"I didn't give it out."

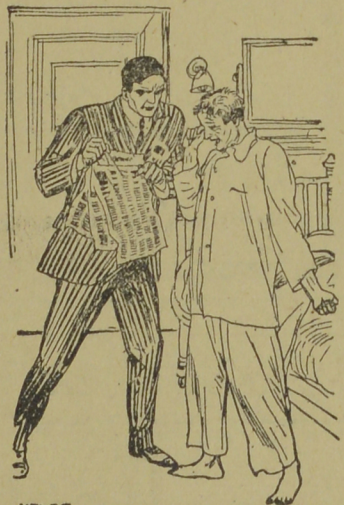
