportunities for the investment of capital. A government with a progressive policy could do much to assist in the development of Victoria County, but the people have little to hope for from the misfit combination at present misruling this province.

Soon after the present local government took office, the announcement was made in the Tory press that a contract for stationery supplies had been entered into by the government upon terms which would effect a saving of thirty-five per cent to the province. Let us see how much of a saving has been effected. In 1907, the last year of the old government there was expended for stationery for the different departments of the government, including the Normal School the sum of \$3,154.57. Last year under this economical government the total expenditure for stationery amounted to the respectable sum of \$4,371.05, an increase of \$1,225.48. Where is the promised saving of thirty-five per cent?

In one respect at least the present local administration can rightly claim to have practised greater economy than their predecessors and The Mail is disposed to give them full credit for it. During the Legislative session of 1907, the last year of the old government, no less than five hundred gallons of spring water were consumed by members and officials of the House at a cost to the province of \$25. During the session of 1911, with a Tory Government in power, a government which includes at least one red hot temperance reformer, only two hundred and sixteen gallons of water were consumed at a cost to the province of \$10.80. By comparison the present government has affected a saving of \$14.80, but strange to say, none of the speakers who have participated in the budget debate—not even the ethical Mr. Sproule, have given the government any credit for it.

An Exchange hands out the following:—The men who do a town more harm than good may be classed as follows: First, those who run it down to strangers. Second, those who oppose improvements. Third, those who never advertise their business. Fourth, those who distrust public spirited men. Fifth, those who show no hospitality to any one. Sixth, those who hate to see others make money. Seventh, those who oppose every movement that doesn't originate with themselves. Eighth, those who put on long faces when a stranger speaks of locating in their town. Ninth, those who oppose every public enterprise, which does not appear of personal benefit to themselves.

When the Senate some years ago killed such measures as the Yukon bill, the Harvey and Salsbury Railway bill, and the Drummond County Railway bill we were told by the Tory press that it was merely protecting the rights of the public. Now, when the Liberals are in a majority it offers some reasonable amendments to legislation promoted by a Tory government we are given to understand by the Tory press "that the day for some reform in that august body is at hand."

According to a return brought down in the legislature yesterday the Central Railway enquiry cost the taxpayers of this province the tidy sum of \$7,839. Of this amount Mr. H. A. Powell was paid \$2,305.05 and \$2,273.43 went to Judge Landry. Had the money been thrown into the St. John or Nashwaak Rivers the province would have been just as well off.

Mr. Fred Sproule the ethical member for Kings was put up in the legislature last night to defend the government from opposition attacks. Every circus must have its clown and Mr. Sproule had no difficulty in providing amusement for the House and galleries. It is not hard to understand why Mr. Sproule's colleagues from King's are so anxious to get him out of public life.

The Liberals in the Senate did not object to the principle of the legislation promoted by the Borden government in aid of highways, but they insisted that the money should be divided among the provinces on a basis of population. Being anxious to use the money for political purposes the government declined to accept an amendment inserted by the senate and the bill has been killed.

During the year 1907, when the old government was in power the Solicitor General worried along with \$38.50 worth of stationery. Last year when Hon. H. F. McLeod held the office he managed to get away with stationery to the value of \$93.89.

## DEATH AT HANWELL.

Alexander Myrshall, a prominent resident of Hanwell, passed away at his home Tuesday night after a short illness, aged sixty-one years. He is survived by a widow, two sons and two daughters. The children are Alexander, Charles, Annie and Clara, all of Hanwell. The funeral will take place Thursday morning, leaving the late home of the deceased at nine o'clock. High Mass of Requiem will be celebrated by Rev. Father Cormier at the Hanwell church. Interment will be made at Hanwell.

Mr. Hanson said that no valid objection had been presented against the erection of the dam which should cause the committee to throw out a project of such magnitude. He (Hanson) had the unprejudiced statement of Mr. Kilburn that the dam would not interfere with the transmission of lumber but would serve to assist the driving operations. John. The company was a stable one and had as its chief financial backer Mr. Herbert Guersey of London. It was proposed to establish a pulp and paper mill at or near the Meductic Falls. The erection of the dam was feasible from an engineering standpoint. A dam twenty feet high would not stop the natural flow of water and would not interfere with the rights of the lumbermen or the fishermen. He believed it impracticable to place a fishway in a dam thirty-five feet high, but Mr. Hockins, an expert, had given his unbiased opinion that a proper and efficient fishway could be put in a dam of twenty-five feet high. There was no doubt about the jurisdiction of the Legislature to grant this legislation and the proposition should receive fair play from all concerned.

The committee adjourned at 1.30 till 2.30 o'clock.

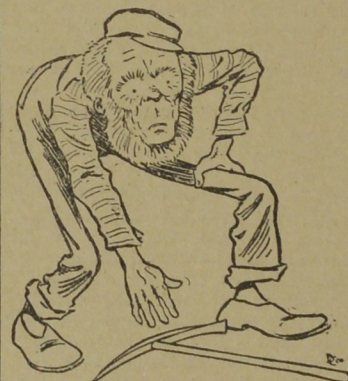

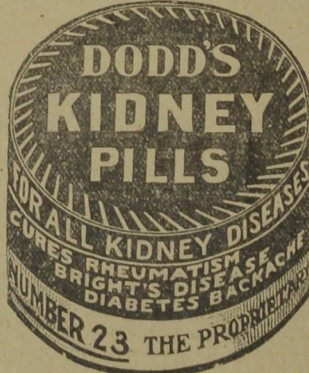
